# KILLED HIMSELF

Vancouver Man Suspected as Being One of Robbers

(Canadian Press Despatch)

Vancouver, June 30.-While unoncerned in an attempt to rob he Traders' Bank, Charles Clark, young Vancouver man, last light committed suicide in his oom at 236 Pender street. He ook his life with a revolver.

Clark was under arrest on the ominal charge of vagrancy. He ras one of a gang of young fellows, nost of whom had previously been rrested and taken to the station n a vagrancy charge.

When the officer arrested him, lark made no attempt to get way, and consented to go peacebly. He requested the detective oblige him by getting a drink water. No sooner had the ficer left the room, than he eard the sound of a pistol. astening back he found Clark ing on his bed, bleeding from the rehead. He had literally blown at his brains.

The men had been shadowed the police for some time past a suspicion of having robbed veral stores and of attempting rob the Traders' Bank on the ght of the 21st June.

# A Letter from Far Away England

THE SINGLE TAX A SINGLE TAX

Liverpool, England. June 10th, 1911

Sir,-Under the title, "The Single Tax and the Assessment" it was good to read the leader in the Prince Rupert Daily News of May 15th. In it the writer set out to explain the Single Tax. I am a single-taxer. I agree with every word save—that the writer did not explain the single tax.

While giving ink to this horrible impiety which would seem to imply that an editor is not infallible in his own newspaper, I am Phone No. 200 guarding my head with both hands, as well as may be, from the wrath

of heaven. And even then my courage would not be equal to the XXXXXXX daring did I not know that the outraged editor of the News is some thousands of miles away. Let me explain:

The Single Tax means the abolition of all taxation upon the work of men's hands. It does not mean merely the removal of local taxation from buildings and other improvements but signifies much more.

The Single Tax is a single tax. Although all local taxation be is still raised upon other things that is not the Single Tax. A man is not a teetotaler who drinks whisky only at meals; he may eat most of the day. And so if local taxation only is levied on a just basis it will not be long till the children of privilege engineer many local charges on to the national revenue.

When a people does attain to the Single Tax there will be but one transaction so far as concerns the individual. The charge will be levied by each local authority upon the value of all land within its jurisdiction. Then in turn the local authorities will contribute to the state exchequer; and the assessment of a local authority will be simply the sum total of all assessments in its district. This means, in addition to the freeing of buildings, machinery, farm drainage and steading, mining plant, etc., from local charges, the abolition of all customs duties, all excise, all income taxation, all carriage licenses; of all taxation on railway tickets, on receipts and cheques; of all FRIDAY, JUNE 30 stamp duties on deeds, agreements, conveyancing of land and fixed property, etc. There would cease to be taxation on a man's petrol and a child's sugar stick.
