



### New Departure In Planes Imitates Bird



New competition for the denizens of the air appears with the first showing of this bird-like aeroplane, built by Jonathan E. Caldwell, shown above with his new departure in aeronautics. With three, wings on each side, substituting a rotary motion for the flapping action of the bird, the machine is balanced. Valves open on the up-stroke and close on the down-stroke, functioning pdecisely as the feathers in a bird's wing. Vertical or horizontal flight is dependent on the angle at which the wings are held. Caldwell believes mastery of the principle of bird flight will mean perfecting of the cheapest and safest form of air travel.
