Industrial Recovery Act, providing a sum of \$3,300,000,000 to finance public works and other industrial undertakings throughout the country and authorizing a number of forms of new taxation to finance same, passed the House of Representatives yesterday by a vote approximating four to one.

The measure now goes to the Senate where the tax clauses are expected to meet with considerable opposition and where the bill will probably be under discussion for several days.


