Effort Being Made to Organize Relief Expedition Here Today to Bring Aviator Out to Civilization

ORDERED TO SIBERIA

NEW YORK, July 7: (Canadian Press)—The Mattern rescue expedition, which is at present being held at Terrace, B.C. on account of unfavorable weather conditions, was this afternoon sent instructions by its backers here to proceed at once to Anadir, Siberia, to pick Mattern up and bring him out.

Advices were received in Prince Rupert this morning that Capt. James J. Mattern, young Texas flyer, who had been missing since June 14 when he took off from Khabarovsk, Siberia, for Nome, Alaska, in his Lockheed-Vega airplane in the course of an attempted flight around the world, had been found safe at Anadir, Chukotka, a lonely outpost on the isolated northeast coast of Siberia.

Apparently, owing to lack of communications, been unable up to this time to make contact with the outside world to tell of his safety. Through medium of Canadian Press contacts efforts were being made here today to form an expedition which might go to Anadir by air to pick up Mattern and bring him out. A request was conveyed to the Canadian Press representative of the Prince Rupert Daily News from William Alexander, pilot of the Mattern relief expedition, which is now at Terrace, to get in touch with the Boeing yacht Taconite, which has been cruising in local waters and have the flying boat, which is being used by the yachting party with Clayton L. Scott as pilot, come in to Prince Rupert and take members of the Alexander party north to Nome to get Mattern and bring him home.

ANDREWS, Scotland, July 7: (Canadian Press)—Walter Hagen of United States kept a one stroke lead in the British open golf championship yesterday by shooting 72, one under par, for his second round following his 68 on Wednesday. It soared to \$4.87 but receded to close at \$4.86 1/2. Today \$4.98 was reached, closing at \$4.95.

NORTHERLY CROP GOOD

Recent Rains Improve Prospects in Central and Southern Areas

Harvest August 1

WINNIPEG, July 7:—The northerly grain growing areas of the prairie provinces are continuing to show excellent crop conditions, according to the weekly crop report of the department of agriculture, Canadian National Railways. Recent rains have improved crop prospects in the central and southern areas although these may be too late to entirely counteract earlier drought damage. Local hail and grasshopper damage is noted but, in the aggregate, conditions are good along our lines.

In Manitoba In the Portage and Brandon divisions of Manitoba, the good rains received since the last report have much improved crop conditions. Grasshoppers have caused some damage. In the Carman subdivision, cutting is expected to start around August 1 under present weather conditions. From the Dauphin division come reports that from 30% to 50% of wheat is headed out and showing a stand of from 18 to 22 inches. All course grains are looking excellent.

Saskatchewan Conditions The Lampman, Riverhurst, Qu-Appelle and Central Butte subdivisions in Saskatchewan have experienced good weather during the past week but considerable damage is reported from grasshoppers and some hail damage is noted. More moisture is needed.

In the Prince Albert division, the most northerly crop producing area in Saskatchewan, prospects are generally good and growth has been rapid. Some hail damage is reported from the Paddockwood subdivision and more rains are needed.

Warm In Alberta In Central Alberta, the weather for the period under review has been mostly warm and cloudy with several scattered showers which have been very beneficial to the late sown grains. Wheat averages about ten inches and is in shot blade. Some crops are being ploughed under but, it is expected 60 to 80% of a normal crop will be harvested.

The Edmonton division reports all grains in need of more moisture but no damage from hail or pests.

In the Peace River territory weather has been mostly cool and showery. Crops are in good condition, there is plenty of moisture, but more warm weather would be beneficial.

There is very little change in the cattle market this week. There has been a fair sprinkling of dry fed cattle among receipts, meeting a ready outlet at prices well in line with the previous week. The hog and feeder trade is bad. The hog prospects are still unsettled.

PASSING OF SHIPMASTER

Capt. Stuart Stone, Formerly Skipper of Federalship, Dies

LOS ANGELES, July 7: (Canadian Press)—Capt. Stuart Stone, aged 45, well known Vancouver, B. C. shipmaster and central figure in two noted rum running cases in the California courts as master of the steamer Federal Ship, is dead here of acute peritonitis.

