West Wind Causes Blaze to Spread Quickly After Starting in Garage-Destroyed Twenty-Four Buildings But Now Under Control

CORNWALL, Ont., Aug. 7:-Whipped by a steady west wind a fire swept through the business section of this city today threatening the entire town. This afternoon twenty buildings were ablaze and the fire out of control. The fire started in a garage on Pitt Street, spread quickly to the Victoria skating rink and in a few minutes had spread to the entire west side of Main Street.
