HANSON URGES BUILDING RAILROAD

UNEMPLOYMENT AND OTHER VITAL PROBLEMS IN SPEECH

All But Two of British Columbia Parliament Members Voted Favor of Building Peace River Railway

VOTES AGAINST NEW PACIFIC COAST OUTLET

OTTAWA, Feb. 23.—On Wednesday the House voted 133 to 39 against the construction of a railway outlet from the Peace River to the Pacific Coast at this time.

Olof Hanson, Member for Skeena, Urges That Real Work Be Given Unemployed on This Much Needed Project

OTTAWA, Feb. 23.—Seven Liberals and Labor members and four Conservatives from British Columbia voted for the Kennedy resolution moved yesterday calling for the building of a railway outlet from the Peace River country to the Pacific Coast. Two British Columbia Conservatives, Hon. H. H. Stevens and D. B. Plunkett (Victoria) opposed the motion. British Columbia Liberals and Laborites voting for the motion were: Hon. Ian Mackenzie, Olof Hanson, Wilfred Hanbury, A. E. Munn, Thomas Reid, A. W. Neill and Angus MacInnes (Labor, Vancouver South). The British Columbia Conservatives supporting the motion were: H. J. Barber, C. H. Dickie, W. K. Esling and J. A. Fraser.

CHOSE TRIAL AT ASSIZES

Five Men Who Took Part in Strike Demonstration at Anxoy Formally Committed

In the Provincial police court this morning Joe Sarvich, Kenny Montgomery, Matt Yjurjevich, W. R. McIver and George Sandedo were formally committed for trial by Magistrate McLeod on the charge of taking part in an unlawful assembly.

Directly afterwards the five men were taken before Judge Fisher to decide whether they would take speedy trial before him or await a jury trial at the spring assizes. They chose jury trial and bail was fixed at \$3,000 each.

Verigin Will Get Decision Saturday

HALIFAX, Feb. 23.—Peter Verigin, spiritual head of the Doukhobors in Canada, who is being detained in the immigration headquarters here, will appear in court Saturday to hear the judgment of Mr. Justice Mellish as to whether he shall be returned to Russia which is his native land, or not.

AUSTRALIA OPENS WELL AT CRICKET

SYDNEY, Aust., Feb. 23.—A strong fifth wicket stand gave Australia 296 runs for five wickets at the close of play today in the fifth test cricket match with England.

Campbell Broke Record Yesterday With Sprained Arm But Announces He Will Not Attempt Greater Speed

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., Feb. 23.—Sir Malcolm Campbell announced definitely today that he will make no more speed trials here this year. His decision followed the advice of his physician that it would not be advisable for him to race now because of his sprained arm. Sir Malcolm drove the return race against time yesterday with only one hand on the wheel. Asked later why he did so he said he did not like to disappoint the 50,000 people who were assembled on the adjoining dunes to watch the record-breaking effort. He rested twenty minutes after the first drive and even though his arm was sprained gave his car the gas and exceeded 270 miles an hour on the return. It was a wonderful exhibition of supreme nerve.

Ottawa Government is Wrestling With Big Financial Problem and Will Have to Float Loan This Year

OTTAWA, Feb. 23.—Canada will need over four hundred million dollars this year to make up the deficit in an unbalanced budget and to meet a debt maturity of about \$280,000,000. More than half of the expiring bonds are Victory Bonds maturing in the summer. To meet these large sums Premier Bennett and Finance Minister Rhodes will have to float a huge loan of loans and the rate of interest will be governed somewhat by the rate of interest paid by the banks for their savings deposits.

The matter has been already discussed with the heads of the big banking and other financial institutions and it is probable that in the near future the rate of bank interest will drop from three per cent as at present to two and a half per cent, but whether the announcement will be made by the government or by the banks is not ascertained. It is possible even that the rate may drop lower than two and a half per cent.

The amount added to Canada's debt this year is expected to be close to \$150,000,000 as against \$114,000,000 last year and about \$84,000,000 the previous year. Prior to that the debt had been reduced each year.

What the rate on the new government bonds will be is not yet apparent.

Japs to Expel Chinese From Jehol Province

SHANGHAI, Feb. 23.—Japan officially informed the Chinese Nationalist government today that unless Chinese troops are withdrawn from the Jehol Province, that Japanese and Manchukuan forces will expel them forcibly.

SENATE FOR THE CANAL

United States Committee Reports In Favor of Big Ditch to Sea

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—The Senate foreign relations committee on Wednesday favorably reported the treaty between United States and Canada for the construction of the St. Lawrence seaway.

The treaty provides for the deepening of some existing canals and construction of others between the Great Lakes and the sea, each country paying a share of the cost in a deach having equal privileges in the use of the seaway.

Hanson Asks Regard Gold

Premier Answers That Price Paid Producers Will be Regular One

OTTAWA, Feb. 23.—"I should like to ask the government if it intends to continue during 1933 the payment of a premium to gold producers of Canada," inquired Olof Hanson, member for Skeena, in the House of Commons yesterday.

"The price paid for gold is the price producers can obtain elsewhere, and that is all," answered Premier Bennett.

Industrialist Dies at Toronto

TORONTO, Feb. 23.—Harold F. Ritchie, president of the firm of that name, and industrialist with interests throughout the world, died here on Wednesday following a recent operation.

