MORE SUN AND RAIN

Weather Summary For This Year to Date Compares Favorably With 1932

While sunshine in Prince Rupert so far this year has amounted to a total of 210.2 hours which is slightly less than the 218.8 hours recorded during the first four months of 1932, precipitation for 1932 to date standing at 30.44 inches is considerably less than the total of 34.07 inches registered during the corresponding period of 1932.

There was 95.5 hours of sunshine in Prince Rupert in April this year as compared with 109.4 hours in the same month last year. Precipitation for this April totalled 7.44 inches as against 3.26 inches in April last year.

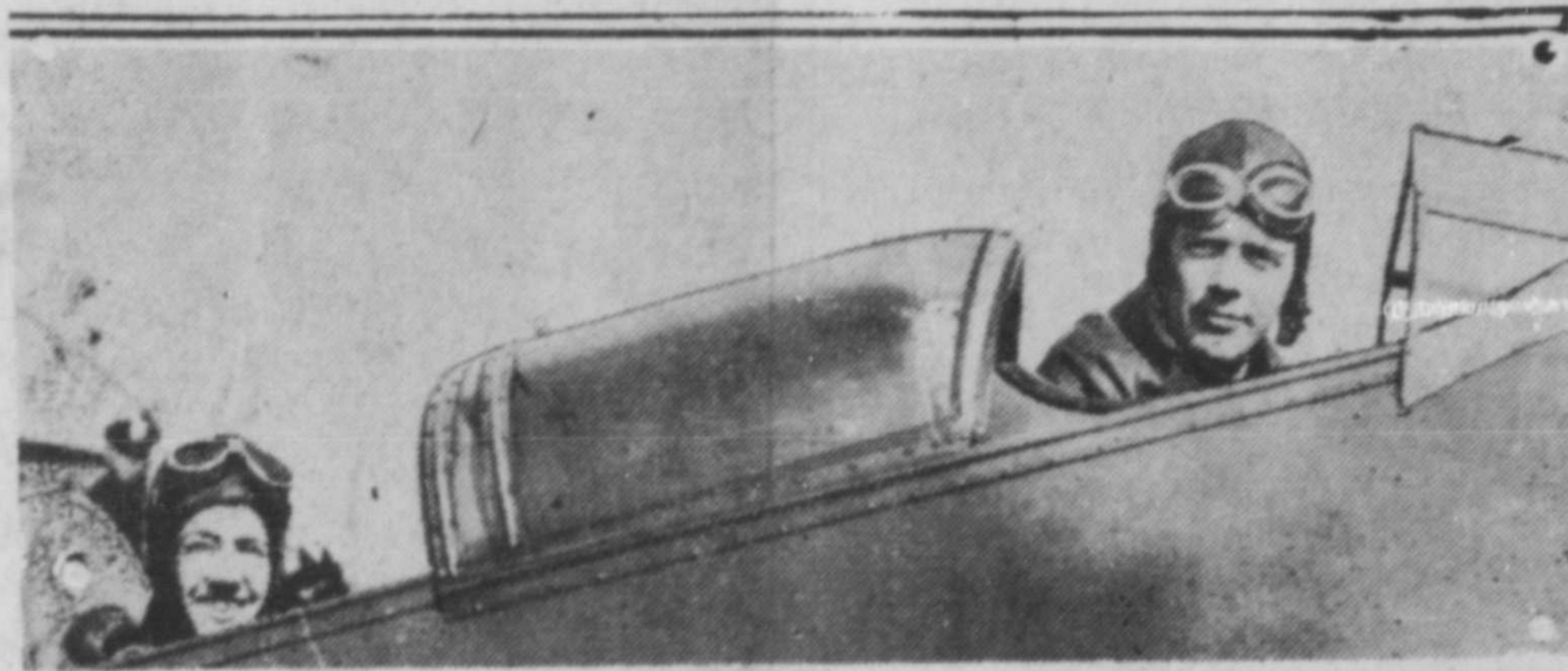
KINGSTON PEN RIOT

HERRIOT PLEASED

Glad That President Roosevelt Sees Necessity for Anti-Agression Protection

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 1:—Before leaving late last week on his return to France after attending conversations here with President Franklin D. Roosevelt preparatory to the forthcoming world economic conference in London, Premier Edouard Herriot of France expressed particular pleasure at the fact that President Roosevelt had agreed to the principle of protection of any nation which might be threatened with aggression under the Kellogg-Briand Pact.

