Britain Well on Road Toward National Recovery; Shown in Renewed Activity Everywhere

Unemployment Decreased, Trade Increased, Railway Traffic Greater and Treasury Returns Show Expansion in Revenue

LONDON, Oct. 23.—Unassisted by eagles, blue or otherwise, and without recourse to any act of government save the somewhat belated efforts of the Ministry of Agriculture to dragoon the farmers of the country into rationalizing the production of bacon and milk, the people of Britain are marching towards national recovery with an unmistakable stride. Since the beginning of the year, nearly three-quarters of a million of the unemployed have found work and, except in the shipyards, where new construction is at its lowest ebb, and in the Lancashire cotton mills, where the spinners are at death grips with

Japanese competition in almost every quarter of the globe where piece goods are sold improvement in trade is everywhere perceptible.

Railway traffics have shown remarkable recovery; in the iron and steel trades the outlook is described as being brighter than at any time since 1929 and the retail trade returns such as those of the provision stores and the great drapery houses, which were the last to reflect the depression and should therefore be the last to record a revival, are on the upward grade.

But the strongest confirmation of the national betterment is found in the half-yearly treasury returns just issued, which show a revenue increase of over £20,000,000 and a reduction in expenditure of £48,000,000, and although the result of any year's budget depends largely on the success of the big revenue collection of the last quarter, the statement exhibits so outstanding an improvement that even at this early stage it provides legitimate grounds for hopes of tax reduction next year.

Particularly striking has been the increase of £7,000,000 in customs revenue. The Chancellor budgeted for an increase of £730,000 in a full year. He has secured ten times this amount in six months. What this really means is that Great Britain is now "cashing in" on her hidden reserves.

CAMPAIGN ECHOES

THE C. C. F. NOT DEMOCRATIC

Rudderham's campaign committee says the C. C. F. is a democratic organization. Yes! In the same sense the Moscow organization is democratic, which is in no sense at all.

His committee also denies the existence of the Council of Nine, probably because it has lately been increased to twelve; hence the quibble.

Let us repeat it. The provincial executive of the C. C. F., popularly known as the Council of Nine, was self appointed long before they held the Victoria convention. Their constitution was published in their organ the "Commonwealth" on June 14, 1933 whereas the convention in Victoria was not held until the last of September of this year.

That convention passed a resolution to the effect that this provincial executive must not be responsible to the elected representatives of the people.

