NO MONEY FROM BOOZE INTERESTS PROVINCIAL FUEL OIL TAX SUSTAINED BY PRIVY COUNCIL

Liberal Party Is Not Controlled By Liquor People, Says Pattullo

Contributions Received Solely in the Interests of Good Government and He is Absolutely Free and Untrammeled, Declares Leader of Opposition

KEREMEOS, Oct. 12: (CP)—"As liquor money has been specially singled out, let me say that I am advised that no liquor money has been contributed," stated T. D. Pattullo, Liberal leader, in a campaign address here last night. He was dealing with what he termed a suggestion that the Liberal party was controlled by the liquor interests through contributions to campaign funds.

"I am going to be quite perfectly frank," continued the Liberal leader. "I have not been advised of the names of each contributor to our organization funds but my instructions were that contributions were only to be received free from commitment of any kind and solely in the interests of good government. Monies contributed for improper purposes would be in the same category, whether from liquor or other interests. If anyone has contributed or proposes to contribute in consideration of receiving some privilege not in the public interest, his money has been or would be wasted. I stand before the people of British Columbia absolutely free and untrammeled to formulate legislation and carry out the administration with a purpose single to the public welfare."



HIS VIEW ON DEBTS

Cancellation Would Not Improve Economic Situation Much, Says Senator Borah

BOISE, Idaho, Oct. 12.—Senator William E. Borah has cabled London newspapers expressing his view that full cancellation of war debts by United States would only have a slight effect upon the general economic situation. He expressed the view that the United States had already treated Great Britain very generously in connection with war debts and urged that there was more likelihood of achieving results in bringing about an economic improvement in the world generally by tackling such other major problems as disarmament.

Visit to Stewart Cost This Man \$50

Deportee Turns Up Again in Canada But Falls Into Hands of Police Constable

Felix Seppi of Hyder, Alaska, who was recently sentenced to six months imprisonment at Stewart for bootlegging and ordered deported, turned up again recently in Stewart and was taken into custody by Provincial Constable Lance Potterton and fined \$50 and costs, with option of one month's imprisonment, on a charge of illegally entering the country. He paid the fine and was escorted to the border again.

CHICAGO, Oct. 12.—Six armed bandits held up a local taxi office and made their getaway with \$7,000 in cash.

Subscriptions Pouring In To DOMINION LOAN
OTTAWA, Oct. 12: (CP)—Subscriptions to the federal conversion loan of \$225,000,000 by latest estimates today had totalled \$156,000,000 with subscriptions in large volume still coming in. Hon. Edgar N. Rhodes, minister of finance, declared that he was extremely pleased with the success of the two days' response so far.

CHANGE IN TELEGRAPHHS

H. S. Meadows Succeeds L. W. Waugh as Manager at Canadian National Office

H. S. Meadows, who arrived in the city earlier in the week from New Westminster today assumed his duties as manager of the commercial office of Canadian National Telegraphs in succession to L. W. Waugh who has resigned.

Mr. Meadows joined the service of the company in 1916 and was for thirteen years manager at Prince Albert, Sask., having moved to the coast a few years ago. His wife and family will arrive here later to take up residence.

Dean of local telegraphers, Mr. Waugh has been located in Prince Rupert since the very early days and was with the Government Telegraphs for many years before joining the Canadian National Telegraphs. He is well known and popular and it will be generally regretted if the change involves his departure from the city.

THEIR WORK SIMPLIFIED

New Regulation Under Elections Act Pertaining to Independent Candidates

VICTORIA, Oct. 12: (CP)—A regulation under the Elections Act which has been signed by the Lieutenant Governor-in-Council is interpreted as placing all Independents in Vancouver-Burrard, Vancouver Centre, Vancouver East, Vancouver-Point Grey and Victoria under a general classification as Independents in order to simplify the work of the returning officers. A number of candidates running had qualifying names in their classification.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 12: (CP)—"If elected we will put the fear of God into Premier Bennett as well as the bankers," shouted G. G. McGeer, Liberal candidate for the riding of Vancouver—Burrard, amid a crescendo of commendation and protest at a Liberal rally here Tuesday night.

"Judge from this disorder," Mr. McGeer replied to hecklers, "what government under the C. C. F. would be like."

Government of British Columbia Will Collect \$400,000 by Judgment

Judicial Committee Finds That Impost is Intra Vires as Direct Tax Under British North America Act

LONDON, Oct. 12: (CP)—Nearly \$400,000 revenue will be restored to the Province of British Columbia by a judgment of the judicial committee of the Privy Council today which finds the provincial Fuel Oil Tax of 1930 valid. Their Lordships allowed the appeal of the Attorney General with costs from adverse British Columbia judgments on the government claim in a test case against the Kingcome Navigation Co. for \$3900 in back tax. The present Act, in their Lordships' opinion, is direct taxation within the meaning of Section 92 of the British North America Act and is, therefore, intra vires of the province.

