
POLITICAL FUSION IN IRISH FREE STATE BEING PROPOSED

Cosgrave's Followers Leading Movement to Unite Against Valera

Would Merge With Centre Party and National Guard to Form United Ireland Party and Solidify Opposition To Present Administration

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, Sept. 8: (CP)—The party of former President William Cosgrave voted today to merge with the Centre Party and the National Guard, forming the United Ireland Party. This fusion would bring together the opposition to President Eamonn de Valera's Nationalist (Sinn Fein) party which is now in control of the reins of government in the Irish Free State.

CASE OF DEFENCE

He Rests His Case in Lamson Trial and Taking of Defence Evidence Started

BAN JOSE, Cal., Sept. 8:—After a recess since last Friday following completion of the state's case, the trial of David A. Lamson, charged with the murder of his wife by bludgeoning her to death with a piece of pipe while she bathed in their home near here last June, has resumed with the defence opening its case.

Witnesses for Lamson took the stand and gave evidence designed to refute the web of circumstantial testimony adduced by the prosecution and to show that Lamson and his wife were actually a happily married couple and that he could not have slain his spouse in a fit of anger over unrequited love as the state had endeavored to prove.

RELIEF FOR SINGLE MEN

Municipalities to Share in Cost on Same Basis as Now Applies to Married Men

VICTORIA, Sept. 8: (CP)—The full cost of unemployment relief for single homeless, destitute men of British Columbia, which was formerly borne by the provincial and federal governments, will now be undertaken on a one-third basis with the municipalities, similar to the plan on which relief is administered to married men, according to an announcement made to several municipalities by Col. D. W. B. Spry, special relief administrator for the province representing the federal government.

FIGHT FOR PRESIDENCY

Re-election of William Green as A. F. L. Head to be Opposed by John L. Lewis

CHICAGO, Sept. 8:—There are already abundant signs that a hard fight will be waged at the annual convention this fall for the presidency of the American Federation of Labor. Chief opponent of President William Green for re-election will, it is expected, be John L. Lewis, the popular president of the United Mine Workers' Union of America.

Chief of Canadian National Tells of Rail Co-operation; Business Increase Expected

TORONTO, Sept. 8:—That the two great railway systems of Canada are co-operating with each other in numerous ways and that much progress has been accomplished to date, while other forms of co-operation are now under examination and may be expected to be effected in the near future was the keynote of a message from S. J. Hungerford, acting president of the Canadian National Railways, which was given at the directors' luncheon of the Canadian National Exhibition on Transportation Day.

In his message, Mr. Hungerford pointed out that the transportation problem of today and immediate future is to use the various means of transport in the most economical and efficient way instead of competing to an uneconomic extent as at present. Mr. Hungerford found that each of the component parts of the transportation industry as a whole should fill its individual economic sphere and all should co-operate with each other with the ultimate aim of giving to the public the best possible service and at the lowest possible cost.

Home of Interior Lumber Operator Destroyed by Fire

Divisional headquarters of the provincial police here have been informed of the destruction by fire last Saturday of the home of John P. Myers, well known Prince George lumber operator. Damage to the building is estimated at \$7250 and to the contents \$1500.

ASTORIA, Ore., Sept. 8:—Another deadlock between fishermen and packers such as tied up the Columbia River salmon fishing industry at the opening of the present season was looming last night as the opening of fall fishing impeded on Sunday next. The Columbia River Fishermen's Protective Association, at a meeting here, decided to demand prices of 3c per pound for chinook salmon, 4c for silver sides and 5c for steelheads whereas the packers have offered prices of 2c, 3c and 4c respectively.

Alaska Pack Over Five Million Cases For Present Season

JUNEAU, Sept. 8: (CP)—Alaska's salmon pack this year totalled approximately 5,068,497 cases, the Bureau of Fisheries reports. H. W. POLICE ARE FLAMES IN PROTECTORS U. CHURCH

Inspector Shirass Tells Rotary Club Something of Organization and Work of Provincial Force

"We are your protectors, servants of the public," declared Inspector John Shirass, officer commanding "D" Division of the provincial police, in an address before the Prince Rupert Rotary Club at its luncheon yesterday afternoon. The Inspector outlined briefly the history of the provincial force since its organization in 1858 during the regime of Sir James Douglas, Governor of Vancouver Island. It was organized by an Irishman, Chester Brew, who was shipwrecked on his way from England to this country. In 1910 Inspector Hussey improved the organization and this was again improved by Colonel J. H. McMullin, the present commissioner of provincial police, who was appointed to that work in 1923. Under him the department was wholly divorced from interference or outside influence.

The various duties of the police were outlined by the Inspector such as the motor license department, which kept track of nearly 120,000 cars of various kinds and collected nearly two million dollars revenue. They also had to undertake relief investigations, did work under the board of agriculture such as distributing feed for stock in districts where there was none, distribution of seed grain to destitute farmers, mothers' pensions, old age pensions, matters pertaining to the insane and many other matters outside the usual routine of crime prevention and detection.

The department here is kept in touch with headquarters four times daily by radio. Part of the outfit consists of a police boat. In conclusion, the Inspector laid stress on the desirability of organization and the need of co-operation.