AMENDMENTS ARE URGED

Proposed Changes in Pensions Act Submitted to House of Commons

OTTAWA, May 1:—J. R. Bowler, general secretary of the Canadian Legion, has laid before the House of Commons committee three amendments to the present Pensions Act opposing the abandoning of pension courts and recommending limited powers for the reviewing officer.

Effect of Earth Disturbance In Alaska on Fisheries Being Studied; Traps to be Limited

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 1: (Canadian Press)—Frank T. Bell of Spokane, new commissioner of fisheries, said Saturday that he was watching carefully the effects of recent volcanic action and earthquakes in Alaska on the salmon fisheries. Asserting that the only administrative changes contemplated by him would be those absolutely essential, he said that fatalities resulting from recent disturbances might make necessary certain restrictions upon fishing.

ELECTION IN FALL?

Manson Predicts That Poll Will be Delayed Until Then by Premier Tolmie—Liberals Best

VANCOUVER, May 1:—Prediction that the provincial election will not take place until September or October was made by A. M. Manson, K.C., M.L.A., addressing South Main Liberal Association.

Warning against being led away by new parties was also uttered by Mr. Manson, who said that the inevitable result of the formation of new parties was to create a multiplicity of candidates and confusion in the electors' mind.

Already there were the Tolmie Tories, the Bowser Tories, the Liberals and the C. C. F. in the field, he said. But of them all the only group offering an orderly, progressive program for the government of the province and the welfare of its people was the Liberal party.

Delegates were elected to the Vancouver-Point Grey nominating convention to be held at Kerrisdale on May 10.

VETOED BY GOVERNOR

Chief Executive of California Refuses to Permit Pari-Mutuel Betting in His State

SACRAMENTO, Cal., May 1:—Governor James Rolph, jr., at the end of the week vetoed the California horse racing bill which would have legalized pari-mutuel betting on race tracks of the state. Governor Rolph stated that "social and moral" reasons had actuated him in vetoing the bill and that he further considered it his duty to do so in view of the sentiments of the people against such betting as expressed in two recent referendums.

Reduction of Twenty Percent Recommended by Conciliation Board

Employees of Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Announce They Will Not Accept Majority Finding of Arbitration Board

OTTAWA, May 1: (Canadian Press)—Reduction of twenty percent from basis rates was recommended today in the majority report of the board of conciliation named to deal with the wage dispute between Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways and locomotive engineers, firemen, conductors, trainmen and telegraphers. May 1 is recommended as the date for the reductions to come into effect.

Final Notice of Motion Given in Dall By President de Valera

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, May 1:—President Eamonn de Valera has given final notice in the Dail Eireann of motion necessary for the removal of the oath of allegiance to the British crown.

LONDON, May 1:—Col. Wedgwood, Independent Labor member, described the proposal to tax outside holders of Canadian bonds as "a disastrous precedent which may be followed in other Dominions."

Degree of Bachelor of Divinity is Conferred Upon Rev. T. H. Wright

Rev. T. H. Wright, B.A., formerly of Hazelton and now residing in Vancouver, received the Degree of Bachelor of Divinity at the recent convocation of Union College of the United Church of Canada. Mr. Wright majored in philosophy of religion under Principal Brown. During the year Mr. Wright has been in attendance at the college and, over and above his thesis requirements, took philosophy of religion from Principal J. G. Brown and social science from Rev. Dr. A. M. Sanford.

TURN DOWN BONUS BILL

United States' Senate Rejects Two Billion Dollar Veterans' Relief Measure

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 1:—By a vote of 60 to 28, the Senate at the end of the week defeated the bill which would have provided \$2,000,000,000 additional relief for war veterans. It is considered likely that a similar measure will be re-introduced later.

DOCTOR IS COMMITTED

Medical Practitioner of Wiarton, Ont., Alleged to Have Pushed Man Out of Window

TORONTO, May 1:—Dr. Charles Wigle of Wiarton was committed for trial by Judge Coatsworth in connection with a charge of assault and doing bodily harm in that he allegedly pushed John Riley of Toronto out of a second-storey window in a hotel.

