## COST OF LIVING SURVEY IS PLANNED

## VANCOUVER-POINT GREY NOMINATE LIBERAL CANDIDATES

### Federal Agreement On Relief Is Favored By Municipalities of B.C.

Advisory Committee of Unpaid Municipal Officials to Sit In With Provincial Committee From Time to Time

VICTORIA, Aug. 22: (CP)—As a result of a discussion of relief matters between the provincial government and the executive of the Union of British Columbia Municipalities, the government will undertake a cost of living survey in municipal areas with a view to equalizing relief assistance, it is announced. The municipalities consider the new federal agreement as favorable and are prepared to put its terms into effect in their areas. An advisory committee of unpaid municipal officials has been asked to sit in with the provincial relief committee from time to time.

### Over Hundred Candidates Are Now in Field

Liberals and Bowsrites Yet to Nominate in Vancouver and Conservatives in Victoria

VICTORIA, Aug. 22:—It is impossible to keep track of all the provincial election nominations owing to the fact that a number of the candidates have to be officially approved before being allowed to stand. It is clear that over one hundred men are in the field and most of the Vancouver Liberals and Bowsrites have yet to nominate as well as the Victoria Conservatives or whatever they may like to call themselves.

There seems to be another break in the ranks of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation because the Socialists refuse to accept the C. C. F. plan to compensate owners of industries when the industries are taken over by the state as proposed by Mr. Woodsworth.

The Bows party will not nominate in Vancouver until next month, it is announced. A place is to be made on the C. C. F. ticket in Vancouver for Dr. Lyle Telford while candidates for the independent C. C. F. have been announced in Vancouver Centre and Vancouver East.

Campaigning is proceeding in the premier's constituency of Saanich. He is being opposed by Norman Whittaker, Liberal; Mrs. J. P. Lewis, C. C. F., and Reeve W. Crouch, independent.

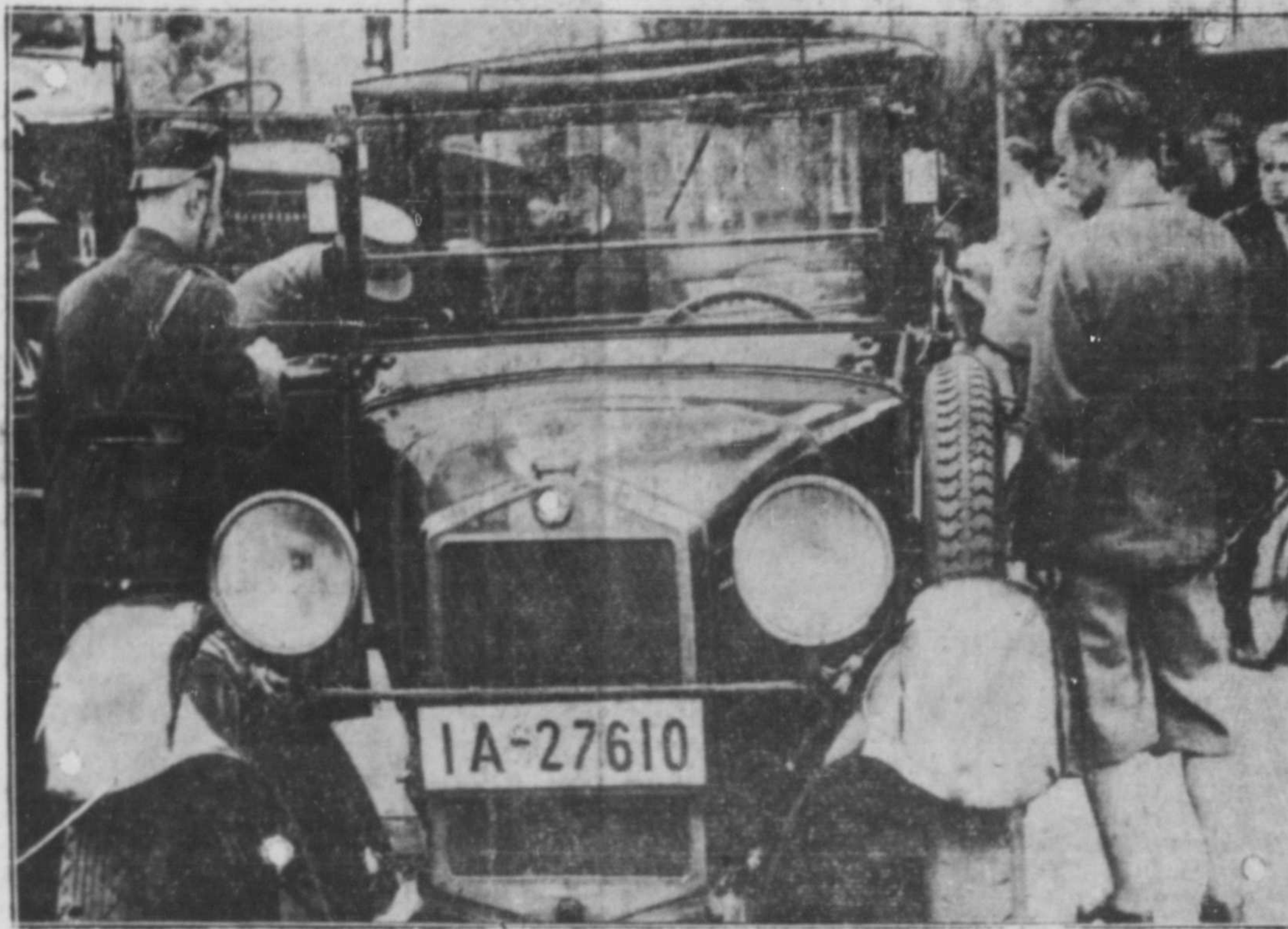
### Cloak and Suit Workers Return To Their Jobs

