# MONETARY DEVELOPMENTS IN STATES

## ALL NIGHT FIRE IN BUSINESS SECTION OF HALIFAX CITY

### Campaign For Remonetization Of Silver Seems Now Assured; Free Unlimited Coinage Urged

### COLD SNAP CONTINUES

Amelioration in British Columbia  
Although Rest of Country Still  
Frigid

### Far Below Zero

Ten Inches of Snow in New York  
Storms On Atlantic and  
Great Lakes

TORONTO, December 29 (Canadian Press)—Canada was still in the grip last night of the intense cold snap with little relief in sight unless the fact that it was raining on the Pacific Coast and much milder in British Columbia might be considered omen of an amelioration. Meantime sub-zero weather prevailed in all other sections of the Dominion with blinding snowstorms and slippery roads. Winnipeg reported 42 below zero yesterday while at Prince Albert it was 52 below.

The unusually cold weather was also continuing in the United States last night. In New York 34,000 men were employed in shoveling ten inches of snow from the streets. Ships were jammed in the Hudson River ice above New York. Eighteen persons were dead from the cold in Chicago. From the Maine Coast came reports of twenty-nine fishermen being missing in a storm. Three men missing from boats in Lake Michigan waters.

### HOUSTON "ON SPOT"

Young Man Who Was With Johnny  
Copp When He Was Murdered  
Objective of Bullet

TORONTO, Dec. 29.—An automobile drew up suddenly yesterday near the Rosedale home of Edmund Houston, who was with Johnny Copp, University of Toronto student and football player, when he was fatally shot by an intruder in his (Copp's) home, and the occupant of the car fired a shot at a pedestrian in the apparent belief that he was Houston. The car then sped away.

Houston had been threatened recently by a telephone message against telling the authorities what he knew of the affair. He was able to furnish the police with a description of the intruder.

All Gold in Country Being Called in Except That Used For Certain Specific Purposes—Order Issued Last Night by Department of Treasury

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 29: (CP)—An intensive campaign for the remonetization of silver in the United States was assured today when twenty-seven senators went on record in favor of free and unlimited coinage by the government of both gold and silver. This is a further development of the program being advocated by Senator Wheeler whereby silver would be rehabilitated on a ratio of approximately sixteen to one with gold.

Another important development in connection with the metal situation in the country took place with the issuance last night by the Treasury Department of an order for payment into the United States Treasury of all gold coins, bullion and certificates, virtually the only exception to the order being gold held by the federal reserve banks and reconstruction finance corporation together with some minor exceptions including gold being used for manufacturing purposes, professional, etc.

The United States Treasury price of gold remained unchanged today at \$34.06 per ounce as compared with \$32.03 in London and \$32.40 in Montreal.

### Young Italian Couple Married

Nick Morgese and Rose Bagnato  
Wedded Yesterday at Beautiful  
Service in Toronto

TORONTO, Dec. 29.—Nick Morgese and Rose Bagnato, young Italian couple, were married early yesterday morning in St. Agnews Church here with all the beauty and ceremonial of an Italian wedding service. Their romance had attracted considerable interest owing to parental objections after they had eloped. The parents finally consented to the marriage.

### TERRACE HOME BURNED DOWN

Residence of C. Hamer Destroyed  
By Fire on Wednesday

TERRACE, Dec. 29.—Mr. Hamer had the misfortune to lose his home by fire on Wednesday. It was especially unfortunate as his wife is an invalid in a distant hospital and there are numerous children. The children are being cared for by neighbors until a new home can be found.

MOSCOW TAXI DRIVER  
SENTENCED TO DEATH  
FOR SPEEDING AUTO

MOSCOW, Dec. 29: (CP)—

Valentine Evanov, Moscow taxi driver, has been sentenced to death for speeding. He drove an automobile at an excessive rate of speed on the outskirts of the city into a group of soldiers, causing four deaths.

