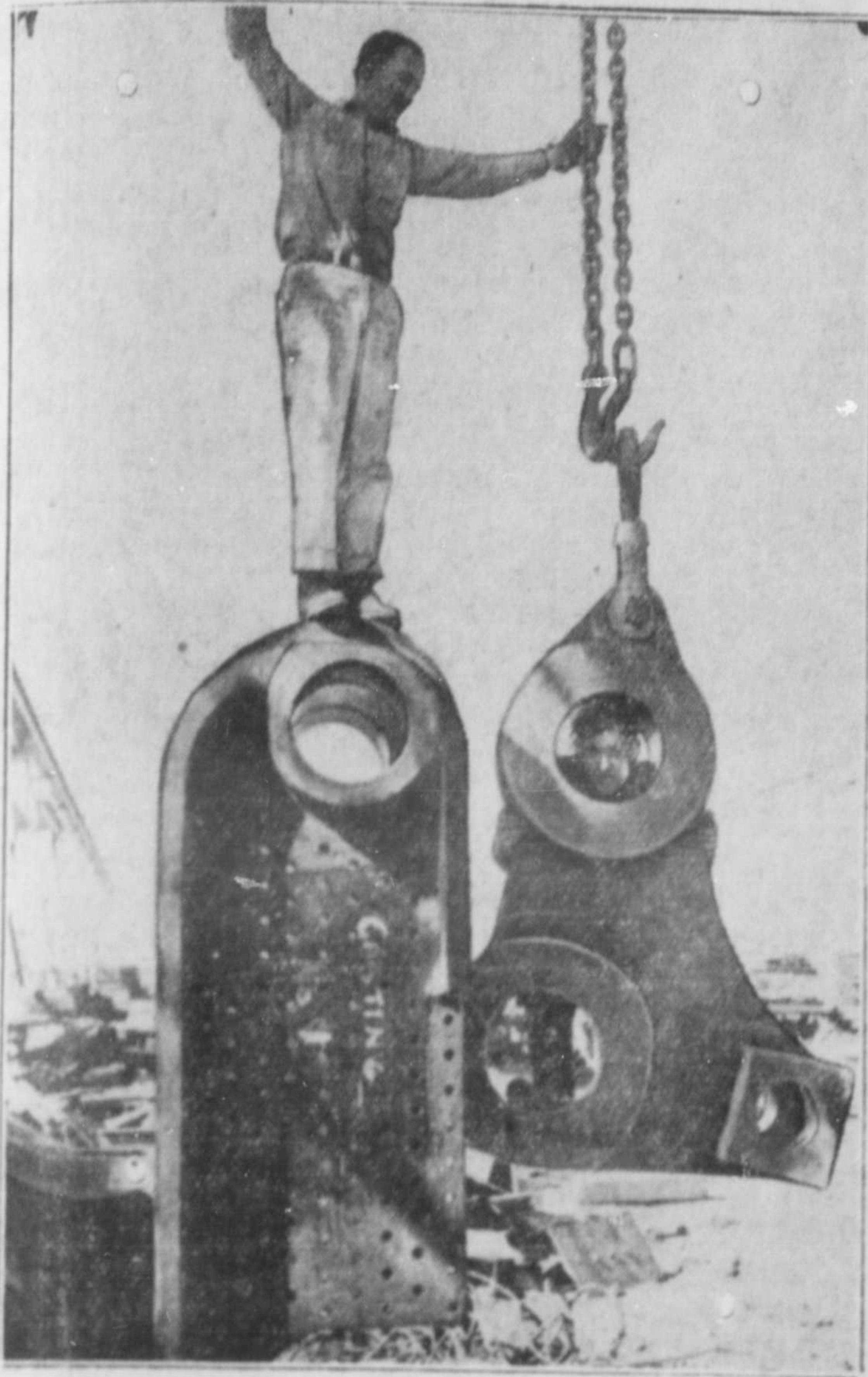

Legislature Will Be Called To Meet For Final Session Feb. 23

Redistribution Law Promised and Balanced Budget Expected If Finance Minister Can Manage to Make it Possible

VICTORIA, Jan. 24.—The provincial government has decided to call the final session of the Seventeenth Legislature to meet on Thursday, February 23. One of the important measures to come before the legislature will be the redistribution bill under which it has been proposed to cut down the number of members of the legislature and thus save expense to the province.

