DE CESPEDES CUBA'S NEW PRESIDENT CANADIANS ARE FORCED TO ADOPT U.S. RECOVERY PLAN

De Cespedes President of Cuba Today and His Predecessor at Nassau

President Roosevelt Orders Three Warships to Protect American Citizens in Havana Following Revolutionary Gesture

HAVANA, Aug. 14.—Dr. Carlos Manuel de Cespedes, veteran diplomat, was inaugurated yesterday as provisional president of Cuba. A group of men, supposed to be members of Machado's strong arm squad of Porristas, fired upon de Cespedes' home soon after the inauguration. Order has been pretty well restored and the city is fairly quiet.

WHAT NEW PLAN MEANS

More Stable Price For Silver Planned by Output of Consenting Nations Being Restricted

It would be a mistaken assumption to believe that the agreement, the only agreement reached at the World Economic Conference, will mean an increase in the output of silver, says the Victoria Colonist. It will mean the maintenance of a more stable price, but possibly a restriction in the production. The agreeing countries are Canada, the United States, Mexico, Australia, India, China, Spain and Peru. There is to be a restriction of the sales of silver in the world for a period of four years. The contracting parties will absorb from the mining output the equivalent of what is needed to sustain sales at a fair price. The bullion thus purchased will be reserved for conversion into coin.

Silver has been definitely declining in value in recent years. In 1922 the Canadian output was 18,626,000 ounces, valued at \$12,576,785. In 1930 the output of 26,000,000 ounces was valued at \$10,086,867. The value Continued on page 2

The report has been submitted to President Roosevelt. Edward Allen, chairman of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce Alaska committee said.

Port Simpson Lady Passes

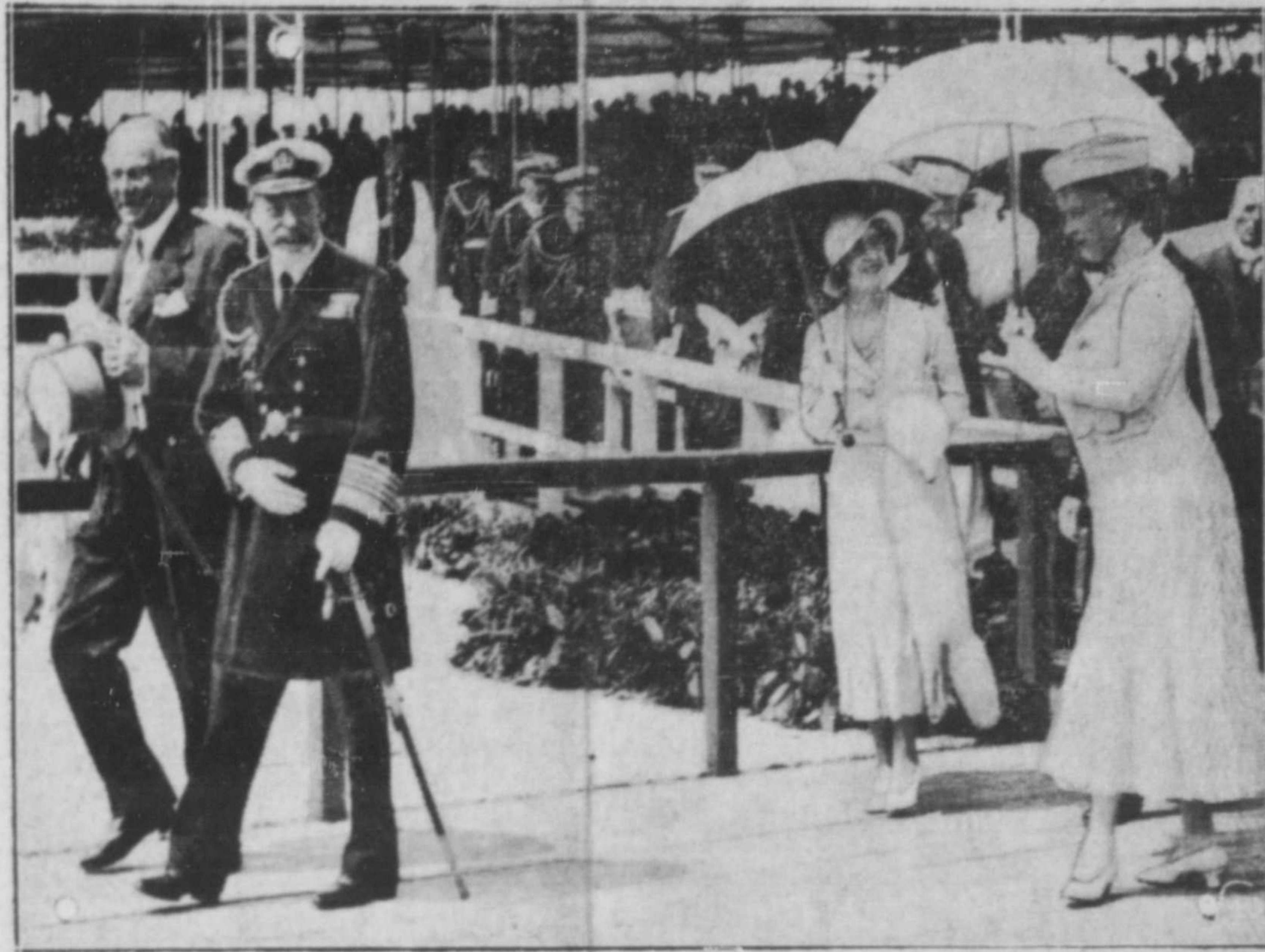
Miss Grace Beynon Was Very Prominent in Many Organizations in Neighboring Village

