

American Administration Holds Position That Security Holders Abroad Should be Treated on Same Basis as Those at Home

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 4 (Canadian Press)-There will be no gold exports from the United States for payabroad. The administration has taken the position that bonds held abroad should be treated the same as those in the hands of persons in the United States. 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
