## CONFERENCE ADJOURNMENT DATE SET

## VANCOUVER ISLAND TOWN VISITED BY DISASTROUS FIRE

### Public Works Recovery Program Frowned Upon By British Spokesman

Britain is Said to be Dissatisfied at American Dominance—Caustic Remarks Made by United States Spokesmen at World Conference

LONDON, July 14: (Canadian Press)—The proposal of President Franklin D. Roosevelt of United States for an international public works construction recovery program failed to find favor with British spokesmen at the world economic conference yesterday. Rt. Hon. Walter Runciman, President of the Board of Trade, declared that such

a plan, as an international policy did not seem to be necessary and that such projects were rather a matter for individual nations to deal with.

Runciman told the conference that the British government had found public works programs to be the "most unremunerative of all efforts to reduce unemployment."

United States representatives expressed resentment at Runciman's unsympathetic attitude toward the proposal and declared that it was rejected, like other American plans, owing to Great Britain's resentment at "United States' continued dominance of the conference as far as constructive proposals are concerned." Incidentally, United States spokesmen expressed the opinion that the conference was "now in its death throes owing to this continued attitude on the part of Great Britain."

The steering committee of the conference decided today to declare a recess of the world wide parley on July 27.

### Main Business Section of Cumberland Wiped Out By Big Blaze

Eighteen Business Buildings and Ten Residences Destroyed in \$110,000 Blaze Yesterday Afternoon

CUMBERLAND, Vancouver Island, July 14: (Canadian Press)—Fire, which is believed to have started in the King George Hotel, swept the main street of this town yesterday afternoon, razing eighteen business buildings and ten homes. Damage is conservatively estimated at \$110,000.

The Royal Bank of Canada building was dynamited to halt the onslaught of the flames which threatened to jump Dunsmuir Street and sweep another block of buildings.

Places destroyed, among them some of the town's leading business premises, include the Pay and Save Grocery, McLean's jewelry store, the King George Hotel, Mumford's grocery, Lang's drug store, McKinnon's dry goods store, Royal candy store, Scavarda's grocery, Marochi's bakery, Cumberland Hotel, Welsh Society Hall, Farmers' Cafe, Campbell Bros' department store, Spooner's barber shop, Galleazi's shoe repairing shop, King's stationery store, the Royal Bank of Canada and Government Liquor Store.

Firemen and volunteer fire fighters suffered minor injuries but there were no serious casualties.

### NORTHWEST CROP GOOD

Southerly Territory of Prairies Will Not Be Able to Recover Fully From Recent Heat

WINNIPEG, July 14:—The north-westerly wheat growing areas of the prairie provinces continue to show good crop prospects, greatly exceeding those of contiguous southerly territory where recent rains have been most beneficial but previously heat-damaged areas cannot fully recover, according to the weekly crop report of the department of agriculture, Canadian National Railways.

In the Portage-Brandon division of Manitoba, light showers and heavier rains are reported. Some fall rye cutting has commenced with wheat starting to color. Grass-hopper damage varies. Harvesting should be very early in this division. The Dauphin division reports warm weather with heavy showers. Wheat is headed out and coarse grains are commencing to head. There has been a small amount of hail but no serious damage is reported. An excellent hay crop is being harvested and general indications are for a better than average grain crop.

In the southern area of Saskatchewan recent rains have improved prospects, but a short, patchy crop appears to be the prospect for that area. The feed situation has improved. Much of the wheat is now in shot blade and well over 50% in head. The Prince Albert division reports one heavy damaging hail storm in the Hoey district but no other damage is noted. Crops are in good condition. Wheat is heading out nicely and coarse grains are making splendid progress. Prospects generally are excellent.

In Alberta during the past week has been mostly warm with scattered rains. More moisture is needed. Where wheat is headed out, it is very short and a below average crop is all that can be anticipated.

The Edmonton division reports all grains progressing rapidly. No damage from any source is noted, wheat is now headed out and prospects at the present time for an average good crop appear to be very good.

Throughout the whole of the Peace River territory the weather has been warm and showery. Grain is progressing well. Some wheat is beginning to head out and prospects appear to be excellent. Cattle and hog receipts this week show considerable falling off compared with last week. For this reason quality cattle have been selling a shade stronger.

### BIG RUN OF FISH

Great Activity Reported in Bristol Bay Region By Attorney General of Alaska

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, July 14: (Canadian Press)—Attorney General James Truitt, returning here from a flight to the Bering Sea region, said that the greatest salmon run in history was keeping the fisheries and the canneries working overtime in the Bristol Bay region.

### Trades and Labor Council Delegates For Mass Meeting

At a meeting of the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council last night, President S. D. Macdonald, Vice-President W. M. Brown and F. W. Stamp-Vincent were named delegates to attend a mass meeting of local organized labor tomorrow night when the present situation as far as municipal relief work is concerned and possible political action in the provincial field will be considered.