ATTACK ON JAP POLICY

Military Party Severely Criticized in Upper Chamber of Nipponese Parliament

TOKIO, Jan. 24.—Members of the Japanese Diet were astounded at an attack made in that chamber yesterday on the military party which controls the administration, particularly in regard to its policy in regard to Manchuria. The speaker declared that the policy in regard to Manchuko showed power but little of benevolence. He claimed that the actions of the military party in Japan had alienated public sympathy in all other Oriental countries. It was responsible for the anti-Japanese feeling in China and for the suspicion in Soviet Russia.

The attack was the first open one made upon the Japanese military foreign policy in recent months and caused a great sensation.

OCEANIC IS TO OPERATE

Cannery Will be Under Management of Tom Wallace But Field Strang Has Dropped Out

Word has been received here that Oceanic Cannery which has been closed for several years will be operated this season by Messrs. Wallace and Gillespie of Vancouver.

Last year the cannery was leased by Tom Wallace and Field Strang but was only used as a fishing base. This year it is understood that Mr. Strang has dropped out and Mr. Gillespie has taken his place.

Senator Bureau Died Yesterday; Was a Minister

MONTREAL, Jan. 24.—Honorable Jacques Bureau, Senator and former minister of customs and excise in the cabinet of Mackenzie King, died here on Monday at the age of seventy-two.

Senator Bureau was born at Three Rivers, Que., June 9, 1860, the son of J. Napoleon and Sophie Bureau. He was educated at Nicola College, and graduated as a Bachelor of Laws. He was called to the bar in Quebec in 1882, became solicitor general of Canada in 1907 and retired on the defeat of the Laurier government in 1911. He was elected to the House of Commons four times in 1900, 1904, 1908 and 1911.

LORD MAYOR IS JOSTLED

Independent Candidate Struck Out at Members of Gang Who Fled From Police

DUBLIN, Jan. 24: (CP)—The Irish Free State went to the polls today and it was not long before the usual flare-ups attaching to Irish voting made their appearance. Up to this evening, however, no serious disturbances had been reported.

Outstanding in the incidents of the day was the attack on Hon. Alfred Byrne, Lord Mayor of Dublin and an independent candidate. A group of toughs jostled him as he went to cast his vote. Byrne struck out vigorously and with a policeman approaching the gang fled.

STERLING BOUNDS UP

Advance of Over Three Cents Overnight in British Pound At New York

NEW YORK, Jan. 24:—In the most active buying in recent months the British pound sterling bounded up from the opening today and when the New York market opened some hours later it showed an overnight gain of 3 1/4 c.

The initial New York quotation of \$3.39 1/2 for London cables was the tallest figure reached since last October. The Canadian dollar sold off five-sixteenths of one percent at the opening at 86 1/2 c.

