U. S. MAKES OVERTURES TO RUSSIA

Drastic Step Taken to Impress German Menace Upon Austrian People

One-Tenth of Army Reported to Have Deserted and Left Country—Crisis Continues to Face President Dolfuss

VIENNA, Austria, Oct. 20: (CP)—Orders to shoot and kill Nazi demonstrators were issued today to the police of Dornbirn in order to impress the populace with the seriousness of the situation. One-tenth of the Austrian army is reported to have deserted and left the country for Germany. A crisis faces President Dolfuss.

INDUSTRY IS CODED

Textile Regulations Are Approved By Director of N. R. A.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 20:—General Johnson, director of the National Recovery Act, yesterday approved the new regulations codifying the textile industry of the United States including the cotton mills. There will be strict regulation of output in view of the present over-production.

DEMANDING STRIKE END

National and State Authorities Put It Up to Unions Squarely

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Oct. 20:—National and state authorities yesterday put it up squarely to the miners' unions to end strike conditions which have been prevailing for months in the anthracite coal fields and which yesterday culminated in the twentieth killing since the dispute commenced.

The authorities charge the unions with wilfully permitting the strike to continue in spite of the fact that it might have been settled on this on satisfactory terms.

SUCCUMBS ON STREET

Thomas Guthrie, Well Known Local Longshoreman, Victim of Heart Attack This Morning

Thomas Guthrie, well known local longshoreman, who had been a resident of the city for some twenty-five years, dropped dead about 10:40 this morning on the street as he was trying a door at the Commercial Hotel at the corner of First Avenue and Eighth Street. Heart failure is believed to have been the cause of death. The police were called and the body was removed to the parlors of the B. C. Undertakers.

The late Mr. Guthrie, who was unmarried and lived on First Avenue, was sixty-five years of age and was born in Paisley, Scotland.

CAMPAIGN ECHOES

C. C. F. AND FREEDOM OF THE PRESS
Dr. Lyle Telford at the Victoria conference of the C. C. F. announced:

"Under the C. C. F. we will have control over the public press and will be able to see that the public is not deceived." (Victoria Colonist, Sept. 18, 1933).

The Soviet exercises "control" of the press in Russia with the similar pious intention of protecting the public.

The German dictator Adolph Hitler likewise censors all news before it is allowed to appear in the German newspapers so that the public may not be "misled."

The C. C. F. would adopt these same tactics and excuses.

Under the present much maligned capitalistic system all shades of political and economic opinion have been allowed free publication and expression, with one exception, namely, that no man must publicly advocate the overthrow of our governments by violence. The Socialists take advantage of this freedom to advocate the overthrow of our present system of government, but wrongly and inconsistently do not intend to allow any such freedom to others, if and when they gain power. How long would a newspaper editor in Russia live who dared advocate the peaceful overthrow of the Soviet system? The answer is, just long enough for the government to call out a firing squad and put his back to a stone wall.

After all, the liberty of the press is one of the greatest, if not the greatest, safeguards of our personal freedom and liberty, which Anglo Saxon peoples have won only after centuries of conflict and bloodshed.

Can we afford to take any chances with such dearly bought liberties?

CATHOLICS AND C. C. F.

Head of Church in Montreal Warns His People Against Principles Of New Political Body

MONTREAL, Oct. 20:—A warning to Christians to beware of pessimists and a note of warning against the C. C. F. as advocating Socialistic principles were given by Msgr. Georges Gauthier, archbishop co-adjutor of Montreal, in addressing several hundred at the Notre-Dame du Mont Carmel Church in connection with the celebration of the seventh centenary of the foundation of Servites de Marie.

"There are a number of persons among you who are listening to me, who will soon exercise their right of vote," the archbishop said. "I wish to warn you against those who speculate in human misery and who tend to impose measures frankly Socialistic on our young country. What pains me the most is to witness a number of Catholics who easily believe in the promises of the C. C. F."

"This group will only plunge us into greater depths of want. Their system completely failed in Australia and New Zealand. How could the system be successful in Canada?" he asked.

He then pointed to the extreme need felt by a number of Canadian families. But, on the other hand, no one has yet died of hunger in Canada and Canada should be thankful to the Divine Providence for this.

DIED IN HUNTING

Heart Attack Proves Fatal to Col. Harbottle, Well Known Officer In Great War

TORONTO, Oct. 20: (CP)—Col. Colin Clark Harbottle, who commanded the Seventy-Fifth Battalion in France during the Great War and was attached to the Sixty-Seventh Battalion of Victoria at the beginning of the conflict, died yesterday from heart failure while hunting in the woods near Beaumaris, Muskoka.

