STABILIZATION IS NOW AGREED UPON SUSPECT ROUND-UP CONDUCTED BY VANCOUVER POLICE

London and New York Banks Decide To Peg Pound-Dollar Ratio

Former to Have Value of \$5.25 in United States and Latter 61c to 62c in England—Sterling and Canadian Dollar Strong in Yesterday's Trading

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—It was stated last night that an arrangement had been made between the Bank of England in London and the Federal Reserve Bank of the United States for stabilization of the British pound sterling and the American dollar on a basis of between 61c and 62c for the dollar in London and \$5.25 for the pound in New York.

Undoubtedly in anticipation of and announcement along these lines, the pound bounded up 7½c to \$5.19 on the local foreign exchange market yesterday while the Canadian dollar closed at a premium of 1½c, up ½c.

LONDON, November 29 (Canadian Press)—Rt. Hon. With international cooperation apparently impossible for the time being at least, the former Australian Premier advocated a strong policy of Imperial co-operation.

MARKET IS UNSETTLED

Securities Drop Owing to Uncertainty Caused by Failure of Residential Announcement

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—A smart upturn late yesterday caused industrials to show a slight increase on the day's trading on the New York Stock Exchange, the average at closing being 96.33, up .46. Rails closed at an average of 37.65, off .27, utilities at 23.58, off .15, and bonds at 89.04, off .21. The day's turnover amounted to 1,010,000 shares.

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—Owing to uncertainty in regard to exchange and currency matters following the failure of President Franklin D. Roosevelt to make an expected announcement with respect to same, stocks continued their decline on the local exchange Monday and were off from one to seven points as compared with Saturday.

After the brief session of trading on Saturday, industrials closed at an average of 99.30, off 22 rails at 39.54, off .01, and utilities at 24.60, up .51. The turnover for the two hours of trading was 477,000 shares.

Alaska Highway To Be Discussed

International Road Coming Up At Pan-American Conference At Buenos Aires

BUENOS AIRES, November 29.—The proposed international highway which would connect Buenos Aires with Alaska is expected to be an important matter of discussion at the forthcoming Pan-American Conference here. It is said that the United States government may make \$500,000 available for surveys of the route.

LINDBERGH'S FLYING ON

American Ace and Wife in Cape Verde Islands Now— to Fly Atlantic Soon

ST. VINCENT, Cape Verde Islands, Nov. 29:—Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh arrived in the Cape Verde Islands yesterday from Rio de Janeiro where they had made a 260-mile flight on Sunday from Las Palmas in the Canary Islands. From here they planned on proceeding today to a point lower on the West African coast whence they will essay a 1715-mile crossing of the Atlantic Ocean to Natal, Brazil, enroute home to the United States.

SHIPMENT OF CRABS

New Industry Started by Sam Simpson at Massett Now In Production

The steamer Prince John, arriving in port this morning from the Queen Charlotte Islands, brought to the city the first shipment of canned crabs to be made from a new cannery which has been started by the Queen Charlotte Canning Co., of which concern Sam Simpson of Massett, is the principal. The new industry is now in operation and is expected to continue making steady shipments during the season.

Efforts Being Made to Apprehend Persons Who Have Committed Crimes

Forty Detectives and Constables, Headed By Chief Constable John Cameron, Raid Cafes, Poolrooms And Other Resorts

VANCOUVER, Nov. 29: (CP)—Forty detectives and constables, headed by Chief Constable John Cameron, early this morning arrested twenty men in the largest "round-up" of suspects in months. Downtown cafes, poolrooms and other places were raided. A series of identification line-ups was to be held today in an effort to identify men responsible for a series of recent crimes.

REPORT IS APPROVED

Newfoundland House Decides to Give Conduct of Affairs Over To Commission

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 29: (CP)—After voting down successive amendments which would have had the effect of moderating certain portions of the report, the Newfoundland House of Assembly last night adopted the report of the Amulree Royal Commission recommending that public affairs of Newfoundland be taken control of for a period of years by a commission under the Governor consisting of six members—three British and three Newfoundlanders, the country thus returning to the status of a crown colony until its financial problems are solved. Before the final vote, the two dissenting members walked out of the House.

The report now goes to the executive council where it is expected to be approved after which it will go into effect.

SPEECH IS APPROVED

Liberal Attack on Nationalist Government Crushed in British House

LONDON, Nov. 29: (CP)—The House of Commons, by a majority of nearly 400, last night snowed under what amounted to a vote of non-confidence in the National government proposed by Sir Herbert Samuel and his Liberal Free Trade group, rejecting 434 to 58 their amendment to the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne expressing regret that the government in the speech had offered no definite policy to promote restoration of world trade or to develop resources and equipment of the United Kingdom. The address in reply to the Speech from the Throne was then adopted by an overwhelming vote, the Labor party adopting the extraordinary course of challenging the division and voting against the address, only to be beaten 427 to 34.

