STARTING NEW TOWN

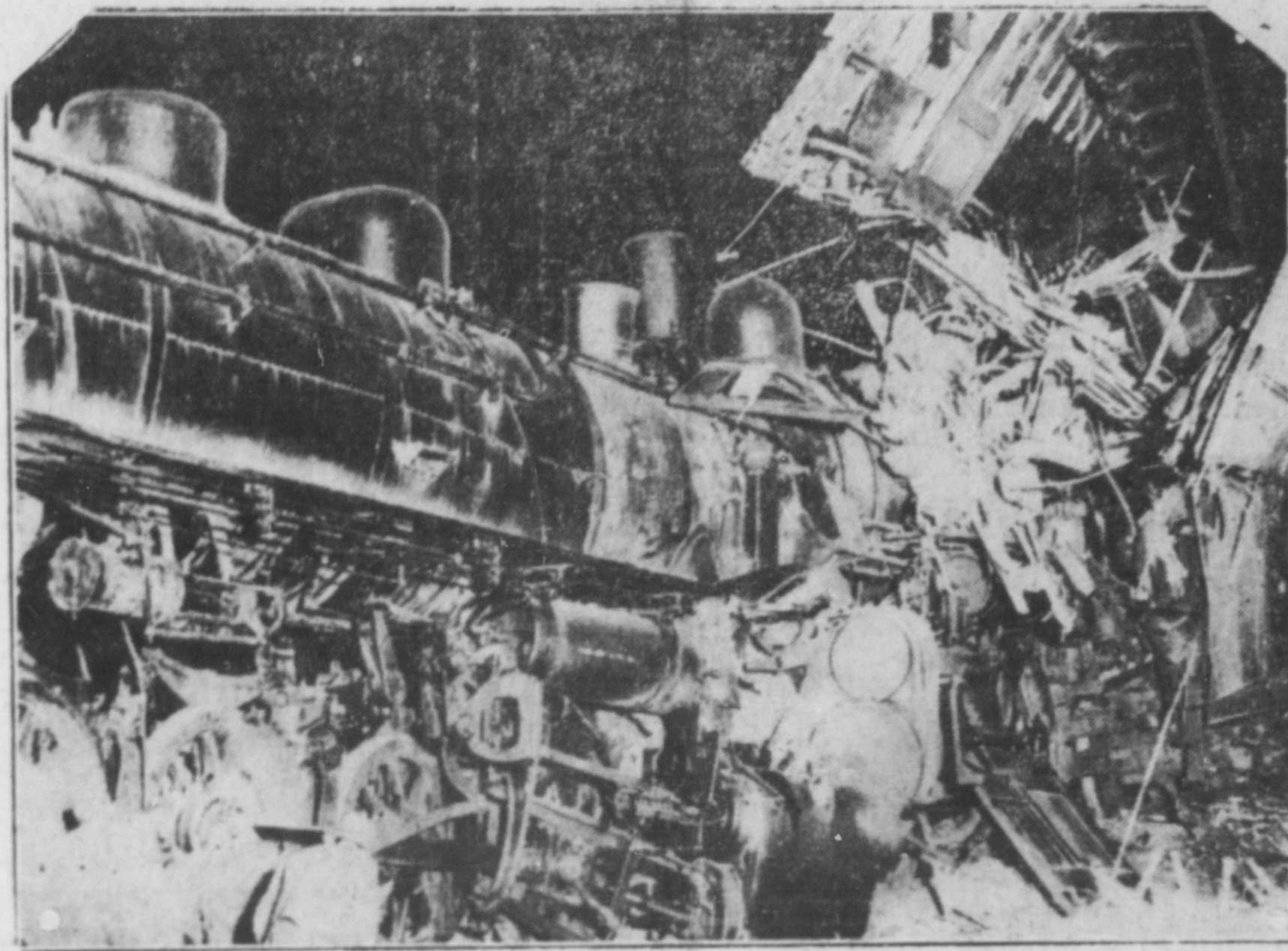
"Wells" After Well Known Mining Operator, to Be Name of Cariboo Settlement

NEW FORM OF GOVT

Throne Speech Provides For Putting Of Newfoundland Under Commission

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 28: (CP)—Legislation to implement the report of the Royal Commission recommending that the administration of Newfoundland be taken over by a commission of six members headed by the Governor was forecast in the Throne Speech at the opening of the Newfoundland Parliament yesterday.
Premier F. C. Alderdice, in recommending that the report of the Royal Commission be adopted, felt that, by doing so, the public of Newfoundland would be more speedily relieved of some of the burden which it is now carrying. He could foresee the day, he said, when Newfoundland would be freed of some of the serious difficulties which it was now facing and would be able to conduct its own affairs in the usual way.

