LADYSMITH, Vancouver Island, Sept. 8:-This Vancouver Island coal mining town was stirred by a murder mystery following the finding of the body of Douglas Syme, aged 24, around midnight last night lying on French Street, one of the city's principal thoroughfares. He had been stabbed through the heart and had been dead but a short time when found. The provincial police are investigating the mystery of the killing. No arrests had been made up to this morning.