DIFFERENCE SETTLED IN U.S. COURTS

Ruling Made That Seizures May be Made Within One-Hour's Sailing

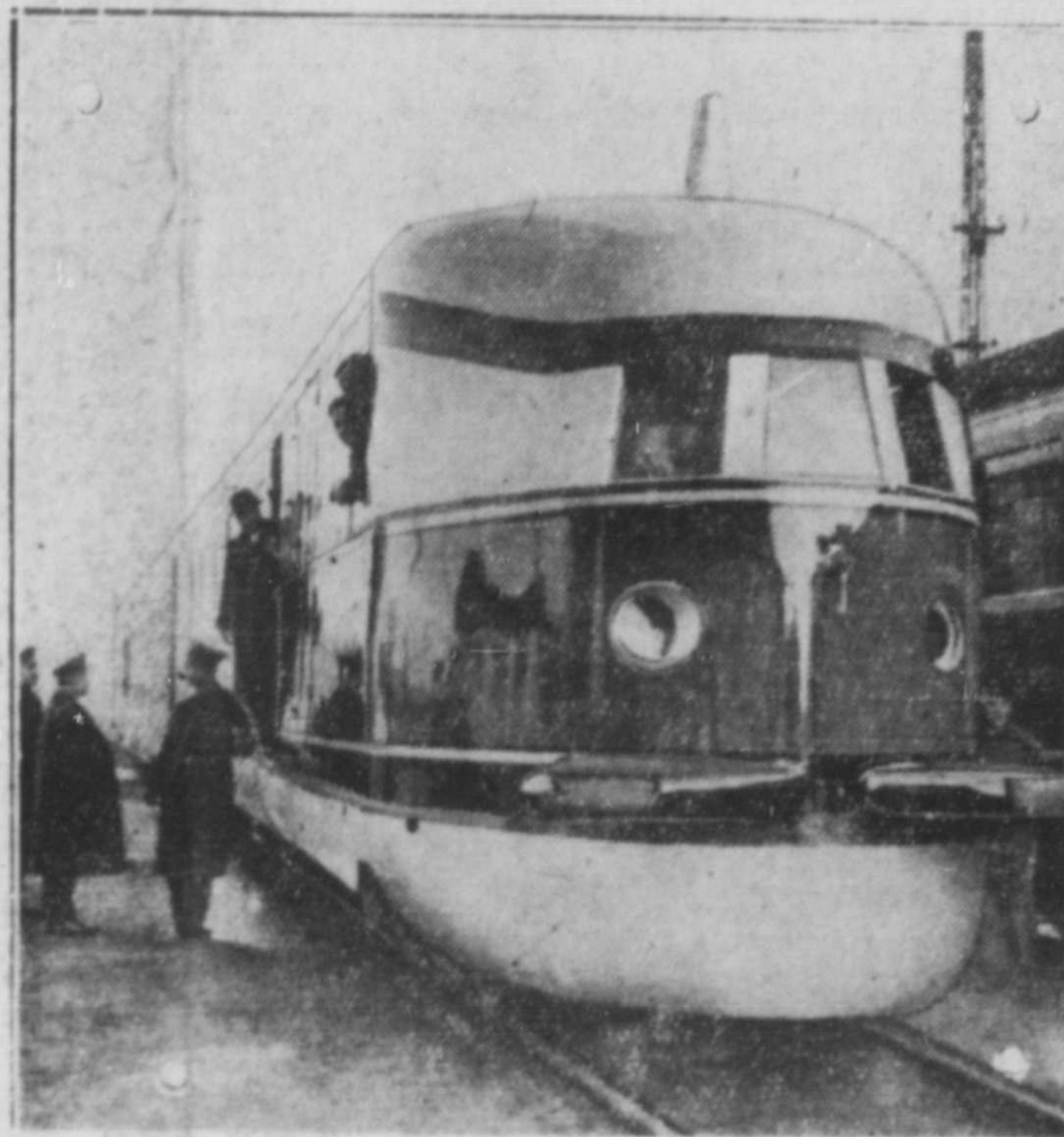
WASHINGTON, Jan. 24:—Difference of opinion between Canada and the United States has been avoided by the Supreme Court ruling, that seizure of Canadian and British vessels, suspected of rum running, may not take place more than one hour's sailing distance from shore. This is in accordance with the Anti-Smuggling Treaty of 1924, but in the seizure of the Canadian vessel Mazel Tov, eleven and a half miles off Massachusetts, the United States claimed that the tariff law of 1930 providing for seizure within the 12-mile limit superseded the 1924 treaty.

The Mazel Tov has a speed of only eight to nine knots.