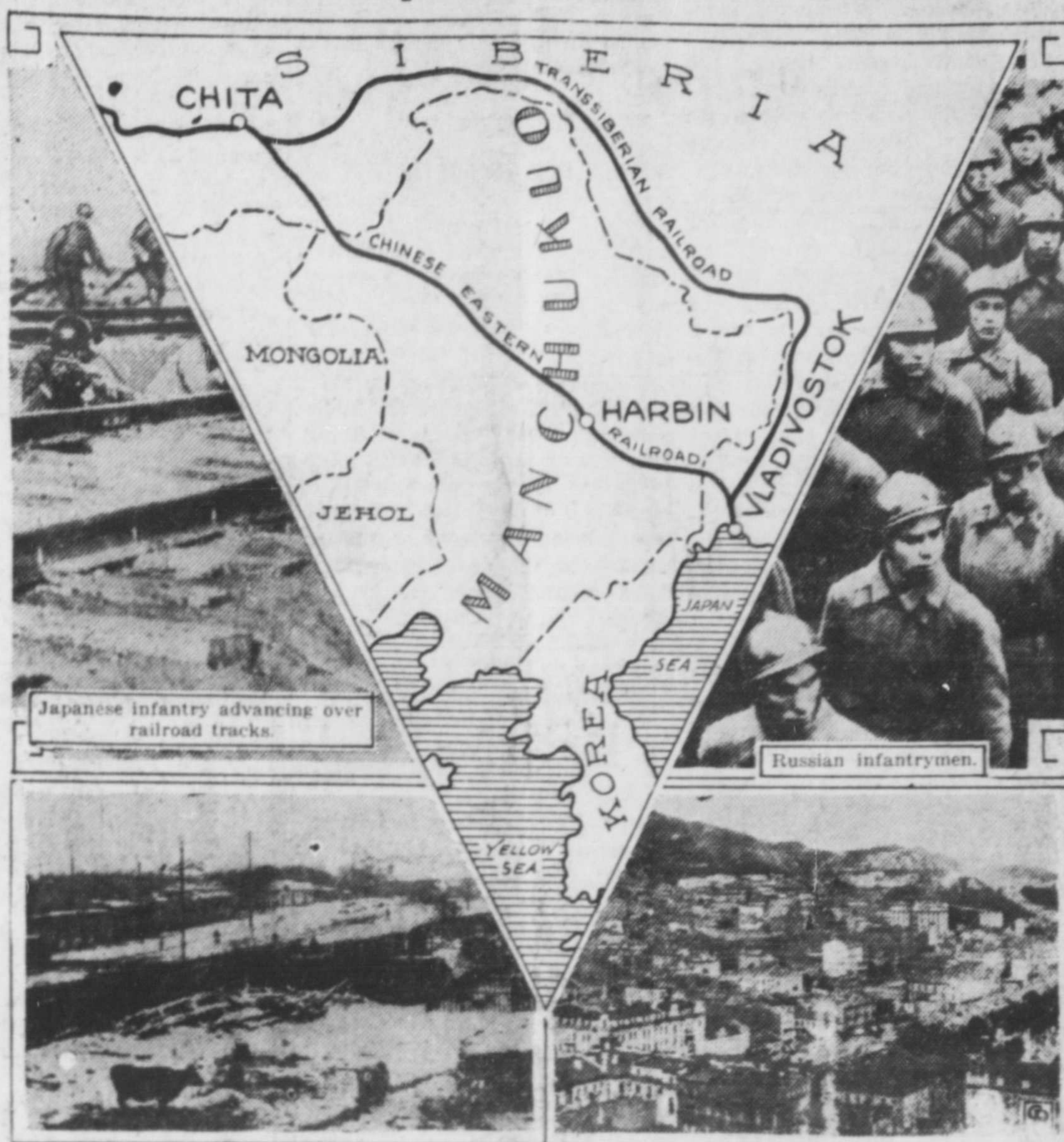
What semblance of democracy is there in this? Rudderham's supporters had to get the approval of this council before he could run as the C. C. F. candidate.

Is this the way democracy chooses its candidates? We frankly admit that it is running true to Soviet form where a few men at the head of the Russian government impose their will upon their followers. Out of all the millions living in Russia today only a few thousand well trained supporters are allowed the franchise.

Not to be outdone by this undemocratic hole-in-the-corner method of the Soviets, the local Socialists called a meeting consisting of eight individuals who nominated Rudderham. They did not invite to this meeting all those interested in labor but confined it strictly to the eight aforementioned.

Will the campaign committee of Rudderham deny the truth of this? And, if so, will they please state the exact number present at the meeting which nominated their candidate? Please give a straight answer. Quibbling will not do. Was it seven or was it eight?

Fear Russia-Japanese Break Over Railroad



While the war menace hovers over Europe, the situation in the Far East is also becoming serious. Possible severance of Russo-Japanese diplomatic relations has been feared following the publication in Russia of documents which Soviet authorities believe purport to expose an alleged Japanese plot to seize the jointly-owned Chinese Eastern railway in Manchukuo. Although the documents have been branded as forgeries by Japanese officials, Soviet authorities are said to be considering action to foil the perpetration of the plot. The map in the layout shows the railroad's location.

Former Premier of British Columbia Dies Suddenly Today Following Heart Attack

VANCOUVER, October 25.—W. J. Bowser, former Premier of British Columbia, died suddenly at his hotel here at 1:30 this afternoon after suffering a attack early this morning. He was born in Rexton, New Brunswick, December 3, 1867.