Moose Official Is Speaker Here

A. E. Ratcliffe, Auditor From Mooseheart, Heard at Meeting on Wednesday Night

The local Moose Lodge Wednesday night heard an address on matters of interest to members by A. E. Ratcliffe, auditor on the staff at Mooseheart, Ill., who has been making a tour of various lodges in this district. The meeting was presided over by N. S. K. Brewer, dictator, and there was a good attendance of members. Mr. Ratcliffe, who has been at Anyox, Stewart and Alaska as well as here, sailed last night on the Prince George for Vancouver. Wednesday night's meeting also discussed plans for a forthcoming boxing tournament.

Outbreak Caught Yesterday in Incipient Stages—Activities of "Fire Bug" Suspected

Another fire of mysterious origin occurred in the city at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon when damage which may amount to \$200 or so was done to the entrance vestibule of First United Church at the corner of Sixth Avenue and Musgrave Place. By the time the fire department was called, the flames had worked their way up between the joists and it was necessary to tear out some plaster and lath as well as part of the tin roof in order to get the hose on the fire. Except for smoke, damage was confined to the vestibule and the main auditorium of the church was affected little. Some insurance was carried. In view of the series of mysteriously caused fires which there has been in the city recently, the authorities are investigating the possibility of "fire bug" activities. Had yesterday's fire at the church not been seen soon after the outbreak, the damage might easily have been much more serious.

**A GREAT BRITISHER**

There never was a man like Viscount Grey of Fallodon, news of whose death was received yesterday. An aristocrat of the old-fashioned type he was also in many respects a commoner and a modernist of the most advanced type. Living a life of detachment a good deal of the time, his sympathies were all with the under-privileged men and women of the kingdom and of the world. He loved the country, revelled in the beauties of nature, was on close terms with the birds and animals and other living creatures, yet few men of his day wielded as great an influence as he in politics or in international relations. He took a broad outlook on all matters of public concern but absolutely refused to be drawn into the vortex of petty politics.

At the time of the outbreak of war, Viscount Grey was Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs and he strove vainly to prevent war although unsuccessfully. Once the country was plunged into the conflict he backed the allies to the limit and was opposed to those who asked for peace at any price.

As Ambassador to Washington, Viscount Grey helped to cement the good feeling between the two English-speaking countries. On his retirement from that position he retired from public life, married again and devoted himself to purely rural interests.

It was said of Lord Grey at one time that he could have been premier had he chosen but he chose to go fishing instead.

**JAP CHILD DROWNED**

Three and a Half Year Old Kanako Mitsuata Loses Her Life in Skeena River

Kanako Mitsuata, three and a half year old Japanese girl of Port Essington, fell into the Skeena River from the oil dock there yesterday and was drowned, the body being recovered four hours later and brought into the city this morning. An inquiry was held this afternoon by Coroner Norman A. Watt, the circumstances of the tragedy being found to have been accidental. The remains are being sent back to Port Essington for burial.

**Tea Restriction Raising Prices**

TORONTO, Sept. 8.—In April a restriction was placed on tea exports from Ceylon, India and Java, in order to raise prices to growers, who, for almost four years, had been suffering devastating losses. Higher prices have resulted, not only at the gardens, but also here on our own markets, and many package teas already cost more than they did six months ago. Some of the finer quality brands are as yet unchanged, however, and are, consequently, even better value than at last April.



pay. A new means of transport, the motor-driven vehicle, has been developed which has taken away from the railways a certain amount of the most profitable traffic while transportation by water has been greatly developed and has become a serious competitor in certain fields. These conditions, plus the depression, with its consequent shrinkage in railway traffic, have created difficulties and have imposed on the managements of the railways the necessity of doing things which all concerned would have preferred not to do but everybody has recognized the urgency of the problem to be met and the employees generally have shown a very proper appreciation of the situation and have co-operated to a great extent in carrying out measures which involve sacrifices on their part in the prevailing situation. The two great railway systems have learned to co-operate. They have adopted methods that a few years ago would have been thought too radical for consideration but the departures from established practice have been found to be beneficial as good evidence that progress is being made. You have seen the two railways establish pool services between Toronto and Montreal and between Toronto and Ottawa.

"You have seen the railways establish pick-up and delivery services, using local truck companies to perform the road haulage function in the midst of innovations and transition. You have also seen a return of some old timer practices like cheap excursion rates—some of them as low as a cent per mile. The railways are also co-ordinating terminal services, establishing joint agencies, using each other's lines and facilities. Much has been accomplished to date while studies are proceeding and more may be expected in the near future.

"Before a number of the economies that have been obtained could be made effective it was necessary for the public to change its attitude. This change has come with the lesson which nearly every one has learned, that it is bad business for any one to live beyond one's means. There may be a disposition on the part of some to feel that the railways were slow to realize what the motor propelled vehicle was doing but it is not easy to see unerringly the changing conditions. For the railways to adopt without care and examination any or all of the suggested methods of holding this competition at bay might have led to a more serious financial catastrophe. As I have already indicated we are finding in co-ordination of all existing methods of transport the best hope for the future."

#### Not Pessimistic

In conclusion, Mr. Eungerford stated that he did not share the pessimism felt in some quarters about Canada having more railway mileage than can be economically supported at present. With the change in conditions, he believed the financial load would become rapidly less. He believed there were signs of a general improvement already and said that Canadians have every reason to expect that trade and traffic will soon reach higher levels.