HARRIS ON WAY NORTH

Col. Victor Spencer's Junkers seaplane "City of Prince George," carrying W. S. (Duke) Harris, well known northern mining man on a prospecting expedition to Squaw Creek in the Rainy Hollow country of Northern British Columbia and the Pelly River district of the Yukon Territory, landed here shortly after noon today from Bella Bella and is awaiting an improvement in weather conditions before proceeding north from here. The plane came up from Bella Bella in one hour and forty minutes. It had flown from Vancouver to Bella Bella yesterday, stopping at the latter point last night on account of unfavorable weather.

Pilot W. L. McCluskey is in charge of the plane and the third party on board is a Vancouver prospector, D. J. McRae, whose property at Squaw Creek is among those to be visited by Mr. Harris. It is planned to spend a few days in the north, flying in via Carcross.

Reports Heard by Rotary Club at Its Weekly Luncheon

According to the report of the secretary, Glen Gulick, the Prince Rupert Rotary Club held its 641st luncheon yesterday. At most of these luncheons there were addresses given by members of the club or visitors and the secretary estimated that these, if given consecutively without break would take 27 days in delivery. It was the last luncheon of the club year and President G. A. Woodland, in handing over the reins of office to his successor, John Dybhavn, spoke of the successful year through which they have passed. The membership had been increased and the general tone of the club was excellent.

Alex McRae reported on the club finances, showing that all membership dues had been paid up and the club was quite solvent with a sufficient balance on hand with which to carry on.

George Munro installed the new president who spoke of the aims and objects of the club and asked for the co-operation of all the members.

John Davey had charge of the entertainment features, there being violin solos by Bert Cameron and vocal numbers by Mrs. A. J. Webber, all of which were much appreciated. Two visitors, Olof Hanson and George Dybhavn jr. were welcomed and the return of Colonel S. D. Johnston and Major C. V. WORLD WIDE ACTION TO SHORTEN WORKING TIME AND RAISE WAGES URGED

Feared Today That Great Britain is on Verge of Breaking Openly With European Gold Bloc—London Gathering is Proceeding

LONDON, July 7: (Canadian Press)—A large contribution to a revived and revised world economic conference which was saved from death yesterday by the united action of Prime Minister R. B. Bennett of Canada and the American delegates, is expected to be the proposal by the United States for world wide action in shortening hours of labor, increasing wages and raising agricultural prices. The French delegation was described today as fearing that Great Britain is in danger of breaking openly with the gold bloc.

PASSING OF PAINT MAN

MONTREAL, July 7: (Canadian Press)—George Henderson, aged 55, president and general manager of Brandram-Henderson Limited, paint manufacturers, died here yesterday following a lengthy illness. His firm is one of the largest in its line with branches in Halifax, St. John, Toronto, Winnipeg, Medicine Hat, Calgary and Edmonton. Mr. Henderson was also president of the Alberta Linseed Oil Co. Ltd. of Medicine Hat and of the Pacific White Lead Co. of Vancouver.

Born at Five Islands, Colchester County, N.S., January 21, 1878, Mr. Henderson was educated at Rothsey College School and Dalhousie University. The present business of Brandram-Henderson Ltd. was founded in 1876 under the name of Henderson & Potts, incorporating under the present name in 1906. Deceased had been associated with the business since 1898, was manager of the Maritime branches from 1906 to 1915, becoming president and general manager in the latter year. Under Mr. Henderson's management, the business branched into the west, acquiring a number of other firms which were either absorbed or operated as subsidiaries.

Mr. Henderson was active in the affairs of the Canadian Paint, Oil and Varnish Association, of which he was president from 1916 to 1923. He was also chairman of the Canadian "Save the Surface" campaign committee from 1912 to 1925. He was a member of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association of which he became second vice-president in 1931. He was president of the Montreal Board of Trade in 1928. He was president of the Dalhousie Alumni Association from 1926 to 1917. In politics he was a Conservative and an Anglican in religious belief.

Married in 1903 to Miss Annie Lea Keith of Halifax. Mr. Henderson is survived by one son and three daughters. His recreations were golf, tennis and fishing.

Melt the butter in top of double boiler. Add flour and seasonings, blend well and pour in gradually the milk diluted with water, stirring constantly until the mixture is smooth and thick. Continue to cook fifteen minutes in the double boiler.