### SOUTH HAD BAD STORM

Prince Rupert to be Congratulated  
On Escaping Wild Elements—  
City Commissioner Back

Prince Rupert is to be congratulated on having escaped the recent severe rain and windstorms which swept over the southern cities of Vancouver, Victoria and Seattle. Observed City Commissioner W. J. Alder, who returned to the city on the Princess Norah this morning after having spent the past three weeks in the south. "This district was the one bright spot on the weather map."

Mr. Alder told of houses and buildings, almost inundated by floods, having actually slipped on side-hills in Seattle. In Victoria basements, which had never been known to be damp before, were filled with water to a depth of as much as four feet.

"I never experienced in my life such a rain and windstorm as one there was in Victoria while I was there," remarked the commissioner. "In fact, throughout my stay in the south, the weather was most unpleasant."

Mrs. Alder will be returning to the city on the Prince Rupert next Wednesday morning.

### HAVE SET NEW MARK

Mrs. Francis Marsalis and Miss Helen Richey Achieve Record  
For Endurance Flight

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 29:—Mrs. Frances Marsalis and Miss Helen Richey were still aloft last night over this city after having achieved their ambition of breaking the world's endurance refuelling flight record for women. They are going to try to stay up until New Year's Day.

Mrs. Marsalis, in a message dropped yesterday afternoon, said that the motor was beginning to develop strange noises. "We are very tired. Don't be surprised if we land any time. I would like to go to bed and stay there," she noted added.

### Postman Burned Letters to Make His Hands Warm

CHICAGO, December 29 (Canadian Press)—Robert B. Smith, a substitute postman, is under arrest here, charged with destruction of mail. He is alleged to have made a bonfire of 200 letters to warm his hands during the cold.

### Sixty Tons Of Steel In Ship Repair Job

Some 120,000 pounds of steel will be required in making repairs at the local dry dock to the steamer Prince George, which sustained extensive keel and bottom damage last week in stranding near Anyox, it was stated this morning.

### Damage of More Than Hundred Thousand Is Caused by Big Blaze

Block of Business Houses and Living Quarters Ravaged  
By Flames Which Spread to Royal Hotel  
This Morning

HALIFAX, Dec. 29: (CP)—An all night fire raged through a block of business houses and living quarters in downtown Halifax, damage being estimated at more than \$100,000. The flames spread to the Royal Hotel this morning and guests were forced from their rooms by the thick smoke. Cold, stormy weather made the task of the fire department in fighting the conflagration the more arduous.

MONTREAL, Dec. 29:—Premier R. B. Bennett has informed Premier Taschereau of Quebec that, if other premiers are willing, the interprovincial conference, scheduled to open on January 11 at Ottawa, would be postponed to a later date.

VICTORIA, Dec. 29:—Premier T. D. Fattullo has accepted the suggestion of Prime Minister Bennett that the Dominion-provincial conference be postponed from January 11 to January 17 so that Premier Taschereau of Quebec may attend. Other premiers have also agreed.

### Canadian Dollar Drops Below Par

Dominion Funds Fall Below \$1.00  
In New York For First Time  
In Over Month

NEW YORK, December 29 (Canadian Press)—For the first time in over a month the Canadian dollar dropped to below par on the New York foreign exchange market yesterday when it fell to 99 15-16c. The British pound sterling was selling at \$5.06 1/2. Rates in Montreal were: pound sterling, \$5.08 7/8; United States dollar, \$1.00 1/4.

### French Peaceful Intent Confirmed

Confirmation of Country's Willingness  
To Cut Bombing Fleet  
In Half

PARIS, December 29—There was confirmation in official quarters yesterday that France had offered as proof of her intent to disarm to scrap half of her aerial bombing fleet providing other nations agree to do likewise. It had been unofficially indicated the day previous that France was willing to take such action.

## Philo Vance Back On Talkie Screen

William Powell Featured in Detective Mystery This Week-end

"The Kennel Murder Case" brings William Powell to the screen of the Capitol Theatre this week-end as Philo Vance, famous detective character.

The action is swift moving, starting with the killing of a prize Scotie and involving the slaying of two men and the attempted murder of a third. Mystery piles on mystery as Philo Vance unravels the crimes in which seven suspects have both the opportunity and the motive for the killings.
