#### TERRORIZE COUNTRY

Documents to be Published in Germany Incriminating Communists of That Country

BERLIN, March 1.—Following raids on Communist headquarters in various parts of the country, the Hitler Government are about to publish documents which they say will prove that the Communists had a plan in hand to terrorize the whole country and seize the governmental power.

#### Alert Gives Up Search For Boat Supposed Lost

KETCHIKAN, March 1.—Convinced that the halibut vessel Reliance with her crew of four men, foundered in the storm off Dixon Entrance early Saturday, officers of the coastguard cutter Alert abandoned the search yesterday and returned here.

Two private boats with volunteer searchers are continuing the search.

#### Sweden's Royal Honeymoon Couple

It seems that a meeting of strikers was held this morning to decide what action was to be taken in view of the fact that there were several defections from their ranks of men who were planning to leave for Anyox on the steamer to return to work and because of the news that there were a dozen men aboard the vessel from Vancouver bound for the mining camp. Following this several hundred men marched down the cinder path toward the dock as if going to meet the steamer. At the overhead crossing they were stopped by the police.

With a loud yell of "let's go through them," the men swarmed over the bank to the left of the bridge. Sergeant Service, with about a dozen policemen met them as they tried to cross the flat at the ball grounds and drove them back. It was necessary to use clubs for the strikers rushed the police with rocks as weapons. The police used their batons freely and managed to drive the men back up the cliff.

Robert Thomas Carter who was leading the riot of strikers ran up the tracks but was pursued by the police and arrested.

#### Premier S. F. Tolmie Defends Government; in the Legislature

Announcement Made That Representatives of U. S. and British Capital Are in Victoria Negotiating For Purchase of Pacific Great Eastern

VICTORIA, March 1.—Following the slashing attack upon the administration Monday by T. D. Pattullo, Premier Tolmie yesterday defended the acts of his government in the debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne.

The Premier made no mention of union government, re-distribution or cabinet reconstruction but confined himself to a recital of the government's accomplishments, particularly last year.

One of the interesting features of the speech was an announcement that both United States and British capitalists were negotiating for the purchase of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway and that their representatives were in Victoria at the present time.

#### Civil Service Bill

OTTAWA, March 1.—A bill to extend the Civil Service reductions for another year passed all the stages of the House of Commons on Tuesday and was sent to the Senate.

#### VICTIMS OF SHIP WRECK

One Body From Seiner Golden Gate Found by Natives—Four Aboard

#### Eagle Damaged

Halibut Schooner in No Immediate Danger According to Report of Tallapoosa

KETCHIKAN, March 1.—One hundred natives from Metlakatla sought three victims of the mysteriously wrecked seiner Golden Gate. One body has already been found but the natives are puzzled by the absence of others. They said there was no evidence of foul play. Four men on the Golden Gate were Indians.

Crippled by the storm the halibut schooner Eagle was anchored off Two-Headed Island, Alaska, but the coastguard Tallapoosa, advised she was in no immediate danger.

#### MINER DIES AT HOSPITAL

John Myholme, a miner, 49 years of age, died at the Prince Rupert General Hospital last night. He is a native of Finland and is survived by a wife.

The deceased resided on 9th Avenue. Burial arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers.

#### President Hindenburg Issues Decree Against Treason in Germany

Firm Action Being Taken by Government Which Amounts To Practically a Dictatorship

BERLIN, March 1.—President von Hindenburg issued a decree today "against treason to the German people and highly treasonable machinations." The decree sharply increased the penalties for espionage, treason and subversive acts.

The death penalty was provided for any attempting to secure or for those disclosing important military secrets.

This and other decrees gives the government almost the rights of a dictatorship.

#### PATTULLO RIDICULES THE SPEECH

Declares it Was a Superfluity of Words Showing a Paucity of Ideas

VICTORIA, March 1.—Speaking in the Legislature on Monday T. D. Pattullo, member for Prince Rupert, said the speech was a superfluity of words and a paucity of ideas. He charged the Government with having added "millions to the debt of the province."

Referring to Premier Tolmie's union government proposals, Mr. Pattullo asked what measures he had in mind that he could not put into effect with the three to one majority that he has enjoyed.

#### Veteran Church Missionary Dies

VANCOUVER, March 1.—Rev. Charles M. Tate, 80 years of age died here today. He was a veteran missionary among the coast Indians.