Warships Have Left Cuba Now

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 25.—Six United States naval vessels were yesterday ordered to be withdrawn from Cuban waters after having spent the past six weeks there following the political crisis in that republic. Seven of this country's warships are still left at Havana and other Cuban ports.

HITLER IS ACCLAIMED

Popularity of German Chancellor Said to be Greater Than Ever; Appeals For Endorsement

BERLIN, Oct. 25.—Appealing to the nation to endorse his action in withdrawing Germany from the disarmament conference and the League of Nations, Chancellor Adolf Hitler was given an enormous ovation by the population of Berlin yesterday as he passed through the streets. The demonstration of loyalty that was accorded the chancellor indicated that his popularity is even greater today than it was previously.

Hitler reiterated, in a public address, his often-expressed view that Germany had not been responsible for the precipitation of the Great War and that the nation was unfairly treated by the arms limitations as set down in the Treaty of Versailles and endorsed by the great powers of Great Britain, France and United States.

PARIS, Oct. 25.—Twenty-two persons were killed and thirty-three seriously injured when the Cherbourg-Paris Express was wrecked sixty miles west of Paris at dawn yesterday. The engine and three coaches toppled over a viaduct.

STRIKE IS SPREADING

General Walk-Out of Workers in Cuba Appears Likely Despite Decree of Government

HAVANA, Cuba, Oct. 25.—The proposed general workers strike in Cuba appears to be spreading despite a decree issued by the government yesterday declaring all strikes illegal. Store workers started a 24-hour strike today in protest at the methods employed by the government in attempting to put down a mill strike. Garbage collectors and street cleaners at Santiago have also gone out on strike.

SNOW DELAYS TRAIN

Owing to snow conditions between Skeena City and Kwinitsa, last night's train, due from the East at 10 p.m., was delayed three and a-half hours, not getting in until 1:30 this morning.

COLLISION OF SHIPS

British Freighter Crashes Into U. S. Warship and Does Damage—Three Killed

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 25: (CP)—One of the newest and largest American cruisers, the Chicago, was badly damaged and three of the crew were killed yesterday in a collision with the British freighter Silver Palm in a dense fog near Point Sur. The freighter cut into the armor plate hull of the cruiser and tore a great hole in the port side. The Silver Palm was not badly damaged.

Both vessels were steaming towards San Francisco.

Michigan Rules Nudism Indecent

Operator of "Sunshine Colony" Near Kalamazoo Convicted By Courts Yesterday

KALAMAZOO, Mich., Oct. 25:—Nudism in the state of Michigan took a body blow yesterday when the courts ruled the practice indecent and contrary to law. Fred S. Ring, operator of a "sunshine colony" near this city, was found guilty of indecency and will be sentenced today. He is appealing the conviction and has been released on \$1000 bonds.

Raymond, Long Shot, Winner of Cambridge-Shire Stakes Today

Manitoba Man Cleans Up Fortune in Betting—Denbigh Second and Stalky Third in Classic of British Turf

NEWMARKET, Eng., Oct. 25: (CP)—Raymond, a long shot of 33 to one, won by two lengths over Denbigh in the Cambridgeshire Stakes race here today. Denbigh was quoted at 20 to one. Stalky, a rank outsider at 50 to 1, was three-quarters of a length back for third place. The race is one of the classic events of the British turf and much betting always attaches to it.

DUBLIN, Oct. 25: (CP)—Ira N. Kirk of Crandall, Man., won first prize of \$140,000 in the Irish Hospitals Sweepstake with a ticket on Raymond, winner of the Cambridgeshire Stakes, today. Kirk was the only Canadian to hold a ticket on the winner.

A Montreal man had a ticket on Denbigh, the second horse, winning \$70,000. No Canadians held tickets on Stalky, the third horse.

PIONEER OF CITY

Carl C. Johnson Passes Away at Age of Seventy-Three

Carl J. Johnson, one of Prince Rupert's real old timers, passed away this morning at 6 o'clock in the Prince Rupert General Hospital where he had been a patient for some three months.