VANCOUVER, Aug. 14.—Addressing a public meeting here yesterday Dr. Clem Davies, pastor of the City Temple at Victoria, independent candidate in the provincial elections, advocated a non-partisan government, a federation of British Columbia and the prairie provinces distinct from the Dominion and abolition of the lieutenant govern-

ment system. He claimed that a federation of British Columbia and the prairie provinces would "save themselves from the dominating financial tyranny of the east."

Dr. Davies was a Methodist clergyman who relieved for a period at the Centennial Church, Victoria. At the end of that period he wished to stay and his congregation wished him to remain. After a long fight most of his congregation followed him to the City Temple. They held services for a long time in the Royal Victoria Theatre and later a building was purchased which has become a church home.

At the last election Dr. Davies' name went before the Liberal convention but he was not chosen as candidate.

An official announcement is not likely to be made until after the meeting of shinglemen in Vancouver this week but it is understood a decision has been made to introduce the six-hour day with a compensating wage increase.

NAVY WAS AT STEWART

Officers and Men Were Entertained For Several Days at Portland Canal Mining Town

Visited Premier

Everyone Visited Ships Including Children and Were Entertained By Officers of Vessels

STEWART, Aug. 14.—The past week has been Navy Week for Stewart. At 5 o'clock on Monday afternoon H. M. C. S. Skeena in command of Commander G. C. Jones, R. C. N. and H. M. C. S. Vancouver, in command of Lieut.-Commander Gauvreau, anchored off the Stewart dock. Immediately after anchoring the destroyers were officially welcomed by the municipal council of Stewart, the president of the Premier Community Club and the U. S. Commissioner from Hyder, Alaska. The Stewart branch of the Canadian Legion also sent a representative aboard to welcome the ships, and to place the Canadian Legion Hall at the disposal of the sailors during their stay here.

A full program of entertainment for officers and ratings was arranged, but some last minute changes were found to be necessary owing to rainy weather on Wednesday and Thursday. On Tuesday afternoon three cars transported the officers to Premier where they were shown over the mine and mill and entertained for the afternoon, while at the same time trucks transported 86 ratings to the Texas Creek Glacier, allowing ample time for the men to visit the glacier and spend some hours on the ice. This trip was particularly successful as fine weather prevailed all day.

On Tuesday evening, officers and ratings were the guests of the people of this district at a monster dance at the North Star Dance Hall. At this affair many old friendships were renewed, the Skeena having been to Stewart last year, while many new friendships were made.

