Blind to the danger from tottering walls rescue workers dug frantically today into the debris of a wide area of this industrial city still finding bodies of persons slain or maimed. Estimates of the fatalities ran up to 300 with 66 bodies recovered.

GUARANTEE PUTS CITY BANKRUPT

Court Orders Commissioner Appointed Because of Default on Power Company Bonds

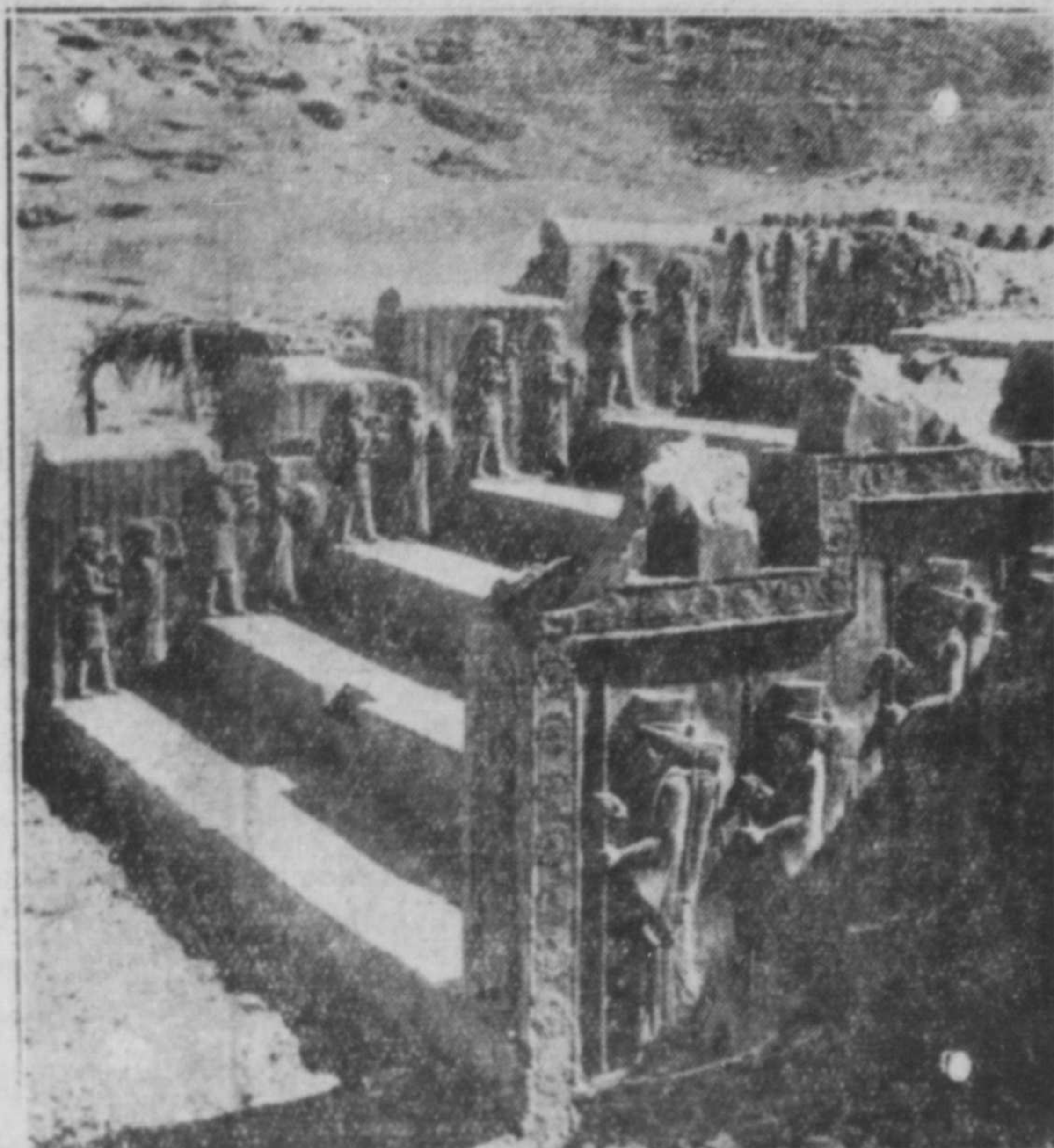

Mink Farm at Hazelton Starts

Five Animals Brought in From Vancouver Island To Be Nucleus of Industry

Albert Arnold, a resident of New Hazelton for quite a number of years has started fur farming and his first breeding stock has arrived and is now properly housed at his home on the hill, says the Omneca Herald. He started with mink and has three females and two males. One pair are Labrador mink and the other three are Quebec mink.

Arnold is the first in the immediate district to go in for fur farming, except those who started with rabbits. So far nothing has been heard of the rabbit-breeding from the commercial side. Arnold's experiment will be watched with a good deal of interest, although there is no reason whatever why it should not be successful as it is possible to find mink in the local ponds living in natural state.

