### Coal and Oil Used in Fuel Now Invented

OTTAWA, Feb. 17:-Of great interest to Canadian coal producers is the announcement of William Burnip, prominent local engineer, that Canadian coal may be used as the basis of a new invented coalcolloidal fuel. A friend of Mr. Burnip, Stephen L. Wyndham, is the inventor and Mr. Burnip who was recently in Cardiff, Wales, has

seen the invention demonstrated. It has been a dream for years to invent a fuel by mixing coal with oil and getting a fluid mixture in which the coal would not settle down to the bottom. Mr. Burnip announced the invention has succeeded in producing samples of colloidal fuel-a combination of coal and oil—in stable mixtures varying from 60% coal and 40% oil to 80% coal and 20% oil. In his announcement Mr. Burnip says the intriguing feature to Canada is that the fuel will be cheaper than oil and can be produced from Canadian coal. Even the oil used in the mixture, he says, can be replaced by coal tar and oils derived from the distillation of + + + + + + + + + + + coal. 

JOIN WITH LEAGUE OF NATIONS IN HELPING TO EFFECT JUST SETTLEMENT OF QUESTION.

UNITED STATES AND RUSSIA CALLED UPON TO

GENEVA, Feb. 17:—The League of Nations Assembly report denouncing Japan's Manchurian policy was transmitted to all the governments of the world this afternoon by wireless telegraph. It declares against the maintenance and recognition of the state of Manchuoko and invites the United States and Soviet Russia to join the League powers in effecting a just settlement of the dispute between China and Japan.

The report will be debated Friday and Saturday of next week before a final vote is taken.

The Manchurian question must be settled according to the principles of the League covenant, the Kellogg-Briand Pact and the Nine-Power Treaty, the report asserts. It calls for the withdrawal of Japanese troops from Manchuria without any definite time limit.

Negotiations between China and Japan with a League committee assisting as third party with a view to settling the dispute are recommended.

Yosuke Metsuoko, Japan's senior representative, said his government will not accept the League's report.

"The report is a great moral victory for China," said Dr. W. W. Yen, China's senior delegate.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17:-In view of the probability of United States backing the League of Nations in regard to the Manchurian situation, it is pointed out here that the two countries are closely allied by trade interests. Most of the silk used in United States factories comes from Japan, in fact this country is Japan's best customer.

TOKYO, Feb. 17:-While no official declaration has yet been made by Japan in regard to the report, Japan's answer lies in the fact that 50,000 troops are being poured into Manchuria to drive the Chinese out and that a large sum of money is being appropriated by the Japanese Parliament for conduct of the campaign in that country.


