It is the progress which has already been made toward reconstruction which should be the focus of attention.

"It is not coincidence that rumors of war and revolution are common at the bottom of a depression. As conditions begin to improve, the bitterness of discontent is modified irreconciliable foes, both from within and without the country, find new formulas for compromise and, with the threat of war no longer a necessity in order to prolong the life of government, it ceases to be a necessary element in the politician's bag of tricks. As the discontent gradually passes away, even governments less able than those now in power could win support buoyed up by a tide of pros-

Never a believer in the pre-Coumbian discovery of America, the finding and translation of this boulder compelled Mr. Phillips. who was an authority on Runic lore, to charge his views and convinced him that the inscription was a genuire one and that it pointed to the landing of the Norsemen in this part of Canada which is identified with Markland in the Sagas of the Norsemen.