RAILWAY TO PEACE

Judge Robertson Gives Address to Rotary Club on Part of Country Which He Visits Regularly

"I feel that the days of the steam railway are numbered and that probably the electric railway will take its place. In view of that there are tremendous waterpowers in the Peace River area which would be available for a railway connecting the Peace River country with the present C. N. R." That was a striking statement made by Judge H. A. Robertson of Prince George in an address to the Rotary Club at its luncheon yesterday.

The judge stated that in the Peace Canyon there was a 240-foot high in the length of the canyon which it would be easy to dam. There was coal there also in plenty, he power could be used to work the mines and the railway.

The speaker outlined the present railway situation, stating that there was a huge area north of the Peace River which must have railway communication soon. So far the line had been carried only as far as Fairview. Beyond that there was a tract 550 miles in length and forty or more miles wide which must be served. Also in the Peace River Block there was an area of about two million acres suitable for cultivation. All this country could best be served by a railway either through the Pine River Pass or the Peace River Pass, preferably the latter. Near Finlay Forks were mineral deposits that would provide railway tonnage and very high class coal at Peace River Canyon. The Inceknika mines were also only 100 miles from the Forks.

The Judge expressed himself as opposed to building another trunk line to Stewart but thought the country would be better served by branch lines to connect with the road already established. He suggested that what was needed was to finish the P. G. E. which was the shortest route into the grain country.

The visitor then gave a very interesting and graphic description of a trip down the series of streams by canoe from Summit Lake to the Peace River, which was much enjoyed by the members and for which he was thanked at the close by President John Dybhavn.

President Roosevelt Is In Correspondence With Head of Soviet

Secretary of State Says He Must Check Over Latest Reports Before Being Able to Make Statement

MOSCOW, Russia, Oct. 20: (CP)—Unconfirmed reports which were circulated here today said that President Franklin D. Roosevelt of the United States had made direct overtures to President Joseph Stalin of the Soviet Republic looking toward recognition with a view to developing trade between the two countries.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 20: (CP)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull today refused to deny or confirm a Moscow report that President Roosevelt had made overtures to President Stalin in regard to recognition. He admitted that correspondence was passing between the two governments but said he "will have to wait until I have checked over latest reports."

Alex Clapperton Named Honorary Vice-President

At a meeting of the St. Andrew's Society last night, the resignation of Alex Clapperton, who is leaving the city, as vice-president was accepted with regret but, in view of Mr. Clapperton's valuable services on behalf of the society over a period of more than twenty years, he was honored by being elected to the honorary vice-presidency.

It was decided to celebrate St. Andrew's Day on November 30 with a supper for which a good program will be arranged, the committee in charge to consist of J. A. Frew, Howard Steen and J. S. Irvine.

Further re-organization of the Society was discussed but this was left over until another meeting to be held following the St. Andrew's Day banquet.

President S. D. Macdonald was in the chair at last night's meeting.

Policy of Trade Isolation For Canada Condemned by Mackenzie King in By-Election Campaign

CAMPBELLTON, N.B., Oct. 20: (CP)—Trade policies which make for isolation tend to produce strife, Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Leader of the Opposition, asserted here last night in an address in which he called upon the electors of Restigouche-Madawaska in the federal by-election to record their disapproval of the government in voting next Monday. No country on earth, he added, had gone as far as Canada in raising tariffs during the period the present government had been in power.

Mr. King declared that the Liberal party stood ready tomorrow to conclude trade agreements with the United States, the countries of South America and any other countries in the world which were willing to trade on fair terms.

Pete Bulatovich Passes Away

The death of Pete Bulatovich, aged 69, who had been a resident of Prince Rupert for many years, and lived in Westview, occurred yesterday in the Prince Rupert General Hospital where he had been a patient for two weeks. He was a native of Jugo-Slavia. Mrs. Muckovich of this city is a daughter. Another daughter lives in California. Deceased was a Greek Catholic.

Mr. Bulatovich, who had been in failing health for about a month, had been a resident of the province since 1908 and followed the occupation of a laborer. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers.

QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS VOTERS

This is the last chance we shall have of giving a word to the voters of Queen Charlotte Islands prior to election day. We suggest to them that it was Pattullo who laid the foundation of the present road system and who always recognized the claims of the Queen Charlotte Islands people to better communication. As a result of the highways on Graham Island living conditions are very greatly improved. When Mr. Pattullo addressed a public meeting in this city a short time ago he emphasized the fact that his government would complete the highway which he had commenced on Graham Island.

