# CITY IS RELIEVED OF ALL RELIEF COST

## ENTHUSIASM PREVAILS AT LIBERAL ELECTION RALLY HERE

### Financial Burden of Workless Taken Over By Two Governments

Such is Gratifying Effect of Order Classifying Prince Rupert as Disorganized Municipality, Notice of Which is Received Today

The whole financial burden of unemployment relief has been lifted from the city as from October 1 and will henceforth be borne by the federal and provincial governments. Such is the gratifying effect of the acceptance by the government of an application made by City Commissioner W. J. Alder that the city be classified as a disorganized municipality. Mr. Alder was advised today that this application had just been acceded to by the government. Under the new arrangement the city will be responsible only for the actual administration, but for no portion of the financing, of relief for all persons domiciled within the corporate limits.

### LOST IN TYPHOON

Japanese Steamer Goes Down in Shallow Water Near Kobe With Fifty-Four Aboard

**BRITISH WOMEN DROWN**  
Sixteen Others Known to Have Perished—Fishing Fleet Severely Hit

KOBE, Japan, Oct. 21: (CP)—Fifty-four lives were lost in the sinking of the steamer Yashima Maru which went down in shallow water near here in a typhoon yesterday. Two of the dead are Mrs. E. J. Provost and Mrs. J. O. Milnerberry, wives of lieutenant-commanders aboard the British aircraft carrier Eagle. Fifty-three persons were saved.

Sixteen other deaths are known to have been caused by the typhoon and crews of at least sixty fishing craft have not returned although it is expected that most of them will probably turn up safely.

### CAPTAIN IS LOST

Russian Gasoline Vessel Wrecked On Diomedes Island

JUNEAU, Oct. 21: (CP)—Capt. Alexander Chakin, master and owner of the Russian gasoline boat Explorer, was killed on September 17 when the craft was wrecked in a storm on a reef near Little Diomedes Island, the customs office here was advised Friday from Nome.

Only two men were aboard the Explorer, the report said, Eskimos aiding an unnamed survivor to Nome. The Explorer had scientific instruments on board.

### CAMPAIGN ECHOES

#### THE C. C. F. MACHINE

In its early days the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation, the C. C. F., enlisted the sympathy of many Liberal-minded people by its promise of radicalism and democracy.

Its Victoria meeting to draft a platform for its candidates has opened the eyes of people to the menace to progress of the C. C. F.

Instead of abolishing machine government as promised it brazenly plans the most powerful and ruthless machine the province has ever heard of. It is to be composed of nine persons—the Council of Nine.

The Council of Nine is to have all the powers that similar councils have in Soviet countries. It will have power to discipline members of the C. C. F., power to discipline speakers and power to discipline whole bodies associated with the movement.

It is given power over the members of the Legislature representing the C. C. F. While normally each member will represent a constituency, in actuality he will represent the Council of Nine. C. C. F. supporters in a constituency have no power to run a candidate unless he is "approved" by the Council of Nine.

Not even the Bowser machine in the days of its greatest ruthlessness ever attempted to drag constituencies or deny them the right to name their own candidates.

After this revelation of the aims of C. C. F. it is not surprising to learn that the C. C. F. proposes, if given power, to abolish freedom of the press. The two things it will abolish, free speech in its members, and freedom of the press are two of the foundation stones of British liberty.

### DIED HERE SUDDENLY

Miss Margaret Gilchrist Passed Away This Morning—Had Been Ill For Two or Three Years

Miss Margaret Gilchrist, 21-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Gilchrist and one of Prince Rupert's best known and most popular girls, passed away suddenly at 7 o'clock this morning at the home of her parents, 309 Sixth Avenue East. Although she had been ill spasmodically for the past two or three years, she had seemed to be well on the road to recovery of late. After a final illness of only a couple of days, death came with tragic suddenness and as a tragic blow to the family who will have the deep sympathy of their many friends.

Miss Gilchrist was born and raised in Northern British Columbia and had lived in Prince Rupert practically all of her life. She attended the schools here and took a prominent part in athletic, church and social affairs in all of which she was very popular.