UNCLE SAM'S EXPORTS UP

United States Sends Out \$34,000,000 More Goods in October Than September

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 28:—According to official statistics of the Department of Commerce, October export trade of the United States this year totalled \$194,000,000 as compared with \$160,000,000 in September. The October figure was the highest in the last two years.

Found Sterling and Canadian Dollar on New York Exchange

NEW YORK, Nov. 28:—The British pound sterling continued its decline on the New York foreign exchange market yesterday as the United States dollar continued to rise in European money markets. Sterling here on Saturday was \$5.19 the Canadian dollar, \$1.01 1/2, and the French franc, .0618.

Uncle Sam's Business Men And Industrial Leaders En Fete For Envoy of Soviet

NEW YORK, Nov. 28:—Some 2500 business, industrial and professional leaders attended a banquet which was tendered here to Maxim Litvinoff, commissar of foreign affairs for Soviet Russia, who was on his way home to Moscow following conferences with President Franklin D. Roosevelt which resulted in the recognition of the Soviet Republic by the United States. Back of the speakers' table the Red Flag, with its white hammer and sickle, was draped alongside Old Glory. At the opening of the proceedings the "Internationale" was sung immediately after the "Star Spangled Banner." General Atterbury, president of the Pennsylvania Railroad; John W. Davis, former ambassador to the Court of St. James, and John P. Morgan jr. were among those present.

MASSACRE OFFICERS

Serious Incident at End of Week In Civil War in Cuba

HAVANA, Cuba, Nov. 28:—Another serious incident occurred in the virtual state of civil warfare prevailing in Cuba at the end of the week when five former Army officers were massacred by unidentified assailants. The officers were being marched along a road under guard of the Grau San Martin government when they were ambushed and slain.

Currie's Condition Still Very Grave

Little Change Last Night Reported By Educator-Soldier's Physicians

MONTREAL, Nov. 28: (CP)—The condition of Sir Arthur Currie, president of McGill University and former commander-in-chief of the Canadian Corps in France, who is now suffering with pneumonia following a cerebral blood vessel blockade, was reported last night to be little changed. It was still grave and anxiety was acute.
Today attending doctors said that Sir Arthur was making a wonderful fight but his condition remained grave.

YESTERDAY'S ELECTION

Premier Pattullo is to be congratulated once more on having been endorsed by the election of four out of six of the Liberal candidates in Vancouver and Victoria yesterday. The members of his cabinet, Hon. John Hart in Victoria and Hon. Gordon Sloan in Vancouver, were elected and one other each in Vancouver and Victoria. It was a distinct victory although not so great a victory as to cause the Liberals to feel that they own the world.

Byron Johnson, who led the polls in Victoria, carrying the Liberal banner, was known some years ago in lacrosse circles as Boss Johnson. He is personally very popular in the capital. Herbert Anscombe, Independent Conservative, was reeve of Oak Bay and then mayor of Victoria. Now he is a member of the Legislature and will doubtless be making a bid for leadership there in a few years. Rev. Robert Connell, elected on the C. C. F. ticket, is a clergyman of the Church of England at present without a charge, a writer on nature subjects, a keen geologist and botanist, a socialist of many years' standing and a very fine type of man. Doubtless it was his personality rather than his political creed that placed him in fourth place among the winners.

Of the losers in Victoria Rev. Clem Davies, pastor of the City Temple, is very popular in the capital. He had attacked the new leader with considerable virulence and would have made a good opposition member. The failure of such men as Hayward, Clearhue and Moresby and the almost total slighting of Joe North, at one time hero of a police commission fight, indicates that even in Victoria political opinion changes quickly.

The large vote accorded the C. C. F. both in Vancouver and Victoria is an indication of the dissatisfaction which exists at the present condition of affairs both in the province and the Dominion generally and should be a solemn warning to those who still think all they have to do is to sit pat and use the police force in order to insure stability. That time is gone forever. We are at the beginning of a new era and there will have to be many political changes in the very near future. Those who do not fall in line will have to fall out. The evident demand of the British Columbia election is for a change of general policies and the same demand will be felt soon in the Dominion field. Happy is he who can envision the new deal and bend his energies toward bringing it about.