### CUBS MOVE TO SECOND

Cardinals Suffer Reverse in National League—Athletics Drop In American

CHICAGO, July 14: (Canadian Press)—Scoring another victory over the Brooklyn Dodgers here yesterday, the Chicago Cubs took possession of second place in the National League, displacing the St. Louis Cardinals who were defeated again at St. Louis by the league-leading New York Giants in a closely contested game. The margin of the Giants' league leadership is now four and a half games.

In the American League at Washington, the Senators lost to the Chicago White Sox, who connected with 20 hits, and Washington had its margin of leadership reduced to two full games over the New York Yanks who ignominiously blanked the St. Louis Browns at Yankee Stadium. The Philadelphia Athletics lost a close game at Shibe Park to the Cleveland Indians and yielded third place to the White Sox.

### Jack Crawford Favored to Win Over Fred Perry

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 14:—Jack Crawford of Australia is favored heavily to win over Fred Perry of England in the final singles event of Davis Cup zone tennis play here tomorrow. Yesterday Crawford won over "Bunny" Austin of England while Perry defeated Vivian McGrath of England. Great Britain took a two to one lead over Australia today when George Patrick Hughes and Fred Perry of England defeated Adrian Quist and Don Turnbull of Australia 7-5, 6-4, 3-6, 6-3.

### TATTOO IS WONDERFUL

C. V. Evitt Told of Spectacular Event at Aldershot During His Recent Visit

The outstanding feature of the address yesterday at the Rotary Club luncheon by Major C. V. Evitt was the description of the Military Tattoo at Aldershot which was witnessed by 65,000 people. This event opened with community singing, the whole multitude joining in and singing the old war songs and closing with "Abide With Me." Fourteen regimental bands took part, playing as a unit, and it was most thrilling to hear them. Among the features of the Tattoo was the formation of the old British square, the death of Gordon, the defeat of the Dervishes at Omdurman and, finally, the scenes illustrating the difference between ancient and modern warfare. Ancient fighting was depicted by the archers in green, the news of war being declared, the arrival of the knights and their retainers and the moving away for France prior to the Battle of Agincourt. Compared with this was a display of machine gun action, modern tank movements, light and heavy artillery, planes and, finally, a torchlight procession. Over 5,000 people took part in the tattoo.

### England In Spring

Mr. Evitt told most interestingly of seeing once more the country in spring with its wonderful green fields and hedges. He said he was thrilled with the sight. Once again he heard the cuckoo, and the primroses were blooming wild in the fields and along the hedgerows. On one picnic in the New Forest they were sitting on the ground having lunch when they heard the cry of the hounds and, as it came nearer, they moved out of the way and a pack of hounds crossed the spot where they had been sitting. ### BIG DAY ON MART

Turnover in New York Yesterday 7,450,000 Shares, Largest in Over Three Years

NEW YORK, July 14:—The New York Stock Exchange experienced its heaviest day of trading in over three years yesterday when 7,450,000 shares changed hands, the turnover being the largest recorded on any single day since May 5, 1930.

Bull activities forced all securities and commodity prices upward, industrials gaining .96 on the average for the day; rails, .22; utilities, .87, and bonds, .68.

Silver and rubber futures showed continued strength. Bar silver closed at 40½c per ounce yesterday and dropped back to 39½c today. Copper closed yesterday at 8½c and 9c and was unchanged today.

May wheat closed at \$1.05½.

#### SPECTACULAR INVASION

The invasion of this continent by the Italian seaplane squadron is a spectacular one and quite worthy of the efforts of the reborn Roman Empire. All that would have been necessary to complete the triumphal flight would have been to have Il Duce accompany General Balbo to Chicago, then fly to Washington, hover around the White House and drop a friendly tear bomb on the Houses of Congress.

We are glad to have General Balbo and his fleet on a friendly visit to Canada. It is the first time that anything of the kind has happened and the people of Italian origin in this country will be particularly pleased with the visit. It is one of those events which will tend to draw the nations of the world together, better, perhaps, than conferences and treaties. We are glad to add a word of welcome to those expressed in all parts of Canada.

#### WHEN WAS THE CHANGE?

Authorities do not agree as to exactly when the change for the better in business conditions took place. Statistics prepared by McConnell and Ferguson, the advertising agents, indicate that the bottom was reached last February and that it was April before any appreciable increase in business commenced.

While the improvement has not been large, so far, it has been real and the trends are all upward. The advances in the prices of wheat and other commodities, while influenced to some extent by the inflation of the American dollar, cannot have been dependent wholly on the change in money values because the advance has been out of all proportion to the inflation.

The outlook is very encouraging and September should see a considerable revival of business in Prince Rupert as a result of the improved prices.

## FACTOR IS RELEASED

Millionaire Chicago Speculator Gets Freedom Unharmed Following Kidnapping

CHICAGO, July 14.—One of the most spectacular of many recent kidnaping cases in this country culminated soon after midnight yesterday morning when John Factor, better known as "Jake the Barber," millionaire ex-gangster speculator, was released unharmed from an automobile in the outskirts of Chicago.

Factor had been held for two weeks for \$75,000 ransom but it was not disclosed how much, if anything, was actually paid for his release.