Born in Sweden in 1860, the late Mr. Johnson came to Canada in 1887 and to Prince Rupert in 1908 and had resided here ever since. He followed the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway practically across the continent.

Predeceased by his wife two years ago, Mr. Johnson leaves no relatives in Canada. The remains are resting at the parlors of the B. C. Undertakers and funeral arrangements are in the hands of Lodge Valhalla of which deceased was a charter member.

IS SPEAKER AT STEWART

Falconer Declares If Elected He Would Assist to Restore Order in the Province With Business Methods

STEWART, Oct. 25.—T. W. Falconer, one of the Independent candidates in the Atlin riding, has returned to his home at Alice Arm after spending some days in the Portland Canal district campaigning. He held a public meeting in Stewart last Wednesday evening and one at Premier on Thursday.

At the Stewart meeting W. R. Tooth was chairman. In opening his remarks Mr. Tooth stated that when he had been asked by Mr. Falconer to act as his chairman, he told Mr. Falconer that he was a supporter of W. J. Asselstine, the Liberal candidate. However, Mr. Falconer had said that was all right with him so Mr. Tooth said: "If I am as good a sport as that, I guess I am too." With Mr. Falconer's permission, Mr. Tooth took a few minutes to tell the audience of the telephone conversation between the acting mayor of Vancouver and himself as chairman of the Stewart municipal commissioners.

Mr. Falconer then addressed the audience. He heartily condemned party politics. "I am sick and tired of party politics," he said, and urged the electors to support independent legislators who would not be tied to any party. He promised, if elected, not to spend his time antagonizing the government of the day but to try to bring the needs of the district to the attention of the government amicably. He stated that the present system made of the Legislative Assembly a sort of comic opera and stated that he would assist to restore order and business methods to the House. He said that he would devote his attention to matters of interest to the district not to "misspend funds, campaign funds and remuneration of silver and other matters of little interest to the general public." He vigorously denounced patronage as one of the diseases of the body politic and stated that the only remedy was to do away with party politics. He was in favor of a board of works to pass upon undertakings before the public works department started on construction and of purchasing agents for government supplies needed in each district, such agents to be instructed to purchase by tender.

Favors Conversion Loans

To relieve the present burden of debt Mr. Falconer was in favor of conversion loans at low rates of interest, such loans to be offered on the domestic market only. He ridiculed the suggestion put forward, he said, by Mr. Pattullo that four hundred million dollars be borrowed for public works, pointing out that, at 5% interest, this would nearly treble B.C.'s annual interest payments. "The people of B.C. have had enough of Pattullo and his party who loaded us up with sixty million dollars debt on the P.G.E.," he said, and further predicted that, if the Liberals were elected, there would be another election within a year.

He scored party caucuses which would be abolished under a non-party system.

Referring to unemployment Mr. Falconer said that the only remedy must come from the federal government. Financing of public works by the province to relieve unemployment would be prohibitive. There were only three solutions: first, unemployment insurance; second, the dole, and third, shorter working hours. Of these, he claimed, the last was the only practical one at the present time though he was in favor of unemployment insurance when it was feasible.

Raps Opponents

Turning to his four opponents Mr. Falconer sized them up as follows:

"Mr. Shenton's platform won't work, social equality being impossible.

"Mr. Asselstine is a dyed-in-the-wool Liberal, a party man and a supporter of Pattullo and the party machine.

"Mr. Rolston is also an independent. He (Falconer) had tried to arrange a convention but it was impossible in a district of this size. But he believed that he could give Atlin better representation than could Mr. Rolston.

"Mr. Kergin is a hard and fast Liberal and a party man."

Mr. Falconer regretted that the electors seemed to be lacking in interest in this election but he be-

SUBSIDIZED PRESS

T. J. Shenton, C. C. F. candidate in Atlin, in a speech made at Stewart, lays himself open to criminal prosecution by stating that the Daily News is subsidized by T. D. Pattullo. It is a statement common to persons who do not know what they are taking about but make guesses which they think will be popular. Because the News has been successful and because it occasionally sells advertising space to candidates, space which is open for anyone to buy, is quite different from receiving a subsidy.