UNITED STATES GOLD

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 29: (CP)—The United States government boosted the price of gold 8c today to \$33.93 as compared with \$32.72 in London and \$32.90 at Montreal.

JAPAN AND U. S. FLEET

Removal of American Ships From Pacific to Atlantic Will Have Effect on Naval Estimates

TOKYO, Nov. 29.—The action of the United States in removing the battle fleet from the Pacific to the Atlantic coast is expected to have the effect of bringing about a reduction in naval appropriations in the Japanese national budget for the year. The Japanese had viewed with open apprehension the concentration recently of United States warships on the Pacific side. Many of these ships have been ordered back to the Atlantic now.

FOG CAUSE CAR CRASH

Automobiles Have Mix-Up on Burrard Street Bridge in Vancouver and Man is Hurt

VANCOUVER, Nov. 29: (CP)—In the heaviest fog of the season, 14 automobiles mixed up in a collision on Burrard Street bridge yesterday. One man suffered the loss of four fingers and serious injuries to his back.

Local Men Home From Fisheries Commission Meet

George Anderson, local agent of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union, and Capt. George Fritz and Capt. Dan Larsen, representing the Canadian Halibut Vessel Owners' Association of this port, returned to the city on the Prince George this morning from Seattle, having gone to that city to attend the recent conference of the International Fisheries Commission with various branches of the halibut fishing industry on the coast in regard to conservation measures for the 1934 season.

Vancouver Captain, Who Sank Submarine In War, Passes Away

VANCOUVER, Nov. 29.—Capt. Gilbert Wilkins, well known retired master mariner, formerly of Churchill, Man., is dead here. During the war, while in command of a merchant vessel, he sank a German submarine which attacked his ship.

THE C. N. R. EXCURSION

In view of the excursion from interior points to Prince Rupert next week local merchants are making special preparations to cater to the visitors at that time. It is hoped that as many as possible of the residents of the various points between Prince Rupert and Prince George will take advantage of the opportunity to come to the coast. We also suggest that local people provide suitable decorations for the occasion for their store windows. It being the first time an excursion of this kind has been run, it is very desirable that a good impression be made and that the railway company be encouraged to repeat the experiment.

IS IT GOOD BUSINESS?

The city of Ketchikan was at one time keen to have a local radio station and, eventually, this was secured. Now the merchants are doubtful as to its benefit to the community. Every evening the radio in that city advertises a big Seattle mail order firm and urges the people there to shop by mail. This is hardly good for the city and is not very encouraging to other cities that would like to secure broadcasting stations.

FORD ECONOMY TEST RUN

A continuous 10,000 mile run of a Ford V8 was completed in Winnipeg on Tuesday, October 17, and a large enthusiastic crowd which had followed the performance of the car assembled to welcome it at the Legislative Building.

When the results of the test were made public the first reaction was one of amazement that an 8-cylinder automobile could operate so economically; the second reaction one of enthusiasm that such a feat was possible.

The test car was on the road continuously from October 4th to October 17th, travelling under all kinds of conditions—both road and weather.

The route travelled was from Winnipeg to Yorkton, via Dauphin, returning to Winnipeg via Brandon, Boissevain, Morden and Carman. The total mileage for the round trip was 774 miles, and route was covered thirteen times.

The object of the test was to prove how economically the high-powered, speedy eight-cylinder standard Ford car could be operated, and the final results shown below are most gratifying and satisfactory, not only to the sponsors of the test, but to all purchasers and prospective purchasers of a truly modern automobile.

The car used was not a new unit, but had already travelled over 11,000 miles before the test was made and was standard in every way, no special equipment of any kind being used.

Twenty-five different drivers, under the jurisdiction of a checker from the Contest Board of the Manitoba Motor League, piloted the car through the most diversified road and weather conditions that could possibly be experienced. A lot of the territory covered was very hilly, practically all of it being over loosely gravelled roads, which are not conducive to the most economical operation.

The drivers experienced rain, fog and snow, and unfortunately, for by far the greater period of the test, strong head winds were encountered. On two particular days these winds could be classed as gales.

Temperatures ranged from 70 degrees above zero to six degrees below freezing, and during the whole test only one day could really be termed a favorable one for an economy test run.

In spite of these factors the figures are amazing, and several complete runs were made where gasoline mileage bettered 25 miles to the gallon.

The following are the final results and details in regard to the run, and speak for themselves: Number of days run—13. Total mileage—10,000. Gallons of gasoline used—436 1/2. Miles per gallon gasoline—22.90. Oil used (exclusive of oil changes made every 1,500 miles)—3 qts., 1 pt.

Total elapsed time of run—305 hours, 1 minute. Time required for changing drivers, meals, refuelling, etc.—33 hours, 29 minutes. Net running time—271 hours, 32 minutes. Net average speed—36.83 miles per hour. No mechanical repairs were made. One battery was changed.

Tires were changed on seven trips due to nail punctures. We do not believe there is a standard size automobile being built today that would give anything like the above results under the same conditions, and we are very proud to be able to pass the facts along to you.
