POST STILL WELL AHEAD

World Flyer Had Topped His Own Record by Twelve Hours on **Reaching Irkutsk**

IRKUTSK, Siberia, July 19:-Wiley Post, Oklahoma round the world flyer, was winging his way last night from here to Blagoveschensk, a hop of 1,000 miles, in continuation of his projected attempt to lower the record for globe circumnavigation set two years ago by himself and Harold Gatty in the same plane which he is now flying solo, the Lockheed-Vega machine Winnie Mae. On arrival here yesterday from Novo Sibirsk, having covered the distance in six hours and 42 minutes, he was twelve hours ahead of the record. He hopped off from here at 11 o'clock last night and was reported as having passed Verkneudinsk, Eastern Siberia, at 12:50 a.m. Wednesday.

Khabarovsk was awaiting Post's arrival this morning. From there his next jump will be the perilous stage across the fog and cloudladen Bering Sea country to Nome which dashed the hopes of James Mattern, young Texas world flver. who is still held up at Anadyr following the crash of his plane near there over a month ago.