Mr. Pattullo is opposed to the nationalization of industry and property which Mr. Rudderham advocates although he believes in exercising the right to regulate industry in the interests of the country. He is not a socialist, like Mr. Rudderham, but he believes thoroughly in social reform. In other words he is not a revolutionist but believes in the evolution of democracy.

One other reason for supporting Mr. Pattullo is that he, as leader of the Liberal party, will become premier if his party is elected. He is an outstanding personality and when he says he will do something he is likely to be in a position to keep his word. Mr. Rudderham can be nothing more than a follower; a pawn on the chess board; a member of a party whose policy is dictated by the small junta at Vancouver which exercises autocratic powers. He is supposed to have no mind of his own. In accepting the nomination he placed his future in the hands of the bureau, and is supposed to have no ideas of his own which are not approved by that small group of revolutionaries.

Mr. Pattullo knows the islands well but owing to the fact that he has to visit in 46 other constituencies and aid in the election of 46 of his supporters, he was unable just now to pay the visit he desired. When here he said he was trusting to the people of the islands to come to his aid under these difficult conditions and support the policies for which they all stood.

People of the islands—you have elected Mr. Pattullo several times covering a period of sixteen years and now that for the first time he is really in a position to do something is scarcely the time to turn him down. Prince Rupert people believe you will do the right thing at this juncture.

Has Quiet Year**

Mining Not So Active Although
Number of Prospectors in
Field

Mining activity has been rather quieter than usual during the past couple of years in the Cassiar district around Telegraph Creek and further up the Stikine River. This year only one company has been operating on a placer lease near the Stikine River about forty miles below Telegraph Creek. However, a goodly number of prospectors went in early in the spring and worked all summer, mostly around Dease Lake and also east and north of the same locality.

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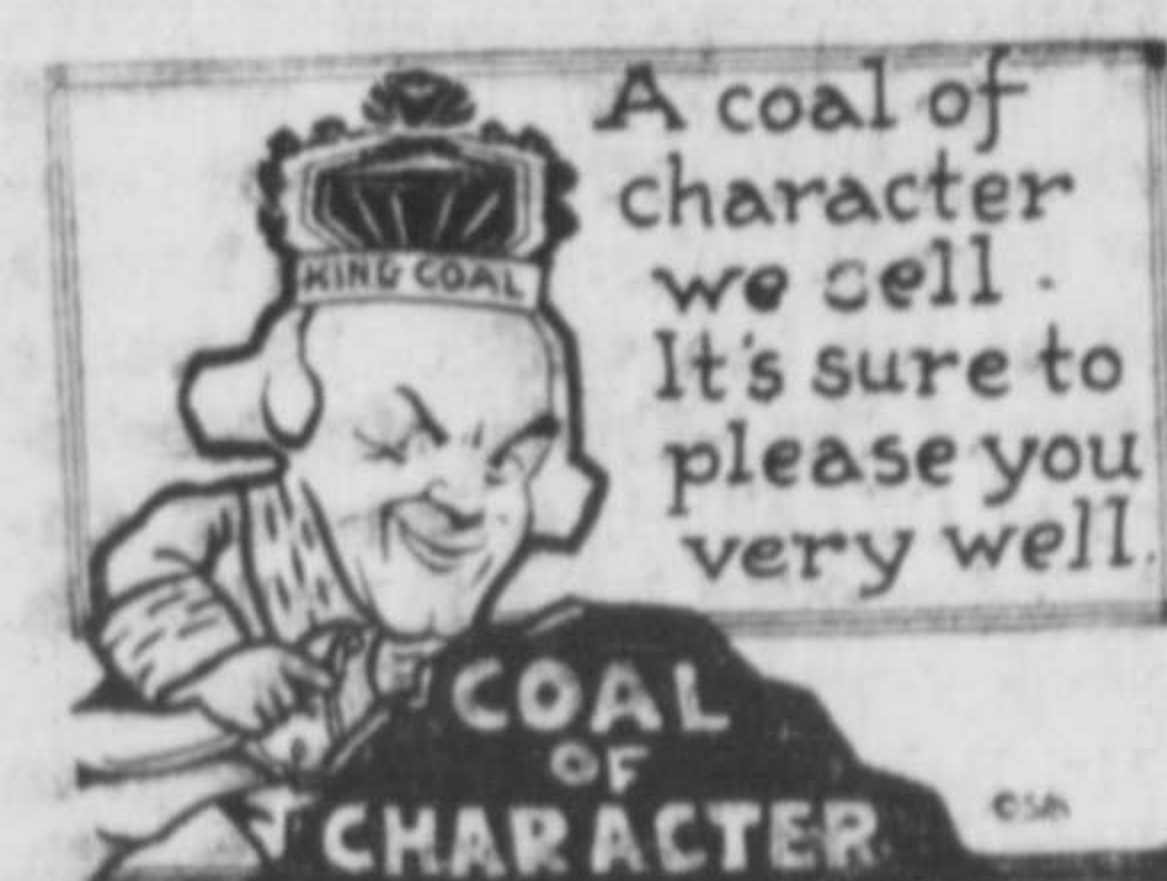

