Six Hundred Christians Reported to Have Been Slaughtered by Kurds-Each Side Holds Other Responsible For Outbreak of Trouble

BAGDAD, Iraq, Aug. 18: (CP)-Killing of more than six hundred Assyrian Christians in conflicts with the Kurds and Iraq forces in Northern Iraq has climaxed an international situation in which Great Britain, as the formal mandatory power over Iraq, has been moved to take a hand.