THE NEW DEAL

Editor, Daily News:

The average man in the street says: "I have no faith in the old political gangs—Liberals or Conservatives." A careful perusal of Plank One of the new Liberal policy embodies a great, revolutionary principle, the establishment of an economic council.

This step means the intervention of the state in private economy. The establishment of an advisory board nominated by all the factors of production is the first step of a new deal. New Liberalism, which is less liberalism and more democracy, is finally conscious of the fact that national economy must be operated under a charter in order to serve

social needs. It goes to the root of the present troubles when it advocates the study of the question of "production and consumption in order to adjust it together with the numbers of hours per day and days of work per week, the standard of wages and commodity prices." In Plank One of the Liberal policy there are all the fundamental principles of the N. R. A.

We must honestly and frankly admit that the new Liberal policy has nothing in common with the old gang of laissez faire. It is ultra democratic. Roosevelt was also a mere liberal. All workers and citizens in general must get conscious of the fact that it is their duty to carefully study Plank One of the Liberal policy. Therein lies the solution of our troubles. There is a concrete pledge to grapple with the social problem in accord with the Canadian National Steamships, most up-to-date trend of political thought and action. There is no thought only.

FULL LIBERAL SLATE

BUSIEST MAN IN PROVINCE

T. D. Pattullo is today the busiest man in the province. When he left here recently he was expected to visit practically every constituency in the province except Peace River. That meant scarcely one day for each riding with several speeches a day in addition to attending to many detail matters and meeting as many as possible of the electors. It is a stupendous undertaking. Local people will understand from this how difficult it has been for him to meet them all individually. It would be useless for him to be elected in Prince Rupert and not carry the rest of the province. Happily the people here know him pretty well and will sympathize with his efforts. This is particularly true of the Queen Charlotte Islands which he has been unable to visit. Word from that part of the constituency indicates that he is receiving great support over there and that he will be given a handsome majority at most of the polling places.

INTEREST IS GREAT

While there is considerable election interest here, it is of a quiet, thoughtful nature, quite different from what is taking place in some parts of the province. Vancouver Island is seething with political action and some parts of the southern mainland show some excitement. We must ask our readers who are not much interested in politics to bear with us for a short time. It will be all over on November 2 and then we shall be able to think of other matters. It means so much to the province to have the right kind of government for the next few years.

A Brief Synopsis of Liberal Policy

HEREWITH is a brief synopsis of policy as laid down by the Liberal Party of British Columbia, in convention held in October, 1932.

Many matters of interest, not specifically set out, will require consideration. The principles enunciated are indicative of the Liberal viewpoint, and are broad enough to meet every question within provincial jurisdiction.

The Liberal Party exists as an official organization for the purpose of formulating and furthering measures that will make for the welfare of each individual member of society, and for the welfare of society as a whole.

Innumerable questions, both of public and personal character, can be properly treated only through the agency of government.

Government is not an ordinary business, but carries responsibility to meet every problem arising from our complex social and economic conditions, in order that not merely a few, but all of our people may live in reasonable comfort.

The Liberal Party pledges immediate action under the best available advice and closest study.

1.—Profitable and permanent Employment is the most important question facing our people. There should be co-operation between the national, provincial and municipal authorities and the Canadian banking system to establish the necessary credit to carry out a broad programme of constructive and useful wage-distributing public enterprise, and to further the health, education and well-being of all our people.

An Economic Council should be established, the membership of which shall consist of representatives of the various avenues of endeavour, such as health, education, agriculture, labour and the industries. This council will be appointed by the government on recommendation of the interests involved, and will act in an advisory capacity to the government.

Amongst other things the council will study industrial and social effort in the province and suggest means to correlate these efforts. It will familiarize itself with intra, inter-provincial and foreign trade, and will co-operate with the other provinces and the Dominion. It will also study such questions as production and consumption, and the marketing of our products, the number of hours of work per day and days of work per week, the standard of wages and commodity prices. These questions are of national as well as provincial concern, and British Columbia can take the lead in urging co-operation with the other provinces and the Dominion as a whole.

National Unemployment Insurance should be established upon a contributory basis.

2.—Our Financial position must be reviewed. Current expenditure must be kept within current revenue. While maintaining the credit of the province, effort must be made to reduce capital charges. We cannot continue to pay exorbitant rates of interest for money.

3.—The Taxation Structure must be revised with a view to reduction wherever possible, including exemption in the lower scale of wages and salaries.

4.—The Dominion Government will be asked to place the Province of British Columbia upon a basis of equality with the other provinces, and to this end request will be made for a Royal Commission to ascertain the extent to which the Province of British Columbia has not been given Equality of Treatment with the Other Provinces of the Dominion.

5.—There shall be a permanent Voters' List to ensure that all eligible voters are enrolled.