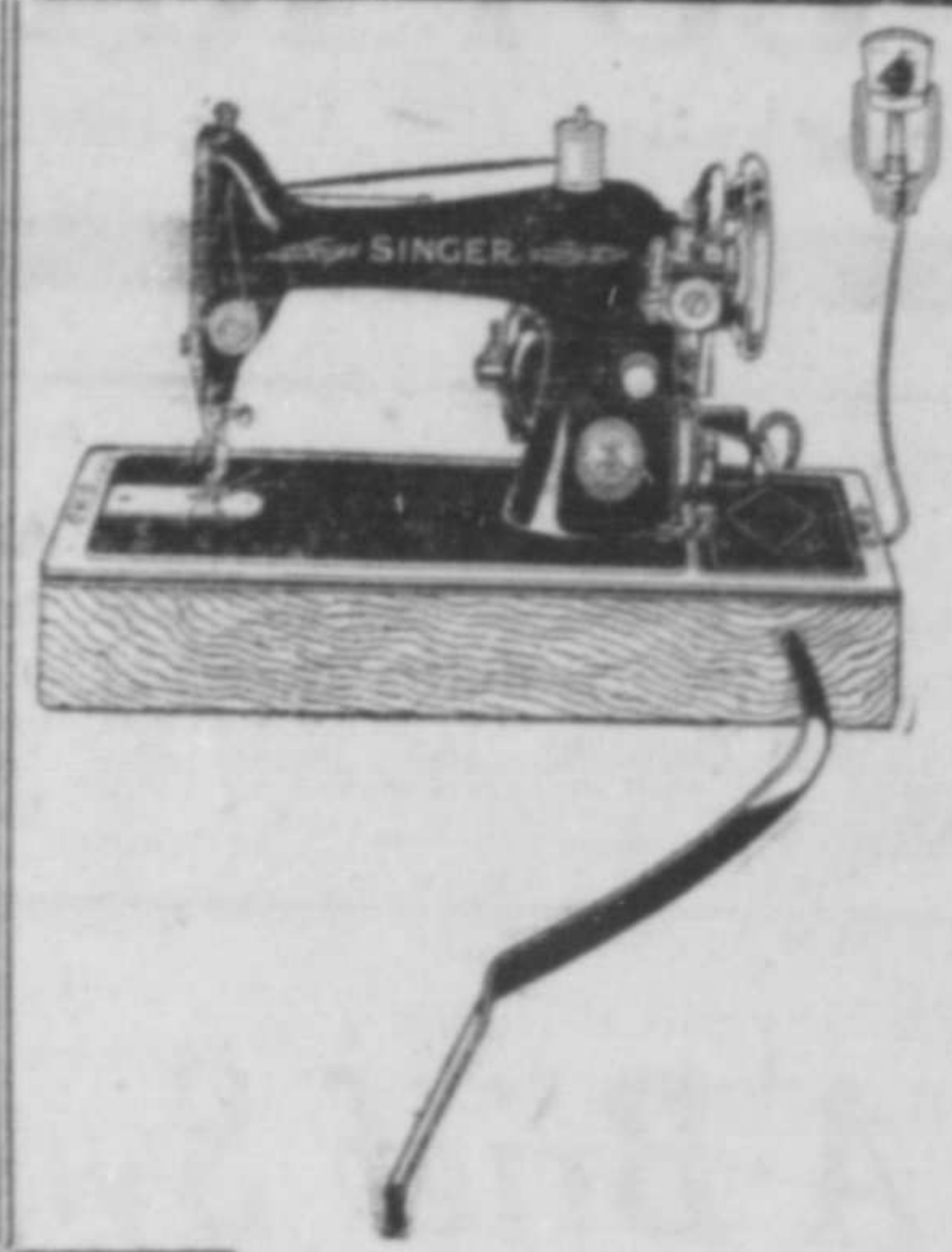

A Brief Synopsis of Liberal Policy

HEREWITH is a brief synopsis of policy as laid down by the Liberal Party of British Columbia, in convention held in October, 1932.