Speech from Throne at Victoria Today Deals With B.C. Conditions

Legislature Hears That Changes Will be Made in Mineral Act, School Act, Placer Mining Act and Vital Statistics Act

VICTORIA, Feb. 23.—The government's policy in meeting the problem of unemployment was dealt with in a speech from the throne delivered by the Lieutenant-Governor at the opening of the Legislature this afternoon.

The speech drew attention to the fact that prices and sales terms on crown lands that had been reverted for taxes had been revised so as to make it easy for them to be occupied by settlers. Until such time as conditions improve the Dominion-wide regulations for unemployment would continue. The province was endeavoring to create more employment by expanding the markets for its products. British Columbia's long standing claim for better terms had been placed before the Dominion government.

WILL LAUGH IN FUTURE

Cromie Says Sacred Cows and Monkeys no More Foolish than Sacred Interest Rates

CALGARY, Feb. 23— Canadians may laugh at India feeding twelve million head of sacred cows, sacred crows and sacred monkeys while millions of Hindus starve "but a few years hence Canadians will look back and also laugh at the present depression and the sacred cow we made of high-interest rates and gold standards."

This message was brought to Calgary in an address delivered at a joint luncheon of the Board of Trade and the Canadian Club by Robert Cromie, of Vancouver.

Millions of Canadian and Americans today "are being plunged into misery and penury through our governments trying to pay insupportably high interest rates and gold premiums, and trying to keep alive a huge pile of debts and over-capitalizations which should be cut to a half and quarter if those debts are to be paid," Mr. Cromie declared.

"Money is not a commodity, like wheat and lumber," he continued. "Money is only a token or symbol of goods or wages or property. Unless our governments and financial institutions quickly restore money to its proper function of distributing goods and wages, it is clear as day that the people will be forced to try some other token or inferior system."

"Freed from high interest rates and over-capitalization our capital system, I am certain, is quite capable of distributing the high quantities of food and goods which engineers and chemists with their new automatic machines are turning out for us."

"But give capitalism a fighting chance," begged Mr. Cromie, "and modify and adjust capitalism to present needs before it is too late. An individual or a country's ability to adjust itself is what determines their ability to survive."

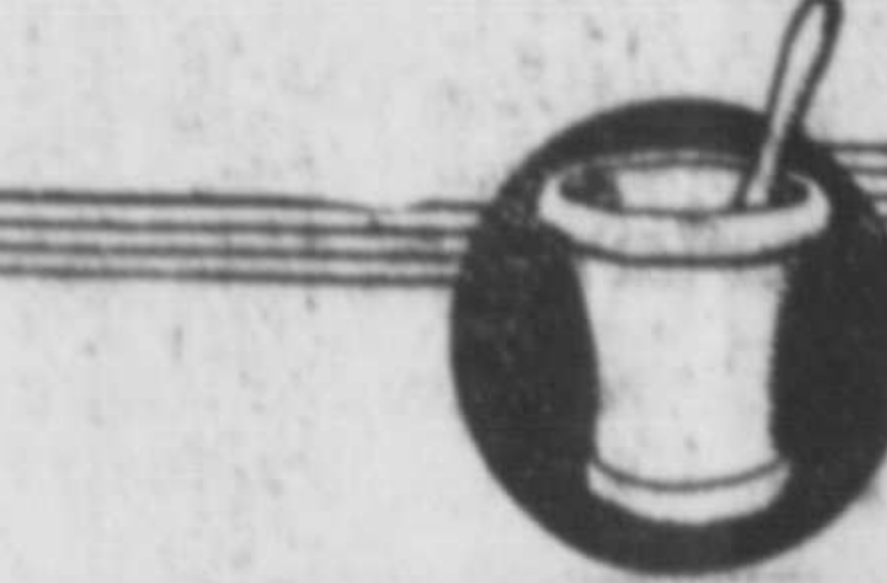

Father Wolfe Tells of Journey

Is Enjoying Sunshine of Southern Africa Especially After Damp Of Europe

Father Charles Wolfe, who for nearly twenty years ministered to the adherents of the Roman Catholic Church in this part of the province, has written to Rev. Father E. Allard. He has arrived in his new field in Africa and gives his first impressions to his clerical comrade. "I left Southampton, England, November 4 and arrived at Durban on November 27, having made only four stops: Madeira, Capetown, which looks like Vancouver, Port Elizabeth and East London.

"The whole time I was in Europe the weather was rather damp and cold which was not so very good for my bronchitis. But as soon as we arrived on the coast of Africa I felt the change for the better. It was so nice and warm. From then on we had sunshine every day, hotter and hotter, but the sea breeze helped along. I changed from black to white suit and looked a regular 'hot guy'.

"The town of Durban is very English, very clean and a busy seaport. The Zulus do most of the manual work. You meet them on the street, no hat on, no shoes on, and pretty near nothing between. Never knew there was so much difference between real black and white!

"I am not definitely located yet. After my arrival I was allowed a few days' rest. Not being accustomed to the heat I felt so sleepy to start with. But otherwise I am feeling fine, no more bronchitis trouble.

"December, January, February and the first part of March are the hottest months of the year. After that the winter is but the name only. There is hardly any twilight, it is dark inside of half-an-hour. South Africa is not Canada, for here they are not so far ahead in many ways. They have hard times too.

"Give my best wishes to all my friends. I shall never forget Canada and especially British Columbia. A part of my heart shall always be there."