In addition to the parents, there is one sister, Miss Annie Gilchrist, who is in training for a nurse at Royal Columbian Hospital in New Westminster. Mr. Gilchrist, who left on a hunting trip for Porcher Island a few days ago before his daughter was stricken with her final illness, has been sent for by special boat and is expected back in the city this afternoon.

The remains are resting at the parlors of the B. C. Undertakers.

### WEST HAS COLD SNAP

Snow General on Prairies—Freezing Weather Throughout This District

WINNIPEG, Oct. 21: (CP)—Snow was general from Winnipeg to the Rocky Mountains yesterday with Lethbridge and Calgary reporting six inch falls.

Throughout Central and Northern British Columbia, both on the coast and in the interior, freezing temperatures were reported in the Government Telegraphs morning weather report yesterday. Telegraph Creek reported five below zero and in Burns Lake it was snowing.

Prince Rupert had another clear, sharp night, the frost laying low the most of the remaining flower garden growth. The minimum thermometer reading for the night at Digby Island meteorological station was 39 above at 4 a.m. but, on this side of the harbor, it was undoubtedly considerably colder than that. With wind in the north, sky clear and barometer high, it looks like a continuation of the first cold snap of the season.

Premier Daladier has said the budget must be balanced completely or the country must find a new government.

Mr. Peck, who is vice-president of the British Columbia Young Liberal Association and regarded as one of the coming figures in political life of the province, took part with Hon. Ian Mackenzie M.P. in the public meeting here last night and, in company with Olof Hanson M.P. and Mr. McCaffery, sailed last night on the Prince John for a campaign tour of Queen Charlotte Island points.

### Capt. Ian Mackenzie Inspires Big Meeting With Reform Doctrines

Local Voters Asked by Federal M.P. Whether They Will Maintain Principles of Civilization or Take Chance With Doubtful Soviet Doctrines

The people of Prince Rupert were asked by Hon. Ian Mackenzie, M.P. for Vancouver Centre, at a public meeting last night, whether they were going to vote in this provincial election for maintenance of the fine old principles of decency, tradition and civilization, stability of government and orderly reform by supporting the Liberal party or

take a chance with the iniquitous and impracticable program of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation and its Soviet committee of control in Vancouver which would interfere with the rights and privileges of the constituencies and their elected representatives and some of whose leaders openly announced their intention of introducing filthy Soviet propaganda in British Columbia and whose acknowledged leader, W. A. Pritchard, had announced at Calgary that he was running against the "late lamented Mr. Christ."

Capt. Mackenzie who is regarded as one of the ablest campaigners and platform speakers in Canada, in his exposition of Liberal principles and platform, stirred a capacity audience to a greater degree of enthusiasm than has been seen so far during the present campaign. The meeting was a very orderly one and the speaker was practically uninterrupted, a couple of interjectors being quickly silenced.

Leut. Col. S. P. McMordie D.S. O. presided and the only other speakers of the evening were Aubrey C. Peck of Vancouver, Vice-president of the British Columbia Young Liberal Association, and Olof Hanson, M.P. for Skeena.

### Debate Between McGeer and Telford Draws Huge Crowd To Vancouver Arena Friday

VANCOUVER, Oct. 21: (CP)—More than twelve thousand people, perhaps the largest political gathering in the history of Vancouver, listened to a joint debate in the Arena here last night between G. G. McGeer K.C. and Dr. Lyle Telford on the respective merits of the Liberal and C. C. F. policies. Hon. R. L. Maitland, minister without portfolio in the Tolmie government, presided.

"I think," said Mr. McGeer, "that all reasonable men and women will agree that any attempt to establish the C. C. F. system in this country would precipitate a state of civil war."

Said Dr. Telford: "I give Gerry credit for knowing more about money than the rest of his party put together but, if he ever tries to carry out his policy, he will be kicked out of the Liberal party and he'll find the only comfortable place to land in the C. C. F."

Mr. McGeer twitted Dr. Telford on the latter's advocacy of companionate marriage.

### TO LIMIT SALARIES

United States Trade Commission Asks Companies For Data

### Capt. Ian Mackenzie Inspires Big Meeting With Reform Doctrines

(Continued from page one)

Prime Minister of British Columbia," declared Capt. Mackenzie amid applause.

