## BANDIT TRIO PLEA GUILTY TO ROBBERY OF VANCOUVER BANK

George Crowley, Kenneth Feakins and George Lalonde  
Place Themselves on Mercy of Court—Will Be  
Sentenced on Thursday of Next Week

VANCOUVER, Nov. 25: (CP)—Geo. Crowley and Kenneth Feakins, who were arrested at Calgary, and George Lalonde, who was taken into custody at Winnipeg, appeared in police court here this morning and pleaded guilty to robbery of the Victoria Road branch of the Bank of Montreal on Monday of last week and stealing \$3500, the most of which money was recovered on the trio being arrested. They were remanded until next Thursday for sentence.

## KILLED IN AIRPLANE

Pilots and Stewardess Lost  
Lives When Ship Came Down  
In Flames In Illinois

OTTAWA, Ill., Nov. 25:—Two pilots from Chicago and a stewardess from Kansas City were killed yesterday when an eight-passenger, single-engine commercial airplane crashed in a field eight miles from here and burst into flames. There were no passengers in the plane at the time.  
The crash was witnessed by a farmer who stated that just before the machine came down, only one of the engines appeared to be running.

## TO PENALIZE YANK GOODS

Exchange Dumping Duty to Be  
Imposed by Canada

OTTAWA, Nov. 25: (CP)—Action to impose an exchange dumping duty on imports from the United States of a class or kind made in Canada has been taken by the Dominion government. The government has declared the United States dollar to possess value of 100 cents in Canadian currency for duty purposes.

## BOOZE SALE FOR CAFES

Setting Up of Quebec System in  
B. C. Advocated By Victoria  
Election Candidate

VICTORIA, Nov. 25: (CP)—Adoption by British Columbia of the Quebec system of sale of light wines and beer in restaurants was advocated by W. C. Moresby K.C., Conservative candidate for Victoria in next Monday's deferred election.  
Mr. Moresby expressed fear that lifting of prohibition in the United States might prove serious for Canada with the threat of a flood of bootlegging because of lower liquor prices there.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25:—The Canadian dollar and British pound sterling both declined sharply in the local foreign exchange market yesterday, the former closing at \$1.15 and the latter at \$5.20. The French franc closed at .0622.

## PLANNING TO TREAT WITH BERLIN DIRECT ON DISARMAMENT

LONDON, Nov. 25:—Sir John Simon, Foreign Secretary, announced yesterday that Great Britain had proposed to France that, following suspension of the Geneva disarmament conference, disarmament negotiations be opened direct with Germany. By this means it is hoped that the way may be paved for Germany to re-enter the conference after it reassembles in mid-January.

WARM SPRINGS, Ga., Nov. 25:—Recognition of the new San Martin government of Cuba by the United States is not imminent, said President Franklin D. Roosevelt in a statement from the summer white house here yesterday.  
The statement followed a conference earlier in the week here between the President and United States Minister Wells to Cuba who recently arrived from Havana.  
Wells will not return to Havana meantime but will be attached to State Department headquarters at Washington.

The last year had been a trying one for the hospitals from the financial standpoint due largely to the reduction of the government grant to hospitals which the association had been endeavoring to have restored on its former basis but, so far, without success although it was quite apparent that hospitals could not continue to function without greater financial support. The convention had discussed, among other matters, further steps with a view to restoring the grant to its former basis, legalization of sweepstakes for hospital purposes, state health insurance and hospital insurance.

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## WATERFRONT WHIFFS

No Extensive Changes in Halibut Regulations Expected—More Particulars of Fall Casualties—Hunting Activities

It is now generally understood that no very extensive new regulations in the way of further limitation of the Pacific halibut fishery in the interests of conservation will be imposed by the International Fisheries Commission during the coming year although it is possible there may be some treaty amendments. Indeed, conservation measures already in effect such as the quota limits for the season are being proven to have met with very effective and gratifying results in the way of conserving and building up the fishery and it is understood these will be continued next year along similar lines to 1933 without necessitating any more very drastic regulations being resorted to. A public hearing was held in Seattle this week to get the views of the boat owners and fishermen and it is expected this will be followed by an early announcement by the Commission as to its policy for the coming year. Prince Rupert was well represented at the conference by Capt. George Fritz and Capt. Dan Larsen, representing the Canadian Halibut Vessel Owners' Association, and George Anderson, as delegate from the local Deep Sea Fishermen's Union.