Many matters of interest, not specifically set out, will require consideration. The principles enunciated are indicative of the Liberal viewpoint, and are broad enough to meet every question within provincial jurisdiction.

The Liberal Party exists as an official organization for the purpose of formulating and furthering measures that will make for the well-being of each individual member of society, and the welfare of society as a whole.

Innumerable questions, both of public and personal character, can be properly treated only through the agency of government.

Government is not an ordinary business, but carries responsibility to meet every problem arising from our complex social and economic conditions, in order that not merely a few, but all of our people may live in reasonable comfort.

The Liberal Party pledges immediate action under the best available advice and closest study.

1.—Profitable and permanent **Employment** is the most important question facing our people. There should be co-operation between the national, provincial and municipal authorities and the Canadian banking system to establish the necessary credit to carry out a broad programme of constructive and useful wage-distributing public enterprise, and to further the health, education and well-being of all our people.

An **Economic Council** should be established, the membership of which shall consist of representatives of the various avenues of endeavour, such as health, education, agriculture, labour and the industries. This council will be appointed by the government on recommendation of the interests involved, and will act in an advisory capacity to the government.

Amongst other things the council will study industrial and social effort in the province and suggest means to correlate these efforts. It will familiarize itself with intra, inter-provincial and foreign trade, and will co-operate with the other provinces and the Dominion. It will also study such questions as production and consumption, and the marketing of our products, the number of hours of work per day and days of work per week, the standard of wages and commodity prices. These questions are of national as well as provincial concern, and British Columbia can take the lead in urging co-operation with the other provinces and the Dominion as a whole.

National Unemployment Insurance should be established upon a contributory basis.

2.—Our **Financial** position must be reviewed. Current expenditure must be kept within current revenue. While maintaining the credit of the province, effort must be made to reduce capital charges. We cannot continue to pay exorbitant rates of interest for money.

3.—The **Taxation Structure** must be revised with a view to reduction wherever possible, including exemption in the lower scale of wages and salaries.

4.—The health of each of us is important to the whole community, and a measure of **State Health Insurance** should be made effective, not only to preserve health, but to reduce costs both to the average citizen and to industry.

5.—A general and effective review must be made of the **Educational** problem, rejecting any proposed organization that involves a caste system. We must facilitate the intellectual growth of each individual member of society in order to equip him for his daily tasks, and for the enjoyment of such cultural pursuits as may be in keeping with our social customs.

Triangular disagreements between the school boards, municipal councils and the department of education must be adjusted, and our whole system placed upon a sound financial basis.

6.—The financial position of our **Municipalities** is of increasing concern. An equitable adjustment must be made as between the province and the municipalities, and the municipalities placed in a sound financial position.

7.—An effort should be made to settle our **Agricultural Lands** in order that more of our citizens may be self-supporting. Agriculture as a whole must be put upon a sound and profitable basis, and made capable of sustaining and directing itself, in line with all other national, basic industries.

8.—Continuous effort should be put forth to assist industry in **Marketing** its products, in timber, agriculture, fishing, mining and, in fact, every operation where it appears that useful service can be rendered.

9.—Our highways must be kept in good condition, both for the benefit of settlers and the tourist traffic, and expanded as circumstances warrant. In this connection a **Highway Board** should be established to make for continuity of policy and to inspire confidence in impartial treatment.

10.—A **Public Utilities Commission** should be established.

11.—A **National Central Bank** should be established.

12.—Social Services, such as Mothers' Pensions, Old Age Pensions, etc., must be maintained. Abuses of administration should not be allowed, and injustice through mere technicalities should not be permitted.

13.—The **Peace River** must be given access to the Coast.

14.—In order that the utmost **Freedom of Action** by Members of the Legislature may be assured in respect of questions before the House, it is Liberal policy that a government shall be considered to be defeated only upon a straight want-of-confidence motion.

15.—The Dominion Government will be asked to place the Province of British Columbia upon a basis of equality with the other provinces, and to this end request will be made for a Royal Commission to ascertain the extent to which the Province of British Columbia has not been given **Equality of Treatment with the Other Provinces** of the Dominion.

16.—There shall be a permanent **Voters' List** to ensure that all eligible voters are enrolled.

17.—The Leader of the Liberal Party is given a free mandate to choose for his associates in government, men of character, ability and standing, having regard solely to the public interest.