BANK SHUTS DOWN UPON VANCOUVER IS COLONEL NORTH B.C. REGIMENT

Refuses to Advance More Money on Capital Account so Works Must be Stopped

VANCOUVER, Jan. 24:—The bank advances to the city of \$2,000,000 for capital-work covered by \$3,225,000 worth of unsold general debentures have been exhausted and the Bank of Montreal has declined to provide any additional funds on the bonds. As a result the city will have to halt the work on the Kingsway widening and will probably be unable to construct any more sewer or water facilities. This does not affect the bank advances for operating expenses made in anticipation of the tax revenue collections.

The debentures were not sold because of the poor market at the present time.

MacDonald to Leave England End of February

Will Go Early to United States to Make Preparations There For Conference

LONDON, Jan. 24:—The Daily Mail states that Premier Ramsay MacDonald will leave for the United States at the end of February to prepare for the conference with the United States government on the matter of readjustment of war debts.

It is understood the Premier will have strong governmental support at the conference, but the personnel has not yet been definitely selected.

Canada Will Maintain Sound Money Position Says Premier Bennett

Canada Has Plenty of Currency and is Solvent so Will Meet Her Contracts, Toronto Board of Trade is Told

TORONTO, Jan. 24:—Canada will maintain her sound money position, will not inflate her currency, will maintain her proud position in the eyes of the world and will meet her obligation in the terms of the contract, Premier R. B. Bennett told the Board of Trade here last night.

Only two reasons existed for inflation—lack of currency or insolvency. "There is no lack of currency in the country and Canada is solvent," the Premier stated. "Unless abnormal conditions are obtained and unless something that cannot be foreseen happens," Mr. Bennett said, "this country cannot, dare not, part from sound money."

DECIDING FATE OF IRELAND

Impossible to Secure Unbiased Opinion as to Outcome at Polls In Emerald Isle

DUBLIN, Jan. 24:—It is very difficult to get anything like an unbiased opinion as to the probable result of the election which is taking place here today. Both sides profess the greatest confidence that they will secure a majority in the Dail but there is a possibility that neither will have a working majority and that the fate of the government will be in the hands of the independent groups.

In some parts of the country intimidation is being charged but such action usually acts as a boomerang and injures chiefly the party responsible for it.

There have been election riots in different parts of the country, many broken heads, but no violence of a very serious nature. Every possible voter is being taken to the polls and the air is tense with excitement.

LAME DUCK LAW PASSES

Terms of U. S. President and Congress Will Henceforth End in January Instead of March

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24:—The change in the constitution, generally known here as the Lame Duck Law, became effective yesterday with the ratifying of the measure by the state of Missouri. This was the thirty-sixth state to ratify the measure, the approval of that number of states being required by the constitution to effect a change.

The law provides that the presidential and congressional terms shall end in January instead of March and thus avoid the necessity for the short or lame duck session of Congress which follows the elections in November after which a number of the congressmen are not the real representatives of the people and possibly, this year, the president has been defeated and is only awaiting the lapse of time to step out and give place to his successor.

This twentieth amendment to the constitution becomes effective October 15 next.

African Trader Tells of Club Which is Exclusive To Slayers and Thieves

TORONTO, Jan. 24: (CP)—"Gangsters are not modern," says Robert Lindsay, a trader with the United African Company, now living in Toronto with his brother Alec. Lindsay, who is 28 years of age, states there has existed for years in Nigeria on the west coast of Africa an organization quite as ruthless as the self-styled kings of Chicago.

The Adun tribe on the Cross River in Nigeria can boast of a civilization to the extent of owning a society of parasites known as the Brambi society. The Brambis, according to the British government are responsible for at least 95% of murders committed within the area of the Adun people. "To be a member of the society," says Lindsay, "a man has to obtain at least one head, steal a valuable article, and pay in to the treasury \$100.

"If the applicant fails to obtain a head he more than likely loses his own in the attempt," Mr. Lindsay says. There are also many rules (Continued on Page 2)

RAILWAY SITUATION

There seems to be some doubt as to what action will be taken by the federal government in regard to the railways. The commission which was appointed to make recommendations reported against amalgamation of the two big companies but favored compulsory co-operation. Since that a number of representations have been made in favor of complete amalgamation or amalgamation for a term of years. The latter we do not like. It would probably mean that Prince Rupert would remain a C. N. R. town with the railway operated by the C. P. R. under such conditions we could not expect much progress. What we should much prefer is, if there is to be amalgamation, that it be complete and conclusive without any "if" or "but." It would be better to remain as we are than to find ourselves "betwixt two stools," neither one or the other.