We suggest to Mr. Shenton that he be more careful of his words when addressing public gatherings. We welcome criticism but object to spiteful misstatements.

Those who know anything about newspaper work realize how difficult it is to secure payment for legitimate services, much less securing subsidies.

When the News went under its present management over fifteen years ago it was suggested that it was impossible to operate a paper successfully in Prince Rupert without a subsidy. We have proved that this was not correct.

We have nothing against Mr. Shenton personally. So far as we know he is an excellent citizen but we know that the person who is always accusing other people of objectionable practices is the one who, if he had the chance, would be open to the same kind of abuse. To show that we do not feel very badly at the Shenton accusation, we are giving a longer report of his Stewart meeting than the space at our command justifies. We might easily drop this report in the waste paper basket but all we have done is to eliminate a few of the superfluous paragraphs. We receive no subsidy for publishing the report but as we have a large circulation in the Atlin riding we think the people there are entitled to know what their candidates stand for. We are doing the same for Mr. Falconer.

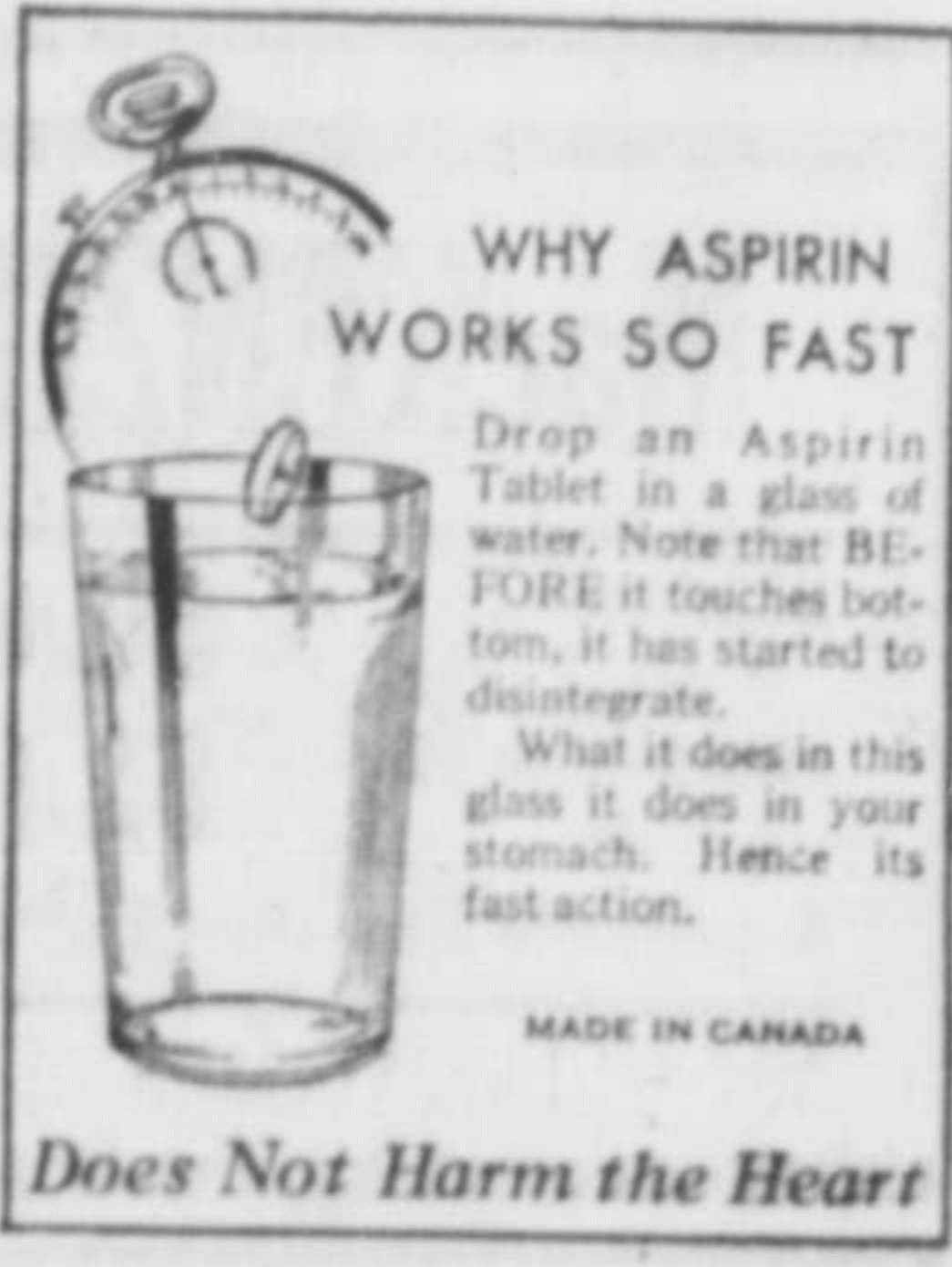

FUNERAL OF LOCAL GIRL

Large Congregation Pays Final Tribute to Memory of Late Miss Margaret Gilchrist

The passing of one of Prince Rupert's best known and most popular girls was mourned by a congregation which filled St. Andrew's Anglican Cathedral to capacity at 2:30 this afternoon when funeral rites for Miss Margaret Gilchrist, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Gilchrist, were held. Miss Gilchrist passed away suddenly last Saturday morning after having been in ill health for some time.

The funeral service was conducted in an impressive and sympathetic manner by Very Rev. James B. Gibson, dean of St. Andrew's. The full choir, under Choirmaster A. J. Lancaster, was in attendance and Peter Lion presided at the organ. Hymns were "Lead, Kindly Light" and "Rock of Ages."

Following the church service, interment was made in Fairview Cemetery, a long concourse following the cortege to the final resting place. Pallbearers, all well known local young men, were Joe Scott, Melvin Dafeo, Jack Musallem, Allan Cross, Philip Edgcombe and James Westman.

A Brief Synopsis of Liberal Policy