SAN JOSE LYNCHINGS

The local reaction to the lynchings in California seem to have varied a great deal. While some people feel that it is a good way to deal with such cases, others look upon it as a reflection on the United States system of dealing with criminal cases and indicates a fear that the criminals may escape that retribution which is their due. Also they look on it as a dangerous precedent. Once it becomes a habit for the mob to take the law into its own hands, the system of dealing with criminals is apt to degrade into one of mob law. Unhappily the mob is often wrong and, under the excitement of the moment, is liable to commit worse crimes than the criminals whom it is designed to suppress. It is doubtful too what may be the moral effect on a few thousand people who witnessed the execution and who jeered at the criminals as they were sent to meet their Maker. It smacks too much of the savagery of the North American Indians years ago.

IRISH LOSE IN FOOTBALL

defeated By Southern California For Third Straight Year—Stanford to Play in Rose Bowl

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Nov. 28—University of Southern California defeated Notre Dame for the third year in succession in United States intercollegiate football here Saturday, the score being 19 to nil. Thirteen thousand fans witnessed the game. It was the fifth defeat of the Irish so far this season. The most games they had lost in any previous season was four. The win of Southern California evened up the feud with the Irish since 1926 at four games each. The first period was scoreless.

Following their 7 to 3 victory over California, Stanford University received an official invitation from the Tournament of Roses committee to play in the annual New Year's Day Rose Bowl game at Pasadena. The invitation was accepted by Stanford which will have the right to select the team it will meet.

Before twenty thousand fans, University of Michigan defeated Northwestern 13 to nil to win the title for the season in that conference.

Army's defeat of Navy by a score of 12 to 7 was another feature of United States football activities on Saturday.

DEMPESEY IS HEARD

Blow of Luis Firpo in Historic Garden Bout Hardest of Career; Early Fights Toughest

Jack Dempsey, former world's heavyweight boxing champion, in a radio interview from Seattle last night, declared that the hardest blow he had ever received during his long fighting career was that at Madison Square Garden, New York, in 1923 when he was knocked out of the ring by Luis Firpo of the Argentine. "For the rest of that round I hardly knew what I was doing," admitted Dempsey, "but I was able to come back and knock out Firpo in the second round."

Asked as to what he considered the toughest fight during his ring career, Dempsey replied that he thought some of the early fights before he became title-holder in 1919 had been the toughest.

Dempsey is on a three weeks tour of the northwest appearing as referee in wrestling bouts. He will referee a headline bout on Emil Klank's squirming cap in Vancouver on Thursday of this week and will also visit Spokane.

Asked as to his wrestling experience, Dempsey explained that he had been a wrestler before he became a fighter.

CANADIENS HOLD LEAD

Better Position at Top of Hockey Standing as Result of Week-End Play

DETROIT, Nov. 28 (CP)—though defeated by the Red Wings here Sunday night, the Montreal Canadiens, by virtue of a victory Saturday night over the Maple Leafs at Toronto, increased their hold on first place in the international division of the National Hockey League to three points over the New York Americans, by virtue of a close conquest of the Senators at Ottawa, moved into fourth place, leaving Ottawa in the cellar.



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CASE IS MYSTERY

Chicago Authorities Still Baffled By Murder of Beautiful Young Woman

CHICAGO, Nov. 28.—Both Dr. Alice Lindsay Wynkoop, mother-in-law, and Earl Wynkoop, estranged husband of Rheta Wynkoop, who was slain in Chicago's operating room mystery of a few days ago, are under arrest charged with the murder of the beautiful young woman. Each evidently trying to shield the other, both have "confessed" to the crime and the police are at a loss to decide which if either, is the bona-fide confession. The young woman, authorities have announced, was given an overdose of chloroform on the operating room table in the mansion of the mother-in-law where Dr. Wynkoop was presumably giving her an examination. There were also traces of mercury in the liver but the woman is believed to have been alive when a shot was fired into her body, this being indicated by bleeding from the wound.

There is another theory that the mother-in-law and husband may have collaborated in the killing. Meantime, the investigation is proceeding and the case continues to excite much public interest.