LEAGUE DIFFICULTIES

The League of Nations finds itself in a difficult position with Japan openly defiant and other nations sceptical or critical. It started out with a wonderful ideal but it seems to have failed to understand the primitiveness of human nature. It was not so many years ago that Britain was taking possession of weaker foreign countries where there were disorders, spanking them soundly and then taking charge of their affairs and showing how government was conducted in a British country. Today Japan is doing the same, not from altruistic motives but to secure business and power and prestige. So Britain did. Then it was found that neither the business, power or prestige was worth the price paid so Britain joined in with the other powerful nations to form a league which would prevent the expense, danger and suffering caused by the use of force. Japan will soon come to a realization of the futility of fighting the world and will fall in line with the other nations but in the meantime she seems to be resolved to make Manchuria a part of her empire.

to abide by in this queer initiation. The applicant cannot take the head of a dead man or that of a child. Usually the society has already picked the person they want killed so there is no chance of a mistake being made.

The British officials have hanged three of the gang since the murders have come directly to their attention. Mr. Lindsay says the government cannot take too great a chance for fear of offending the natives who are not responsible. "If the government were to accuse the wrong native, the rest of the village would, in all probability, come out in a general uprising."

The gang taxes any article bought by the natives. If he buys an umbrella, he pays half the purchase price to the society. If he sells any of his produce from his farm he forfeits half of the profits. Unless the authorities are at the place of the murder they cannot prosecute anyone even if they have their suspicions because of the clever way in which the killers have learned to cover up their crime. As soon as the killing is made the head is skinned and made ready for the gigantic rack on which the tending chief who is suspected by officials to be a high man in the society, keeps them. The floating headless bodies in the river are the only intimation to the outsider that another murder has been committed.

Life among these primitive people is quite simple. There are no religious ceremonies of any kind as regards to marriage. To get a wife the man makes a little business call on the father of the desired girl and for the exchange of the small sum of \$15, "she is his for better or for worse." A man can keep as many wives as he can afford as there is no tribal law against it.

According to Mr. Lindsay there have only been six men who have visited these people, and of the six there is only one other beside himself who is living now. At the question would you ever like to go back, Mr. Lindsay replied: "Yes, sir, I like the people very much and as for their barbarism you can easily overlook that. They have never touched me." He intends to return very soon.

SPORT NOTES

It is humorous to note that in the Old Country and the European countries the people there consider basketball as a game for the girls to play. Basketball is gradually growing more and more popular with the people of both Canada and the United States and it is hoped in future it will be taken up more extensively by other countries and become an international sport. There is no indoor sport that carries more thrill and natural speed than basketball, every muscle in the body is used; but particularly it requires head work and floor generalship. Basketball carries all the fundamentals of all leading major sports, the speed of the track star as required by the dribbler, or the high jumper as is shown by the leaping centre. The caniness of the football players as they work the ball down the field is similar to that of the basketball five who try to penetrate a zone defense. The rush of "web" in the charge of a guard as he intercepts a pass or stops a fast dribbler, the accuracy of the hockey players as he shoots his dazzling shots denests the accuracy which a basketball player needs before he can become a successful hoop czar.

