Offer For His Country-War Debts Bugaboo is Believed Lifted From World Economic Conference

LONDON, June 15: (Canadian Press) - Canada, through Prime Minister R. B. Bennett, today gave whole hearted support to the monetary policy of Great Britain as advanced at the world economic conference yesterday by Rt. Hon. Neville Chamberlain, British Chancellor of the Exchequer. Premier Bennett, at this morning's ses-

sion, agreed to an easy money policy. His government, he said, would endeavor to maintain the value of its dollar on the London and New MONEY IS York markets when those two money capitals decided on a ratio for the stabilization of their cur-

Mr. Bennett advocated effective government initiative in the use of increased credit for the construction of public works.

Concerning wheat, Mr. Bennett declared that the accumulated stock of 350,000,000 bushels could only be dealt with by international co-operation, involving "possible acreage reduction agreements."

Premier Bennett advocated restoration of the comparatively free flow of international trade although he recognized that nations would continue to use tariffs as instrunents of national policy.


