VANCOUVER, Feb. 20:-The Board of Police Commissioners on Saturday appointed John Cameron of New Westminster to the position of chief of police in Vancouver at about the same time that the Court of Appeal in Victoria was issuing an injunction against the board taking any such action.

Application for the injunction in Victoria made on behalf of Colonel . E. Edgel! was marked by charges of corruption and maliciousness, against Mayor Taylor and Police Commissioners E. M. Charman and A. J. Dumaresq for the manner in which they brought about the dismissal of Edgett.

Twenty-First Amendment Passed Congress Today and Goes to the Various States For Ratification

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20:-Congress today put the repeal of the Prohibition Amendment up to the states when the House of Representatives mustered the two-thirds vote required to approve the resolution already approved by the Senate.

Conventions in 36 states must approve to put the new amendment into effect. It wil be known as the Twentyfirst Amendment.
