CRISIS AFTER CRISIS AT WORLD MEET

ITALIAN FLIERS LAND IN IRELAND ON WAY TO CHICAGO

Airmen Led by General Balbo Sighted Sunday In Foyle River Mouth

Second Lap of Atlantic Trip From Amsterdam to Londonderry Safely Accomplished—Iceland is Scheduled For Next Stop

LONDONDERRY, Ireland, July 3: (Canadian Press)—General Italo Balbo's twenty-four seaplane aerial squadron of Italian fliers reached the estuary of the River Foyle here from Amsterdam yesterday on the second lap of its trans-Atlantic voyage to Chicago for the Century of Progress Exposition. The first lap of the flight, had been made on Saturday from Italy to Amsterdam where one of the ships capsized on striking the water, killing Sergeant di Quintavalle and injuring three of the crew. The squadron planned to leave today on the third lap of the trip from here to Iceland, a distance of 950 miles.

Frantic Efforts Being Made To Prevent the London Conference From Dissolving Into Failure

President Roosevelt Appeals to Gathering Not to be Diverted From "Broad Purposes"—United States Chief Executive Refuses Demand For Stabilization

LONDON, July 3: (Canadian Press)—Crisis followed crisis at the world economic conference today and late in the afternoon the British delegation was hurriedly summoned in a final effort to save the conference. Sub-committees were adjourning with frank declarations that it was useless to proceed under present circumstances.

Despite the apparent immediate hopelessness, the belief was expressed in some quarters that, if the conference could be kept alive until the middle of July, something definite might be done by that time along the line of stabilizing the United States dollar with the British pound sterling unless President Roosevelt should decide to plunge in the meantime into his full inflation program. Meanwhile, President Roosevelt has refused to meet the French demand to "peg" the American dollar on the ground that such action would be detrimental to the success of his domestic economic recovery program.

President Roosevelt, in a communication made public today, asserted that it would be a "world tragedy" if the world economic conference allowed itself to be diverted from its broad purposes by proposals for the stabilization of the money of a few nations.

The Bank of England was stated last night to favor the stand of France and the European bloc in favor of the retaining of the gold standard.

Before the marketing committee of the world economic conference today, Hon. Edgar N. Rhodes, Canadian minister of finance, squarely laid responsibility for the collapse of the timber markets at the door of Soviet Russia.

Markets Are Buoyant
NEW YORK, July 3: (Canadian Press)—Financial markets turned buoyant today in celebration of President Roosevelt's veto of im-

mediate currency stabilization. Stocks spurted from one to seven points as the United States dollar slumped sharply in foreign exchange markets and grains leaped forward.

FISH CATCH RESTRICTED

Pacific Halibut Catch For Present Season Limited by Order-in-Council at 46,000,000 Pounds

OTTAWA, July 3: (Canadian Press)—In accordance with terms of the international halibut treaty of 1930 between Canada and the United States, an order-in-council has been approved restricting the catch of halibut on the Pacific Coast for the calendar year 1933 and up to the end of February 1934, the quantity of fish to be taken during the period to be limited in Area No. 2 to 21,700,000 pounds and in Area No. 3 to approximately 24,300,000 pounds.

Should the International Fisheries Commission decide not to limit the catch in the areas separately, restriction on the general catch will be set at 46,000,000 pounds.

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

A rather unusual fish which was brought in last week by Capt. A. Wick of the local halibut boat R. W. has been identified by Norman L. Freeman, local representative of the International Fisheries Commission, as a greenling (hexagrammos Stelleri) of the greenling (hexagrammidae) family which comprises a number of carnivorous fishes, most of which are of large size living in kelp and about rocks in the North Pacific, some being highly valued as food. The range of the greenling is from Kamchatka and Unalaska to San Francisco and it is known to be quite abundant in Puget Sound but rather rare among the Aleutian Islands and scarcely known south of Cape Mendocino, Calif. The common ling cod is another member of the same family.