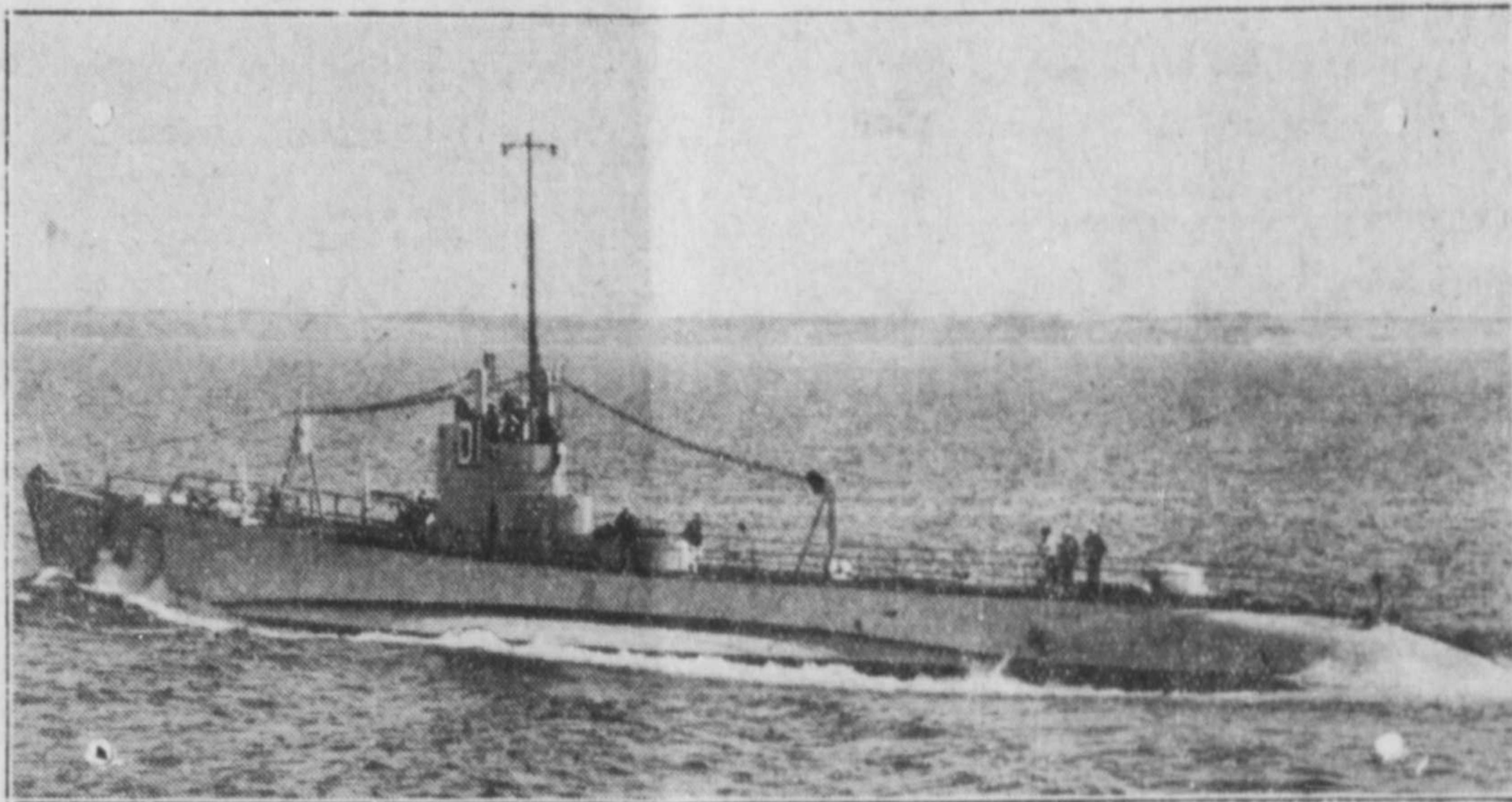

### WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Spring Salmon Scarce—Boats Being Built—Helga II Has Apparently Been Lost—Herring Hard to Find

There have been no catches of spring salmon to speak of yet. Bacon Fisheries have had a few fish in but it looks as if the weather is a little too cold for the king of all salmon to be taking the spoon yet. When these strong northerly winds let up and bait starts to appear, the catches of spring salmon should increase.

Boats may be lost or burnt up but there are always others taking their place. Two fairly big boats are under construction in the sheds around Cow Bay and it is probable that by spring or early summer they will be dipping their bows into the sea.

The Eric Roy came in port yesterday with what appeared to be a strange crew but on closer inspection it was found that it was only the skipper, Red Pierce and his partner George Dicks with the growth of a winter's beard on their faces. Red Pierce with his family and George Dicks have been out trapping all winter. When coming into civilization George shaved of the heavy growth but soon found out the folly of his ways for on returning to the cabin one of Red's children started to cry because a strange man was coming in to the cabin and poor George had a hard time convincing them he was still George despite his looks.

Three cars of fish left on last night's train for the east. This is the first fresh halibut that has been shipped out this year.

The Helga II, which was abandoned by her crew the other day in a heavy storm is now probably driftwood on the beach or has been driven far out to sea. Paul Armour, who searched for her from the sky, a height where one can command a view of a large territory, reported nary a sign of her.

The Helga II will be missed around the waterfront as she was a popular vessel. But the crew is safe.

The dry dock men were kept busy for a week on the Seigneur which left a couple of days ago for Vancouver to load for Japan.

Next week it is expected there will be a better idea as to what prices may be paid for halibut. The price of course is governed by how much can be secured from the dealers in the east. The sale yesterday was not much of a criterion. The first sale of importance will take place Monday and there are already two boats in port which are staying over for it.

While dealers are non-committal because they say it is quite impossible to tell what will happen that far ahead, there is a general impression on the waterfront that prices may stiffen considerably during the coming week.