AMSTERDAM, Holland, May 1:—Parties of the right retain a majority in the lower chamber of the Netherlands as an outcome of last week's four-year election and Dr. H. Colignes is likely to be called upon to form a cabinet.

U. S. MAGAZINES IN CANADA

About two years ago the Canadian government imposed a tax on magazines coming into Canada from the United States. The result has been that the sales have declined something like fifty percent.

A few of the United States magazines are now printing in Canada special Canadian editions but mostly they are of the poorer type of literature. They deal chiefly with the love interest or they are "thrillers" and some are described as "purple passion" magazines.

Pictorial Review, although published in Canada, has dropped about sixty percent in circulation in this country in the two years. Liberty has gained thirty-two percent and the Munsey books have gained one hundred and three percent. Popular Science Monthly, not printed in Canada, has, during the same period, gained eleven percent. The largest drops have been made by such outstanding periodicals as American Boy, American Magazine, Colliers, Country Gentleman, House and Garden, Ladies' Home Journal, Red Book, Saturday Evening Post, Scribner's, Vogue and Woman's Home Companion with the greatest loss of all to Literary Digest which dropped eighty-one percent.

The sad part about the change is that, speaking generally, the better class of magazines have been denied to Canadian readers while the magazines that pander to the passions and prejudices of the people have increased in circulation.

ASSIZES ON THIS WEEK

Session Will be One of Heaviest in Years as Far as Time is Concerned—List of Cases

In the matter of time which it is expected will be taken up by the trials, the spring session of the Supreme Court Assizes, opening here on Thursday morning of this week with Mr. Justice Denis Murphy as the presiding judge, is expected to be one of the heaviest on record in several years.

The criminal case in which E. C. Dawson of Smithers is charged on two counts of arson is expected to be the longest, taking up possibly the better part of a week. There are upwards of forty witnesses to be heard and several truckloads of evidence has also been brought from Smithers for the trial.

In addition to the Dawson case, there will be the cases arising out of the recent "strike" situation at Anyox. As a result of a disturbance at Prince Rupert, Robert Thomas Maryland Carter and Nina Gurvich will face trial on charges of rioting while, as an outcome of a riot at Anyox, Kenneth Montgomery, Giovanna Sanvide, Matt Jurjevich, Angus McIvor and Joseph Sarich are charged with unlawful assembly.

L. S. McGill of Smithers will, it is understood, act as crown prosecutor at the Assizes. Gordon Grant of Vancouver will be counsel for the defence in the rioting and unlawful assembly cases while defence counsel in the Dawson arson case will be J. T. Harvey.

In addition to the criminal cases, there will be two civil actions and three divorce suits. The civil cases are as follows:

Condition of Big Missouri

Recommendation Made That Further Exploration Work be Carried on at the Property

In view of the renewed interest taken in Portland Canal mines as a result of the improved price of silver the reference to Big Missouri in the last annual report of Consolidated Smelters in regard to the mine is of interest:

"Upon the completion of the diamond drilling in January, no further development was performed; watchmen being in charge of the property." Following a general discussion with Drs. Mead and Jure, Dr. Jure made a further investigation of its geological features and through the courtesy of the Premier was able to make a comparison of the conditions of the two properties.

His summary and conclusions are interesting, in that he states that: "Geological conditions are similar to those at the Premier Mine, with regard to the rock types and structural conditions. The silicified zones are identical in appearance to the zones in which the ore occurs at the Premier." He notes four strong and persistent ore-bearing silicified zones on the property, which in places, carry free gold, and suggests further development on the Province level in the extensions of the drift south on zone "A," and north for the development of zone "D," with further exploration in diamond drilling and crosscutting from them.

Dr. Jure also states that, "since the nature of the Premier ore changes in a few hundred feet vertically, it can also change on this property for better or for worse, and with the failure to develop commercial ore on the Province tunnel level, the property could hardly be abandoned without the investigation of a lower horizon, which could be undertaken by an adit from the southwest corner of the property along zone "B."

April Halibut Landings Down

Less Fish Was Handled in Month This Year Than Last—Total 1,447,000 Pounds

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the month of April this year totalled 1,447,000 pounds consisting of 728,000 pounds American and 719,000 pounds Canadian fish. Last year in April landings amounted to 1,627,000 pounds of which 1,028,000 pounds was from American vessels and 599,000 pounds from Canadian.