#### Eight States Pass Bills to Protect Banks by Granting Bank Holidays For Depositors

NEW YORK, March 1.—Spreading persistently despite legislation by Washington and state governments to ease the situation, bank holidays have been extended to eight states today. They are Michigan, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Arkansas, Ohio, Tennessee and Kentucky.

In addition to these a bill to permit the immediate calling of a holiday has been passed by the West Virginia legislature. A similar bill is pending before the Nevada legislature which had a lengthy holiday of a similar nature some months ago.

#### FUR DEALER LOST LIFE

FAIRBANKS, March 1.—Mickey Goldstein, Seattle fur dealer, and his pilot, Ted Morris, was killed yesterday when the plane in which he was travelling crashed southwest of here.

#### TOOK \$500 FROM BANK

Bandits at Vancouver Got Away With Comparatively Small Amount of Loot

VANCOUVER, March 1.—Three bandits armed with sawed-off shotguns held up the branch of the Royal Bank of Canada at Sixteenth and Oak Streets yesterday afternoon and escaped with \$500 in cash.

#### Compensation Board Rulings

MONTREAL, March 1.—The appeal court on Tuesday upheld the validity of the Quebec Workmen's Compensation Act and in particular the right of the province to appoint commissioners to the compensation commission. This decision is of importance to the other provinces.

#### VOTES AGAINST ALLEGIANCE TO BRITISH CROWN

DUBLIN, March 1.—The Dail Eireann today passed by a vote of 75 to 49 a government bill abolishing the oath of allegiance to the British Crown. The bill now goes to the Senate.

#### JAPANESE SUCCESSES

Army Enters Commercial and Transportation Centre of Jehol Province

CHINCHOW, Manchuria, March 1.—The Japanese military command announced that its army of the north entered Chihfeng, the commercial and transportation centre of Jehol Province today.

INCIPIENT RIOT CUT SHORT BY POLICE AFTER STONES THROWN AND BATONS USED

(Continued from page one)

The strikers stood on top of the hill taunting the police for awhile. Inspector Shirras and Sergeant Service with a small body of policemen came up toward them and the strikers backed up the cinder path and then headed for the rock pile behind the post office and armed themselves with missiles in defiance of the police. The police advanced on them but were driven back with a shower of rocks that might have caused some real damage.

The police then formed and, with their batons, drove the rioters up past the post office and broke the crowd up, the strikers fleeing in all directions. This last rush broke the riot and order was soon regained.

The Prince Rupert at the first sign of trouble pulled out into mid-stream and stayed there. Freight and other necessities were lightered to her as quickly as possible by the Salvage Princess and the boat pulled out for Anyox about noon.

Several of the policemen received minor cuts from flying rocks. Sgt. Service received some bad body bruises and cuts on the head. It was necessary to take one of the policemen to the hospital. He had received a bad blow behind the ear in the skirmish on the waterfront.

A bystander who was watching the trouble from beside the post office was accidentally hit on the head by a swinging baton of one of the policemen who was driving the crowd past the building, and was immediately taken to a doctor for attention.

Since the trouble the police have patrolled Second Avenue and the waterfront not allowing any of the strikers to congregate.

## Indo-China is Scene of Play Capitol Tonight

Jean Harlow and Clark Gable are seen together in the Red Dust tonight and tomorrow at the Capitol. As always they are superb players.

In Red Dust, the locale is the picturesque region of Cochinchina, with Gable playing a hardened plantation foreman who has forced himself to become completely brutalized in a effort to remain superior to his environment of deadly fever, tropical heat and treacherous natives.

The plot revolves about the dramatic triangle which results when a young engineer brings his wife to a rubber plantation settlement. The plantation's overseer, already involved with one girl, is now caught in a compromising situation with the wife of the engineer. The outcome of this crisis makes for a narrative containing more than the average share of suspense and stirring occurrences.

## Fewer Drunks In British Army Report Finds

LONDON, Feb. 28:—Drunkenness in the army has practically disappeared, according to the annual report of Lieut.-General Sir Harold Fawcus, Director-General, Army Medical Services. The various forms of recreation cater so thoroughly for so many, either as participants or as spectators, that little leisure is left for vicious pursuits. The Army School of Physical Training at Aldershot has eliminated, through its physiologists, the former wastage from disordered action of the heart and other disabilities which resulted from faulty training.

## Royal Favors For Bovril Limited

LONDON, March 1:—New honors have come to Bovril Ltd. through their appointment as purveyors by Special Warrant to H. R. H. the Prince of Wales.
