# FISH CATCH RESTRICTED

Pacific Halibut Catch For Present Season Limited by Order-in-Council at 46,000,000 Pounds

OTTAWA, July 3: (Canadian Press) - In accordance with terms of the international halibut treaty of 1930 between Canada and the United States, an orderin-council has been approved restricting the catch of halibut on the Pacific Coast for the calendar year 1933 and up to the end of fish to be taken during the period to be limited in Area No. 2 to 21,700,000 pounds and in Area No. 3 to approximately 24,300,000

Should the International Fisheries Commission decide not to limit the catch in the areas separately, restriction on the general catch will be set at 46,000,00


