ERUPTION IN ALASKA IS EXPECTED

UNITED STATES STOPS BOND INTEREST GOLD PAYMENTS

Volcano May Become Active As Result of Earthquake Tremors

Old Timers Recall That Recent Disturbances are Similar to Those Which Preceded Blowing Off of Mount Katmai Top Years Ago

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, May 4: (Canadian Press) With tremors felt intermittently since the earthquake of last week, the heaviest in years, another severe shock was felt yesterday morning in Western Alaska. Houses were shaken and sleepers awakened. Old timers are looking forward to the early eruption of some volcano in the westward from Cook Inlet. It is recalled that earth tremors similar to those of the past week felt daily preceded an eruption which blew off the top of Mount Katmai volcano a number of years ago, volcanic ash at that time being spread all along the Alaska coast as far as British Columbia.

OATH IS REMOVED

Irish Free State Completes Repudiation of Allegiance to British Crown

DUBLIN, May 4: (Canadian Press)—The bill removing the oath of allegiance to the King from the constitution of the Irish Free State became law last night when Governor General Daniel Buckley signed it. President Eamonn de Valera later declared that he would ultimately ask the people for authority to proclaim a republic.

 LONDON, May 4: (Canadian Press)—Rt. Hon. James H. Thomas, Secretary for the Dominions, announced in the House of Commons today that the government had been advised that abolition of the oath of allegiance to the British crown by the Irish Free State Dail Eireann does not amount to an act of secession.

GRADUATION OF NURSES

Annual Ceremonies Held Last Night in First Presbyterian Church

Nine Graduates

Reception in I.O.D.E. Hall Follows Diploma and Pin Presentations

Annual ceremonies in connection with the graduation of nine student nurses from the training school of the Prince Rupert General Hospital and one from the Port Simpson General Hospital training school were conducted last night in First Presbyterian Church before an audience which was so large as to necessitate additional seating facilities being provided in the spacious auditorium. The graduation exercises were followed by a reception in the Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire Hall, at which another large gathering assembled to celebrate the occasion and offer felicitations to the graduates.

The graduates were Misses Edna E. Carpenter, Louis M. Lindseth, Bernice A. Ross, Oral H. Ross, Annie Mostyn Walker, Agnes M. Guyan, Helen M. G. McAuley, Isabel E. Tyner and Iris A. Watts of the Prince Rupert General Hospital and Miss Winnifred Bunn, who took her first two years' training at the Port Simpson General Hospital and her final year at the Vancouver General Hospital.