The sports program for Wednesday had to be cancelled on account of rain. However, to make up for this the Premier Community Club announced that the personnel of the two ships would be their guests at the talking picture theatre at Premier, transportation was arranged by the Stewart committee and many sailors took advantage of this offer. A dance at Stewart that night, run by the "Strollers" was also well patronized by the navy, the "Strollers," as their contribution to the general entertainment, inviting all navy ratings to attend at half price.

PATTULLO'S PRONUNCIAMENTO

The announcement made last week that Liberals who run as independents will not be recognized officially by the party but will be opposed at the coming election was a very timely one. In these days of change and indecision it is helpful to hear from a man who knows his own mind and is strong enough to strike from the list of supporters all those who refuse to conform to the wide doctrine of Liberalism.

If a candidate runs as a Liberal he must accept in a general way the Liberal platform as enunciated at the Vancouver convention and must accept the leadership of T. D. Pattullo, who was appointed at that convention. The program was laid down by the delegates from the various districts throughout the province.

Other so-called leaders have not been chosen in that way. They represent nothing in particular except themselves.

GENERAL McRAE'S VIEWS

On Saturday this paper published an interview with General A. D. McRae in which he expressed himself strongly in favor of party government. He said he was not interested in the present election because there were no Conservatives in the field. He is a Conservative and evidently believes in his party and its work.

We admire the General for sticking to his guns. We too believe it is better to have the people lined up into two groups, those who believe in a forward policy, calling themselves Liberals and those who look to the past for guidance instead of looking forward. Those are Conservatives.

At the same time we recognize the perfect right of any other group to enter the field if it wishes to do so. We respect their opinions and aspirations. What we object to is those who, as a matter of expediency, throw over an honored name and try to adopt a new one just for the sake of retaining office or securing election. For such we have nothing but contempt. Why try to hide beneath a name?

had fallen from 67 cents to 57 cents per ounce. During the past three years the output of silver in Canada has fallen, until last year it was only 18,000,000 ounces. The demonitization of silver commenced after the Franco-Prussian War and has been proceeding steadily. It has probably depreciated about 50% since that date (1873). The present proposal of the World Economic Conference is the withdrawal of some 35,000,000 ounces of silver from the market. This scheme must be rectified by the various governments concerned in the agreement. The success of the scheme rests on the ability of the silver-using countries to exercise their purchasing power.

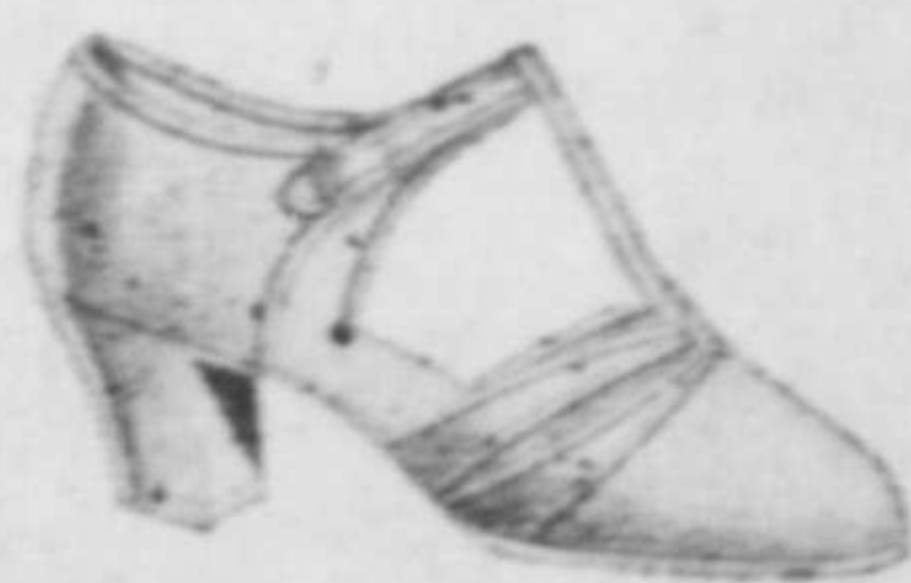
