MR. WOODSWORTH'S VISIT

The city had a visit on Sunday from J. S. Woodsworth, leader of the Canadian Co-operative Commonwealth political party. He differed from some politicians in that he had a definite message, unacceptable to many, but still a real message of a method he is prepared to recommend to cure the present economic ills.

Mr. Woodsworth was a Methodist parson. From that he graduated into the role of labor leader and today he is a professional politician leading a definite political party. He made a good impression on those who heard him as a man who knows his subject well, knows human nature and who thinks he has a panacea for the ills of the country.

Production of Bulkley Valley Coal Mine is Limited Only by Market Demand For Fine Fuel

(By G. A. Hunter)

TELKWA, Aug. 8.—Employing a crew of twelve men at present, the Bulkley Valley coal mine of Frank Dockrill, located on Goat Creek, about seven miles from the town of Telkwa, is now making a steady production of thirty tons daily and is in a position to increase its output to meet any possible market demands for this fuel, the superior heating properties of which are well known and the popularity of which is steadily increasing.

The present workings from which coal is being mined are on the main slope which is now in one thousand feet from the portal. The principle of advance and retreat is being followed in the operation with headings off from the main slope at frequent intervals. With the portal entering from the sharp hillside, this main slope follows the main seam of fourteen feet width and runs through the seam with coal on both sides and the ceiling.

The coal is taken out of the mine and dropped into a 250-ton bunker at the portal, being screened before being dumped into bins containing lump, egg and slack fuel. Trucks run up to the mine bunker to load and carry the coal along a good road to the Telkwa station whence shipments are made to all points along the line of the Canadian National Railways.

Camp buildings include well appointed and comfortable cook and bunkhouses. Although Bulkley Valley coal has

Burghley Sorry To Leave Track

Is Member of Parliament and Also In Business and Has Little Time to Spare

LONDON, August 8.—"It is a wrench," said Lord Burghley, M.P., the famous hurdler, with reference to his proposed leaving the track after being defeated in the final of the 440 yards hurdles by Facelli, of Italy, in the Amateur Athletic Association championship meeting at the White City, London. Except for one exhibition he will never again be seen in track athletics.

He admitted feeling sad at saying goodbye to the track. "I have had so much joy that I know I shall miss it," he said. "But sooner or later every athlete has to make up his mind when to retire. It is the same with the Rugby footballer, the cricketer, and the runner. Politics and business combined have simply not left me the time to continue hurdling."

Lord Burghley, who is 29, is Conservative member of Parliament for Peterborough and is also in business. On the track he has won more than 200 cups and trophies and many championships. He was captain of the British Olympic team at Los Angeles last year. Lord Burghley won the Olympic 400 metre hurdles in 1923 at Amsterdam, Holland.

Lindstrom, another New Hazelton prospector, was sent out to Takla Lake. There was grub in the McConnell Creek camp. Lindstrom, crossing three summits with a 30-pound pack, made the 125-mile trip from McConnell Creek to Takla Lake in five days, arriving at the latter point the day after Pilot Kenneth Dewar, with the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. plane, had made his first search flight for the Spencer machine. The next day, Dewar, taking Lindstrom on board, proceeded to North Fork Lake, on which he chose to land rather than McConnell Lake, eight miles distant, and took the two injured airmen and prospectors on board, delivering them to Takla Lake whence they proceeded via Fort St. James to the railroad at Vanderhoof, McCluskey and Staines going to Vancouver and McMillan and McLennan coming to their home here.

It is understood that Pilot McCluskey is to be provided with another Junkers plane with which to continue his flying operations for the Spencer prospecting and mining interests.

### Smithers Convention Notes

Much Discussion Took Place in Regard to Jury System—Highway Versus Railway—Unemployment Relief—Auto Licenses

SMITHERS, Aug. 8.—As might have been expected, a resolution sponsored by the Smithers and Prince Rupert boards urging the abolition of the jury trial system in favor of a committee of three judges proved the most contentious subject of discussion at the recent convention here of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia, culminating in a tie vote of the convention which was broken by the casting vote of the president, H. W. Smaile of Fort Fraser, in the negative.