HEREWITH is a brief synopsis of policy as laid down by the Liberal Party of British Columbia, in convention held in October, 1932.

Many matters of interest, not specifically set out, will require consideration. The principles enunciated are indicative of the Liberal viewpoint, and are broad enough to meet every question within provincial jurisdiction.

The Liberal Party exists as an official organization for the purpose of formulating and furthering measures that will make for the well-being of each individual member of society, and the welfare of society as a whole.

Innumerable questions, both of public and personal character, can be properly treated only through the agency of government.

Government is not an ordinary business, but carries responsibility to meet every problem arising from our complex social and economic conditions, in order that not merely a few, but all of our people may live in reasonable comfort.

The Liberal Party pledges immediate action under the best available advice and closest study.

1.—Profitable and permanent employment is the most important question facing our people. There should be co-operation between the national, provincial and municipal authorities and the Canadian banking system to establish the necessary credit to carry out a broad programme of constructive and useful wage-distributing public enterprise, and to further the health, education and well-being of all our people.

An Economic Council should be established, the membership of which shall consist of representatives of the various avenues of endeavour, such as health, education, agriculture, labour and the industries. This council will be appointed by the government on recommendation of the interests involved, and will act in an advisory capacity to the government.

Amongst other things the council will study industrial and social effort in the province and suggest means to correlate these efforts. It will familiarize itself with intra, inter-provincial and foreign trade, and will co-operate with the other provinces and the Dominion. It will also study such questions as production and consumption, and the marketing of our products, the number of hours of work per day and days of work per week, the standard of wages and commodity prices. These questions are of national as well as provincial concern, and British Columbia can take the lead in urging co-operation with the other provinces and the Dominion as a whole.

