That is Avowed Aim of Communist Party Says Rev. Dr. MacNeill At Edmonton

EDMONTON, Jan. 23:-An avowed purpose of the Russian Communist party, which controls the Soviet government, is to wipe out every vestige of religion, declared Rev. John MacNeill, D.D., of McMaster University, Hamilton, in addressing the meeting of the Western Baptist Union at First Baptist Church.

The Bible was suppressed and by means of subtle tactics and propaganda, the Communists were doing everything in their power to relegate religion to oblivion.

Dr. MacNeill was greeted with a crowded church auditorium. Every available seat was occupied, while there were many standees at the back and in the outer corridor.

"Along the Russian Border" was the theme taken by Dr. MacNeill as his general topic.

Usurped Control

While there were only about 1,-000,000 Communists in Russia, out of a total population of 160,000,000. this minority, nevertheless, had usurped control of government and ruled with a rod of iron.

#### SCRIP FOR CITY

It has been seriously proposed that the city of Prince Rupert shall put out an issue of scrip to pay for unemployment relief. This might take the form of the wooden money issued at a number of places in the United States or it might be something more original such as a scrap of fish skin leather stamped with the corporate seal of the municipality.

It is pointed out that in most cases where scrip of original design has been issued, a large part of it was never redeemed as it was in such demand by collectors that it was sent to the far ends of the world and fell into the hands

of collectors.

If such a suggestion were adopted a special design might be made in which the salmon or the halibut would figure largely. If printed or stamped on leather it would be something different from others and fish skin is seriously suggested as the most suitable leather. Dog fish are often skinned and the hide tanned. A few of these may be seen in the city but it would take many hundreds of the skins to issue any considerable amount of dollar or half dollar leather pieces.

The proposal is worthy of serious consideration as a means of meeting the present stringency. The issue might be redeemable in the month of August and outlawed if not

returned during that month.




