Now this is a short statement but it gives a vivid picture of historical materialsm. We can take some examples. The Ratepayers' Association was formed in Rupert not before but after the conditions comprising the necessity and justification for that association's existence were already there. The elementary form of government like the city council did not come into existence before there was a city to run, nor could it be here without the taxpayers, etc.

Now the denial of the class struggle is an entirely different thing from the non-existence of it. The author mentioned a lot about trade unions in an attempt to show that socialism has failed to permeate its members' minds. Well, definite limit to its capacity to does not the existence of these unions really show that there was a struggle between its members and the capitalist class? And is it not a phase of a class struggle? Or for what purpose does one imagine the unions were brought into existence?

Everybody has heard of a struggle for existence. This is a biological term denoting relative positions among the individuals and species in respect to obtainment of food, shelter, etc.

Well, with the evolution of a human society and its accompanying social division of labor, this individual struggle for existence has become transformed into class struggle. It is easy to see that individual interests in this struggle, due to the division of society into different social groups corresponding to the difference in occupation, in the course of time have been correspondingly segregated into group interests as much divergent and antagonistic as they were before. Merging of these groups into classes brings us to the class struggle.

Fascism The Fascism of Italy is nothing

new nor unique. Theoretically it was conceived long before its practical application. The naked dictatorship whether of the proletariat (Bolshevism) or of the middle class (Fascism) is a dictatorship maintaining itself by force and characterized by suppression of freedom allowed under capitalist democracy. The Fascism of Italy has suppressed all labor unions and confiscated all their funds. Do you remember administration of castor oil to all those who had ideas differing from those of the dictators? As it operates in Italy now the original power of the small capitalist class has disappeared and the financial capitalists run Mussolini and his Fascism. In Germany at the last election the Hitler boys lost their majority with indications that the Germans are lkely to do away with the whole nefarious business. The fact that the youngsters are the principal supporters of this move is a proof that the chief conditions for acceptance of Fascism is lack of reflection and experience.

As to the failure of Socialism, well, how could anything fail before it ever came into reality? The failure of Fascism is as well demonstrated by unemployment as in any other-capitalist country with the exception of Russia-which is under state capitalism but directed by Marxists. When Fascists took over the destiny of Italy they found a country in orderly industrial conditions. There was no destruction and disorganization of the nation's economic structure as in Russia. So what are their accomplishments? Just a state enslavement of its workers with the private ownership. of natural resources and machinery