### VOTING IS ON TODAY

Pensions Loom Large in Nova Scotia Issues at Polls

### Payment Promised

Straight Party Fight Comes to Close in Maritime Province

HALIFAX, Aug. 22:—A bitter struggle over voters' lists ended, political campaigners in Nova Scotia returned to party platforms to discuss issues of the provincial election being held today.

At the end it was a party-to-party fight, with no outstanding issue to split the ranks wider than the gaps resulting from charges that the Conservative government abused the franchise act and counter charges that the Liberal opposition attempted to "pad" the lists. Old age pensions, however, loom large among the main issues with both parties promising to pay.

Leading a force of 30 candidates, Premier Gordon S. Harrington said: "My government will pay pensions to the aged of Nova Scotia not later than July 1, 1934."

Angus L. Macdonald, youthful leader of the opposition who has never held a seat in the legislature, promised "immediate payment of old age pensions" if elected to power.

Unemployment relief measures highway improvements and economic surveys follow closely in importance. Liquor is sold through government stores in Nova Scotia, and neither party put a plank in its platform affecting the act.

Besides the Liberals and Conservatives there are three United Front candidates, two Co-operative Commonwealth Federation and one Labor, completing a list of 66, of whom only 30 can be elected.

Government Program From Premier Harrington's manifesto the government's platform has been constructed as follows:

- 1—Old age pensions will be paid not later than July 1.
- 2—Free school books will be given to pupils whose parents are unable to provide them.
- 3—The government is determined to make Nova Scotia self-sustaining in products of the land and provide an exportable surplus, and plans to encourage establishment of by-product plants in relation to the apple crop, also plants for canning small fruits and vegetables.
- 4—The government will continue its program of highway improvement and pay particular attention to the interior.

### MISSOURI GOES WET

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Aug. 22—Latest returns from the referendum held Saturday indicate that Missouri ratified repeal of the national prohibition law by a vote approximating 500,000 to 200,000, making this the twenty-second state of the union to formally repudiate the Eighteenth Amendment while none have voted in favor of its continuation.