Opponents of the jury system argued that it was extravagant, obsolete and the "last refuge from justice for criminals." Jury verdicts, it was claimed, were showing an ever-increasing tendency to be contrary to the aims of justice. "Why should not three experienced judges be in a better position to decide criminal justice than twelve inexperienced laymen?" asked the opponents of the jury system.

Proponents of the jury system maintained that, to abolish same, would leave too much responsibility and too much authority in the hands of the judges. Dangerous ground was being trodden and there was really nothing better to offer. The British jury system was steeped in the sanctity of tradition. L. B. Warner and L. S. McGill, both of Smithers, the latter a member of the legal profession, led in the fight against the jury system. J. O. Wilson of Prince George, another barrister-delegate, neither took part in the discussion or recorded his vote, explaining that he had been uninstrued by his board in the matter. Members of the Vanderhoof delegation, who were opposed to the change, were not present when the vote was called.

The convention, on recommendation of the resolutions committee, took no action on a resolution in regard to the railway mail service

which, it was pointed out, was about to be changed anyway.

A Vanderhoof resolution asking the construction of a highway to connect the Peace River country with the existing British Columbia highway system did not receive much support and was tabled by majority vote. Delegates, other than those from Vanderhoof, felt that it was advisable to concentrate instead on the pressure for completion of the highway which would ultimately connect Prince Rupert with Alberta.

After all, contended John A. Fraser, M.P. for Cariboo, of what service would an ordinary highway be in getting out the vast wheat crops of the Peace River? A railway outlet for the Peace River was of such overwhelming greater importance, was there good reason to ask for a project which might possibly detract from the chances of obtaining that?

A resolution from Burns Lake, in which the charge was made that lower schedules of unemployment relief were being paid in the interior than elsewhere in the province, was, after brief discussion, withdrawn. The resolutions committee reported that it was not well enough informed upon the actual facts to present any recommendation. Furthermore, the whole system of unemployment relief policy was in process of being overhauled.

The proposal, made in a resolution from Vanderhoof, that original automobile licence plates be issued on a permanent basis at a nominal scale of fees, the gasoline tax being increased to compensate the government for loss of revenue on account of the lower licence fees, also engendered discussion of considerable length and was, finally, approved on majority vote. The principal argument in favor of this resolution was that it would result in

those actually using the roads contributing in a greater degree to the cost of highway building and maintenance. Also it might encourage owners of many cars, which had not been licensed for the present on account of the heavy annual dues, to get the vehicles back on the roads.

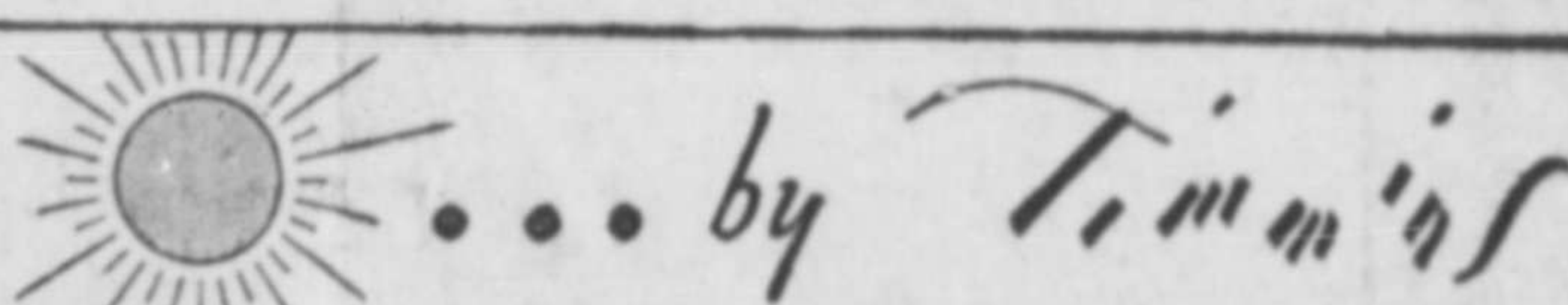