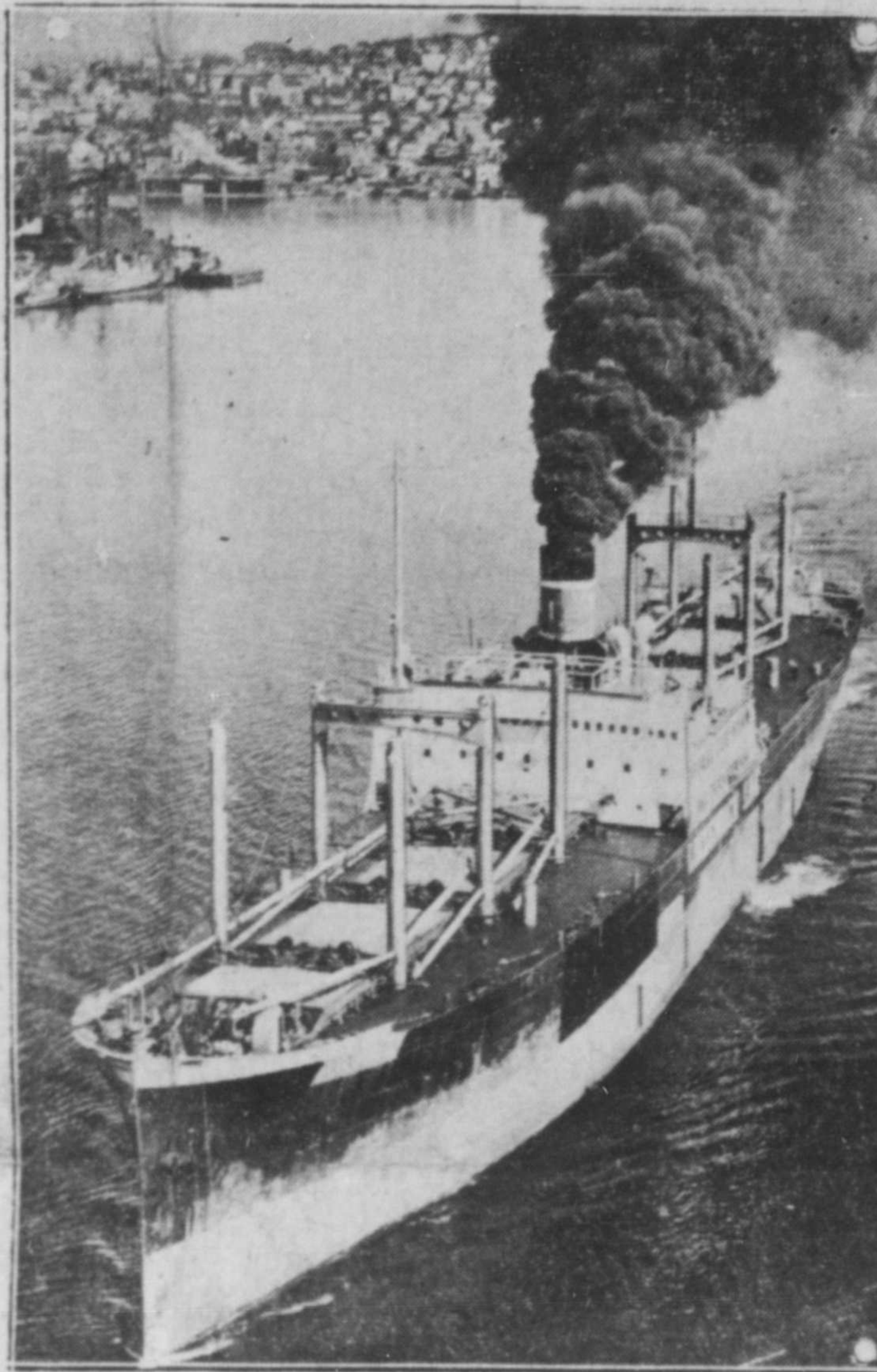
As the graduating class marched into the church, having been preceded by members of the graduate and undergraduate staff in a body, a procession was played by J. E. Davey, organist of the church. Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth, who presided, called upon Very Rev. James B. Gibson, dean of St. Andrew's Anglican Cathedral, to pronounce the invocation. The chairman then made a few brief but appropriate remarks, congratulating the members of the graduating class and alluding to the interest which was taken in them by their friends and the community at large as evidenced by the size of the gathering.

Address to Graduates

Following a vocal solo "Who is Sylvia?" by D. B. Finn, accompanied by Mrs. Finn, the address to the graduating class was delivered by Rev. C. D. Clarke, pastor of First United Church. Mr. Clarke reflected upon the meaning and significance of a diploma such as each member of the graduating class was about to receive. Its presentation marked the end of one era and the beginning of another in the career of the young nurse. With the diploma would always be attached recollections of three years of learning, work, discipline as well as happy associations. The diploma might be considered as a token of accomplishment and qualification to render a definite service to mankind. The speaker dilated upon the meaning of service, especially as regards nursing. "Breach of Contract" Say London Papers of Washington Move

American Administration Holds Position That Security Holders Abroad Should be Treated on Same Basis as Those at Home

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 4 (Canadian Press)—There will be no gold exports from the United States for pay-abroad. The administration has taken the position that bonds held abroad should be treated the same as those in the hands of persons in the United States. There will be no ments of interest on Liberty (government) bonds held gold payments of interest on bond in this country.

LONDON, May 4: (Canadian Press)—"Breach of contract" is the blunt phrase used by both the Financial Times and the Morning Post in attacking the United States government on the ground that, in future, interest on American bonds is to be paid in paper. "It would be difficult," the financial editor of the Post declares, "to find a parallel for so unblushing and callous a breach of contract. It has disturbed the very basis of credit and sanctity of contracts."

POISON IS DISCOVERED

Findings of Vancouver City Analyst Make Circumstances of Teacher's Death More Baffling

VICTORIA, May 4: (Canadian Press)—Poison was found in the stomach of Stewart Ashley, young Vancouver school teacher, whose body was found in a slough here on April 23, according to the testimony given today at the adjourned inquest by J. F. B. Vance, analyst of the Vancouver police department.

Inspector Vance was of the opinion that the poison was taken in the form of a capsule while Ashley was sitting on the slope of the bank and that the body rolled down the hill into the slough.

Ashley disappeared from his home in Vancouver on the night of April 13 and it was at first thought that he had been kidnapped.
