PROHIBITION IN STATES NOW ENDING

VESSEL OWNERS APPROVE OF HALIBUT CONSERVATION

Uncle Sam To Go Wet Tomorrow After Many Years of Prohibition

Sale of Spirits Will be Legal in Sixteen States of Union Tuesday Following Official Proclamations—Others Working on Wet Legislation

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 4: (CP)—Spirits, forbidden in the United States for thirteen years, may be legally sold again tomorrow in at least sixteen states of the Union with the official proclamation by President Franklin D. Roosevelt of the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment. The legislatures of several other states, dry as the veil of prohibition lifts, are at work on bills designed to permit the sale of liquor.

THIRTEEN VACANCIES

Late Senator Fisher Served in Municipal, Provincial and Federal Fields

OTTAWA, Dec. 4: (CP)—The death at Paris, Ont., at the end of last week of Senator John Fisher makes a record number of thirteen vacancies in the Upper Chamber.

Hon. John Henry Fisher of Paris, Ont., member of the Canadian Senate, whose death took place late last week, at the age of 78 years, had been a member of the Red Chamber for over sixteen years. His appointment thereto being made July 26, 1917, following a long public career in municipal, provincial and federal fields.

Born April 23, 1855, at Paris, Ont., of English-Irish descent, Senator Fisher was educated in that city and lived all his life there, becoming a prominent merchant. He was successively alderman, reeve and mayor of Paris, being chief magistrate for five years. He was also warden of the County of Brant for a time. He was defeated in candidature for the Ontario Legislature in 1898 and 1902 but was elected for North Brant seat in 1905 and re-elected in 1908. He resigned from the Legislature in 1911 and was elected to the House of Commons that year for Brant, defeating Hon. William Paterson, minister of customs in the Laurier government. He was a Conservative.

In 1883 Senator Fisher was married to Miss Jessie Martin of Paris. They had one son, Harold H. Fisher, Senator Fisher, who was actively identified with all kinds of athletic sports, was a Presbyterian.

WAS SHOT BY POLICE

Alleged Bandit Injured by Police Bullets in Vancouver—Two Companions Arrested

VANCOUVER, Dec. 4: (CP)—William Seranton was shot in both legs by the police last night and two companions were arrested with him. The trio are alleged to have been holding up a Fourth Avenue drug store.

Joan Crawford Is Reported Married To Franchot Tone

NEW YORK, Dec. 4:—Rumors were current here yesterday, although not definitely confirmed, that Joan Crawford, well known screen star, was married two weeks ago at Harrison, N.Y., to Franchot Tone, one of the newer luminaries of the talkies. Miss Crawford is due to get a final decree of divorce in California from Douglas Fairbanks Jr. in April and could not remarry in that state until that time.

Wong Hong, driver of a Sunrise Grocery delivery van, is appearing before Magistrate McClymont in city police court this afternoon on a charge of driving to the common danger. The charge is an outcome of an automobile smash-up at the west end of the Section Two bridge Saturday morning when the Sunrise vehicle side-swiped the delivery car of Selvig's meat market, both vehicles being damaged.

Russ-Italy Peace Pact

ROME, Dec. 4:—Following a conference yesterday between Maxim Litvinoff, commissar of foreign affairs for Soviet Russia, and Premier Benito Mussolini, it was announced that a complete understanding had been reached for a non-aggression pact between the two countries which will be signed at once.

RESIDENCE DESTROYED

Home of William Inglis, Park Avenue, Gutted by Fire Early Sunday Morning

The residence of Mr. and Mrs. William Inglis, 1143 Park Avenue, is practically a total loss as a result of a fire by which the entire interior was gutted early Sunday morning. Mrs. Inglis and little girl, aroused from their sleep by the smell of smoke, made their escape by climbing through a window to the verandah where they dressed. A few clothes, pictures and effects were saved but the blaze had such a hold by the time the fire department was called at 3:50 a.m. that it was impossible to save the home. There is understood to be good insurance coverage.

The cause of the fire appears to be uncertain although the origin is believed to have been near a stairway leading from kitchen to basement. There was a good fire on in a hot air furnace but the kitchen fire was out.

Halibut Men In Favor Of Lay-Overs of Third Of Time Spent Fishing

Delegates to Recent Conference With International Fisheries Commission Present Report to Local Association—American Fleet Going Under N.R.A. Code

The Canadian Halibut Vessel Owners' Association of Prince Rupert, at a meeting yesterday afternoon in the city council chamber, after hearing reports from the president, Capt. George Fritz, and past president, Capt. Dan Larsen, on a recent conference with the International Fisheries Commission at Seattle at which conservation regulations for the 1934 season were discussed, approved of a plan set forth by the commission whereby the boats would remain in port between trips for a lay-over amounting to one-third of the time they are out for each trip. In other words, if a boat took fifteen days for a trip, it would make a lay-over in port of five days before starting out on its next trip.

Such a system, it is believed, would have the double effect of curtailing the amount of fish taken and would also stabilize prices, actually resulting in more profit for the fleet than if there were no curb whatever on operations.

It is expected fishing will open about March 1 next year.

Capt. George Fritz, president, was in the chair at the meeting.

Under N.R.A. Code SEATTLE, Dec. 4:—More money for the fishermen with less work and a greater measure of conservation for the fishery was stated here yesterday to be assured as a result of the signing up of the Pacific halibut fishing industry under a National Recovery Act code.

CRAIGAVON ENCOURAGED

Government of Northern Ireland Endorsed—De Valera Elected

BELFAST, Ire., Dec. 4: (CP)—"Northern Ireland is assured of resolute and progressive government for another five years," said Viscount Craigavon, Premier of Ulster, following last week's general election as a result of which his government won 33 out of 52 seats in North Ireland Parliament. "I am much encouraged by the endorsement."

Eamonn de Valera, president of the Irish Free State, won a seat in South Down which, however, it is not expected he will actually occupy as to do so would involve his taking the oath of allegiance to the British Crown.

There are in Prince Rupert a number of salaried people who have no particular interest in Prince Rupert except to draw their salaries. The argument that buying at home will make the city prosperous does not appeal to them. They say they have nothing to gain by buying at home and they can get a little advantage sometimes by ordering from a mail order house. They see no reason why they should buy here.

There then is the problem with which the Junior Chamber has to deal. Can they meet the argument of the unattached-salaried person? It is their turn to speak.