National Unemployment Insurance should be established upon a contributory basis.

2.—Our Financial position must be reviewed. Current expenditure must be kept within current revenue. While maintaining the credit of the province, effort must be made to reduce capital charges. We cannot continue to pay exorbitant rates of interest for money.

3.—The Taxation Structure must be revised with a view to reduction wherever possible, including exemption in the lower scale of wages and salaries.

4.—The health of each of us is important to the whole community, and a measure of State Health Insurance should be made effective, not only to preserve health, but to reduce costs both to the average citizen and to industry.

5.—A general and effective review must be made of the Educational problem, rejecting any proposed organization that involves a caste system. We must facilitate the intellectual growth of each individual member of society in order to equip him for his daily tasks, and for the enjoyment of such cultural pursuits as may be in keeping with our social customs.

Triangular disagreements between the school boards, municipal councils and the department of education must be adjusted, and our whole system placed upon a sound financial basis.

6.—The financial position of our Municipalities is of increasing concern. An equitable adjustment must be made as between the province and the municipalities, and the municipalities placed in a sound financial position.

7.—An effort should be made to settle our Agricultural Lands in order that more of our citizens may be self-supporting. Agriculture as a whole must be put upon a sound and profitable basis, and made capable of sustaining and directing itself, in line with all other national, basic industries.

8.—Continuous effort should be put forth to assist industry in Marketing its products, in timber, agriculture, fishing, mining and, in fact, every operation where it appears that useful service can be rendered.

9.—Our highways must be kept in good condition, both for the benefit of settlers and the tourist traffic, and expanded as circumstances warrant. In this connection a Highway Board should be established to make for continuity of policy and to inspire confidence in impartial treatment.

10.—A Public Utilities Commission should be established.

11.—A National Central Bank should be established.

12.—Social Services, such as Mothers' Pensions, Old Age Pensions, etc., must be maintained. Abuses of administration should not be allowed, and injustice through mere technicalities should not be permitted.

13.—The Peace River must be given access to the Coast.

14.—In order that the utmost Freedom of Action by Members of the Legislature may be assured in respect of questions before the House, it is Liberal policy that a government shall be considered to be defeated only upon a straight want-of-confidence motion.

15.—The Dominion Government will be asked to place the Province of British Columbia upon a basis of equality with the other provinces, and to this end request will be made for a Royal Commission to ascertain the extent to which the Province of British Columbia has not been given Equality of Treatment with the Other Provinces of the Dominion.

16.—There shall be a permanent Voters' List to ensure that all eligible voters are enrolled.

17.—The Leader of the Liberal Party is given a free mandate to choose for his associates in government, men of character, ability and standing, having regard solely to the public interest.

SUSPECT IS BEING HELD

Thirty-Seven Year Old Wrestler is Questioned at Boston in Connection with Lindbergh Case

BOSTON, Oct. 25.—Another suspect is being held here for questioning in connection with the 20-month old kidnaping case of Charles Augustus Lindbergh Jr., baby son of Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh, in the person of John Gorch, 37-year old wrestler.

Although authorities state that there have been no important clues in the case, the investigation is proceeding.

BIG STORM AT TERRACE

Roads Blocked by Snow—Apples and Spuds Frosted—Meeting Called Off

TERRACE, Oct. 25.—A snow blizzard began Monday during the forenoon which increased to a howling gale with blinding snow towards night. The blizzard held through the night and yesterday morning the country presented the most snowed-up appearance ever recorded for October. All roads were blocked to auto traffic and it was remarkable for the reason that it was two months out of season.

There are some crops still unharvested. Probably 50 per cent of the winter apples are still on the trees, and ruined by the hard frost. About 25 per cent of the potato crop is also frosted and the whole crop of turnips; but the turnips may come through without harm.

Monday night was scheduled for F. T. Kenney's address as Liberal candidate in the forthcoming election with supporting speakers but the meeting was postponed until tonight as the train was very late and it was difficult to get a crowd together with the snow blocking all traffic.
