# Bandits Made Big Haul Sacramento Post Office

Got Away With \$125,000 in Currency and Quantity of Valuable Bonds Last Night in California Capital City

SACRAMENTO, Feb. 10:-More than \$325,000 in currency and bank of America bonds were stolen last night by three bandits in a daring hold-up at the main post office here. The men drove up to the loading platform of the post office in a sedan, surprised and disarmed the truck driver and armed guard, grabbed the pouch containing the money the man who had charge of it

and drove away without molestation. Everything was done so quickly and with so little ostentation that the men were gone before anyone knew it.

The currency in the sack amounted to about \$125,000.

The result of the first campaign was the collecting of two thousand volumes as a nucleus to the present collection. Many of those books have been worn out and discarded long ago but their places have been taken and Mr. Wilkinkinson is now head of the institution which has a collection of over eight thousand volumes. He is to be congratulated on his re-election.