### Prof. Weir, McKeen and Wilkinson Aspirants to Places in Legislature

Is First Metropolitan Areas of Southern City to Name Tickets—Others Will Follow in Very Near Future

VANCOUVER, Aug. 22: (CP)—Liberals of Vancouver-Point Grey last night nominated Dr. George Weir, professor of education at the University of British Columbia, Stanley McKeen, shipping and business man, and Robert Wilkinson, former police commissioner, to contest the riding at the forthcoming provincial election. This is one of the metropolitan areas of Vancouver city, others of which will hold their nominating conventions shortly.

### FEEDING OF BEEF STOCK

New Policy of Government to be of Assistance to Interior Farmers

PRINCE GEORGE, Aug. 22:—The Dominion government feeder purchase policy offered to farmers in British Columbia is likely to be of great assistance to those wishing to secure good feeder steers this fall. The transportation and hotel expenses of the settler or his agent are paid by the government from point of origin to the stockyards and the railways absorb a generous portion of the regular freight rate in bringing the stock back to the farm. There is a surplus of good feed on many farms in the north-central portion of British Columbia this year, which might be marketed to advantage through livestock. Stocker and feeder prices are low, and with the scarcity of feed on the prairies curtailing the number of stock which will be fed for market, there is every indication that there will be a good margin of profit in winter feeding this year. Stockers brought in early would have a chance to pasture and put on some weight before winter feeding is necessary.

### INTERIOR POULTRY

Marketing Opportunity Appreciated by Railway Official

PRINCE GEORGE, Aug. 22:—Under the proposal made at the recent convention in Smithers of the Associated Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia by City Commissioner W. J. Alder of Prince Rupert for the marketing of central interior farm products on the market of the coast city, Harry Bowman, local representative of the colonization and agricultural department of the Canadian National Railways, sees a distinct opportunity for the development of poultry marketing for the farmers of the interior including turkeys.

An important factor in such trade with Prince Rupert, Mr. Bowman believes, will rest with the interior producers themselves in the matter of preparing poultry products for market. Special attention will have to be paid to feeding and packing.

Canadian Legion Receives Four Soccer Awards—Men From H. M. S. Dragon Prominent At Smoker

Features of the annual smoker of the Prince Rupert Football Association which was held last night in the armory of the First North B. C. Regiment included the presentation to the Canadian Legion of the season's four soccer trophies—Moblely Cup, emblematic of city championship for the year, the Stuart Benefit Shield, the Dominion Day Cup and the Gilhuly Cup—and an enjoyable program of entertainment to which men from H. M. S. Dragon, the visiting British light cruiser, largely contributed. In addition to the sailors who took part in the program, members of the personnel of the warship formed a large proportion of those present. The evening's program also included a number of speeches pertaining to football matters. Bert Morgan, president of the Prince Rupert Football Association, was in the chair, speaking suitably in opening the proceedings as well as at other intervals during the evening.

The trophies were presented by Ex-Ald. S. D. Macdonald and received by Sam Currie, captain of the Canadian Legion team. Mr. Macdonald reiterated the remarks of welcome which had been extended by the president to the visitors from H. M. S. Dragon, paying tribute to the naval boys as football players and as good sportsmen generally. Mr. Macdonald also reviewed the 1933 football season here briefly. He complimented the Legion on having won all four trophies, a feat which had been rarely accomplished heretofore. Contributing prominently to the success of the Legion team had been the captain, Sam Currie, the trainer, Jock McGreish, and the manager, Hugh Killin. Mr. Macdonald also congratulated the other two teams which had competed in the Senior League this year—the Regiment, consisting largely of more youthful players, and the Canadian Labor Defence League, which had had a hard time in getting started but which, like the Regiment, had given a good account of itself.