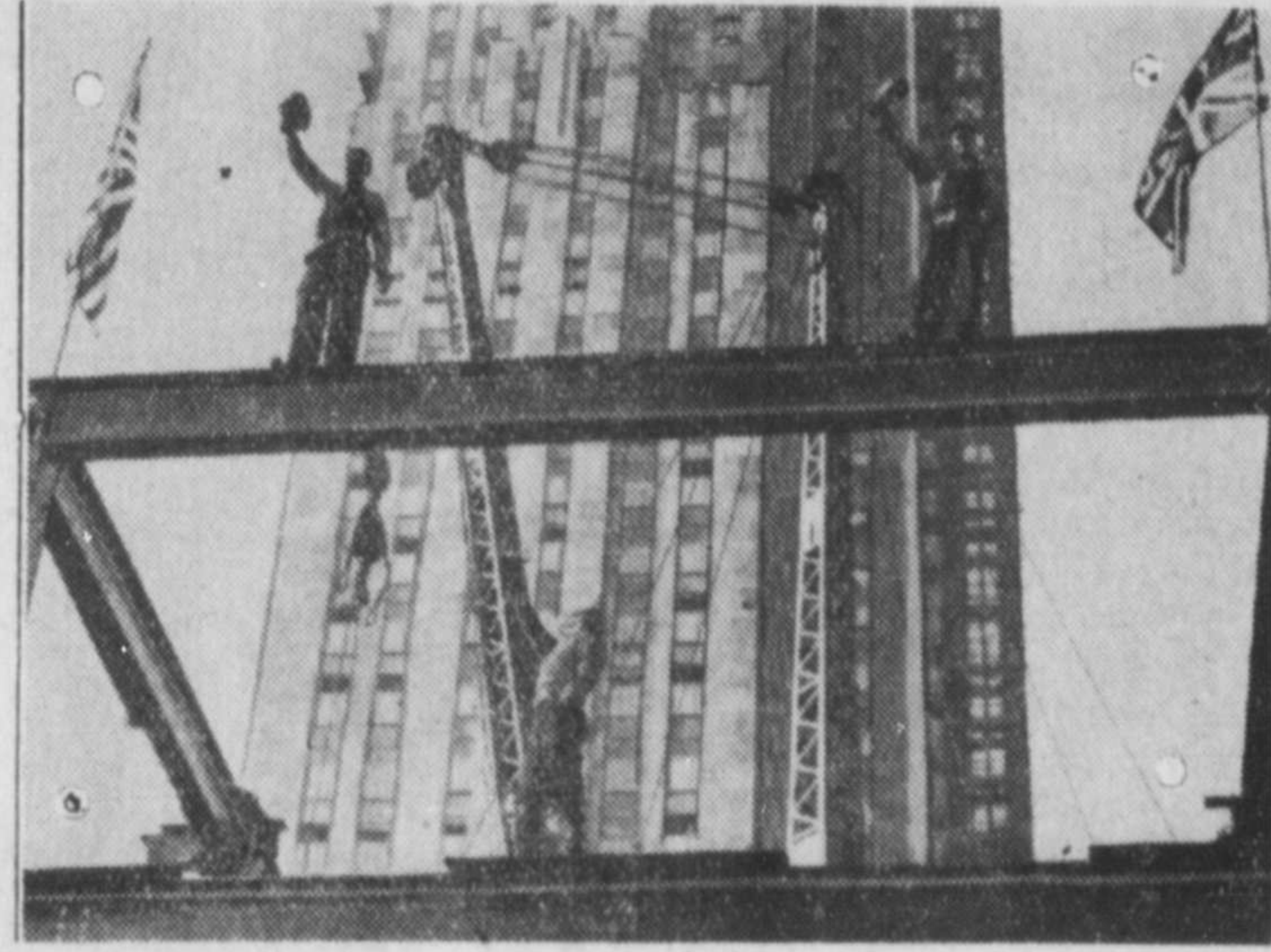
MAGISTRATE ADDRESSES UKRAINIANS

Mrs. Arthur Murphy Congratulates Alberta Convention on Showing Made by Their People

EDMONTON, Jan. 24: (CP)—Mrs. Arthur Murphy spoke to a Ukrainian convention held in this city recently. She congratulated her audience on the contribution which their people have made to Alberta, and in turn pointed out the benefits conferred on them by this new province. She had seen so much poverty, murder and sickness in her work as magistrate she said that she felt people must know about it, and learn to go to proper doctors for advice instead of receiving it from those not competent to supply it. She also referred to the government clinics proposed for the purpose of providing this information and hoped they would be placed in the reach of all the people wishing to make use of the service.