Further particulars have been received here of casualties to vessels of the American halibut fleet during the boisterous closing days of the 1933 season this fall. In some cases severe damage was done to boats. The heaviest loss was the sinking of the Sun d'E in Milbank Sound following collision with the steamer Redwood of the Pacific American Fisheries. Capt. Egil Erickson is now having a new boat, 78 feet long and powered with a 180 h.p. Atlas diesel built at the Olsen & Sundé boat yard in Seattle.

The 62-foot halibut vessel Thor, Capt. Ivar Satero, was so badly pounded by a gale in the Gulf of Alaska that her seams opened and she began to leak badly. After landing a 42,000-pound catch at Prince Rupert the Thor returned to Ketchikan for docking and recaulking.

The Schorn, Capt. Louis Jacobson, was disabled by crankshaft trouble while fishing off Yakutat and was towed by the coastguard steamer Tallapoosa into Juneau where she sold a broken catch of 9,000 pounds before proceeding to her home port at Ketchikan to lay up for the winter and receive repairs.

The Prosperity of Ketchikan struck a reef off Wingham Island in the Gulf of Alaska and lay in a perilous position for many days but was finally pulled off and eventually taken to Cordova.

### Back From Hunting Trip

Having found game scarce and bringing back only a single deer

despite an absence of twelve days. Nick Chenoski, Dick Woods and George Bell returned home on Wednesday afternoon from a hunting trip to Morse Cove and Porcher and Prescott Islands. The trip was made in Mr. Wood's boat.

The Cape Beale, one of the largest vessels of the Canadian halibut fleet, with Capt. Edgar Arnott in command, left Prince Rupert at midnight last night for Vancouver to spend the winter at the southern port. Following the close of the fishing season, Capt. Arnott took a party of some eight Prince Rupert friends on an eleven-day big game hunting trip aboard the Cape Beale to the Gardner Canal area. Despite unfavorable weather conditions, the party obtained a good bag of geese, ducks and deer, the real prize of the trip, however, being a fine mountain goat. The Cape Beale returned to port with the party on Thursday of this week.

### Duke of Atholl Is Fined Under Lotteries Act

LONDON, Nov. 25: (CP)—The Duke of Atholl, one of the leading figures of the peerage, was fined £25 and costs yesterday for contravention of the Lotteries Act. The case will be appealed.

MONTREAL, Nov. 25: (CP)—Leadership in both the international and American sections of the National Hockey League changed hands as a result of Thursday night's play.

Montreal Canadiens moved into first place in the international section by scoring the only goal of a game with Ottawa Senators here, Toronto Maple Leafs, who had been in the lead previously, having been idle.

The Chicago Black Hawks, by blanking the New York Americans two to nil at New York, assumed the leadership of the American section, displacing the Detroit Red Wings who suffered an ignominious six to nil defeat by the Boston Bruins in Detroit.

W. S. Russell, manager of the Hudson Bay Co. at Hazelton, who has been on a business trip to Vancouver, arrived in the city from the south on the Princess Adelaide yesterday afternoon and will proceed to the interior by tonight's train.

Dougherty, George Mitchell and E. J. Smith.

The play was under the direction of Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth with Robert Cameron as stage manager. C. G. Ham in charge of properties, W. L. Sandison, lighting effects, and M. J. Dougherty, make-up.

During the intermissions, the Junior Symphony Orchestra under the direction of A. C. Cameron was heard to advantage in a number of selections.

## PLANNING NURSERY

The hospital board, at its meeting last night, gave consideration to the possibility of opening out a new nursery in connection with the Prince Rupert General Hospital, suggestions ranging from the establishment of a new ward for the new-born babies to a complete new maternity and babies' wing or separate building. While financial stringency, it was felt, would bar anything of a very ambitious nature being undertaken at this time, it was decided, after considerable discussion, to refer the question to the house committee for consideration and report.

Dr. L. W. Kergin offered the suggestion that a storey might be added to the classroom section of the building and used to accommodate the nursery which would thus be separated completely from the children's ward which, in turn, could be divided into two sections for girls and boys who were now in the same room.

To build and equip properly a complete new maternity and infants' unit the cost might run to \$20,000, it was estimated, this, of course, being out of the question at this time.