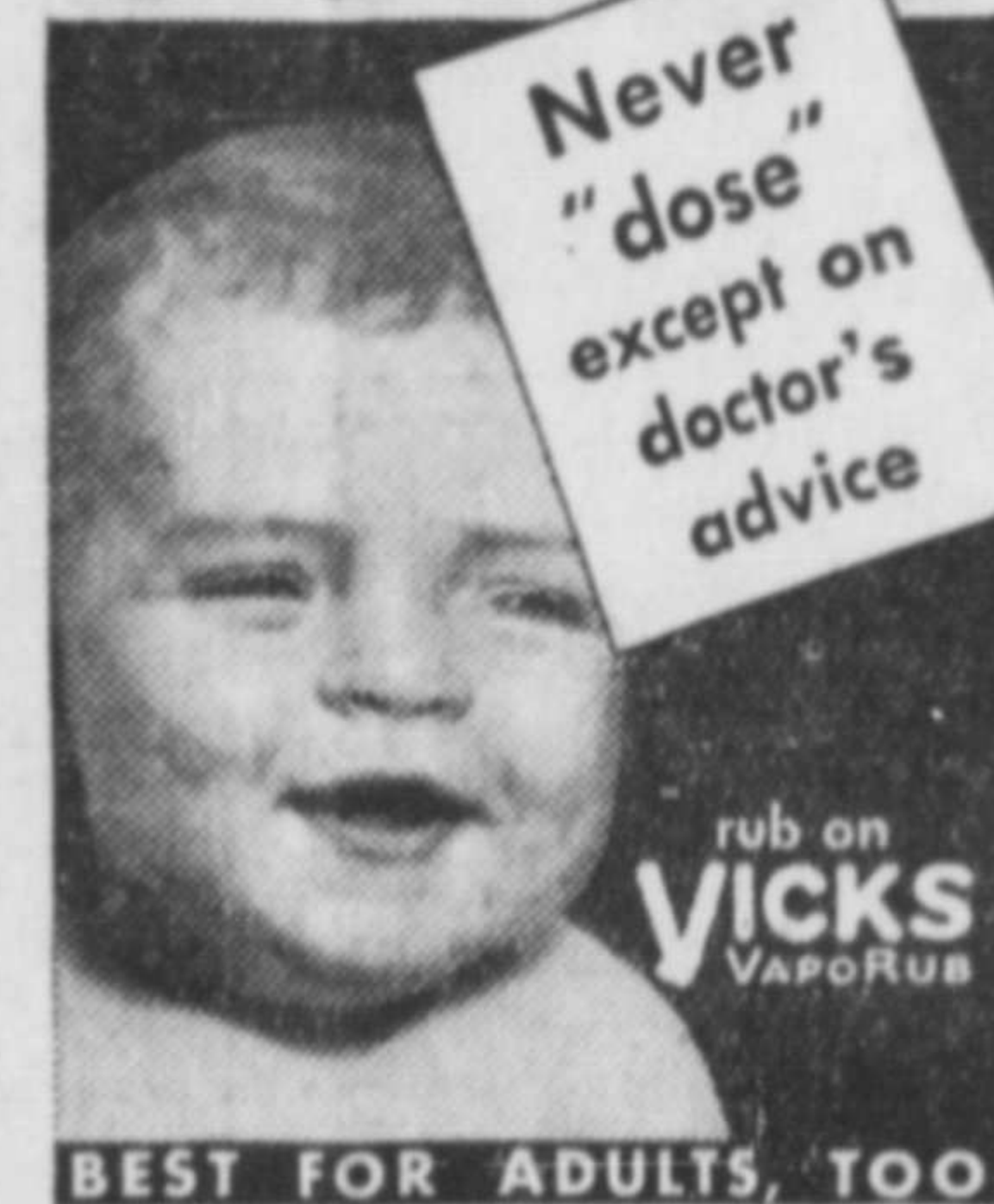