He would speak, said Capt. Mackenzie, on recent political developments in British Columbia, national and international matters affecting the province, possible means of correcting the present situation, the policies of the different parties and, finally, the solutions the Liberal party had to offer.

The speaker defended the system of party government which had provided stability in public affairs of British Columbia during the McBride regime from 1903 to 1916 and under the Liberals from 1916 to 1928. He charged ministers and followers of Premier Tolmie, who as late as February of this year had voted co-fidence in the government, with betraying their leader. They would emerge from the fight with less dignity and less honor than the old man who was trying so tragically to carry on. The speaker pointed to the great program of social and humanitarian legislation for which the Liberal administration had been responsible and which had been unsurpassed in any other part of the Dominion or the world.

Discussing public finances, Capt. Mackenzie declared that it was not the intention of the Liberals to default but rather in co-operation with the federal government, to recast the entire debt structure which it must be admitted could not be met. He advocated an internal conversion loan to refinance the entire debt. This had been done successfully in Australia and could be done in Canada and it must be done in this province. The interest on the public debt must be reduced and the Liberal party would work along this line.

Speaking of unemployment, he referred to conditions in relief camps in Canada as being a disgrace to the country. Declaring that unemployment was essentially a federal problem, the speaker condemned the principle of the dole. He elaborated upon the Liberal plan of "work and wages." It was a pledge that the Liberal party must implement if it was not to be also destroyed. The integrity of the nation and the self-respect of its people must be maintained (applause). Work and not charity was what was wanted. It was what the Liberal party promised and intended to give.

#### Banking and Finance

Speaking of banking, Capt. Mackenzie declared that note issue, currency and credit must be divorced from the control of the banks and used for the good of Canada's people. He advocated a central bank but it should be a "people's bank" and not a "banker's bank."

Dealing with political matters, Capt. Mackenzie pointed out that Mr. Pattullo was the only leader who had a mandate from his party for free, untrammelled action. The Liberal party was the only group which would send its members to the House with a mandate for independent action. He referred to the plank in the Liberal platform that defeat of a government measure did not necessarily involve defeat of the administration which could only be turned out of office by a straight non-confidence vote.

Turning his attention to the C. C. F., Capt. Mackenzie described the movement as a "natural protest against poverty and despair." So had the Liberal party been originally conceived. The speaker sympathized with the idealism behind the C. C. F. movement but

most emphatically condemned the glaring impossibility and impracticability of the new party's program. He referred to some of the inconsistencies of the national leader, Mr. Woodsworth. In reality, its intent was straight socialism. If constitutional methods failed, it thought that it was entitled to resort to methods of force. Eighty percent of the C. C. F. platform was absolutely innocuous. Practically everything of value or constructive in the C. C. F. platform had been advocated and worked for by the Liberal party for years.

Capt. Mackenzie condemned the "Soviet committee of control" in Vancouver which reserved the privilege to interfere with the rights of the constituencies and the activities of the elected C. C. F. members. In objection to this plan Mr. Neelands of South Vancouver had withdrawn as the C. C. F. candidate. There had been similar withdrawals in other ridings such as Rossland-Trail.

"I would suggest," said the speaker in closing, "that the C. C. F. candidates should recant from a platform which contains such iniquities and join the Liberals in their program of progress and reform."

#### Aubrey Peck

Aubrey C. Peck of Vancouver, who made a pleasing impression, complimented the Liberal party and Mr. Pattullo for having espoused the cause of the young men and women and their problems. Young people were rallying to the support of the Liberal party because it had a dynamic plan of action and was building for tomorrow. It intended to give "work and wages" to those who required it and this was a matter of paramount importance to the young people.

Mr. Peck advocated a reorganization of the educational system. The Liberal party was pledged to a policy of cutting down education costs for the people instead of increasing them and to extend rather than to decrease educational facilities.

The Liberal party was also pledged to a plan of unemployment insurance, a system of insurance under which protection would be provided in good times against bad. The depression should be capitalized to insure that such a plan was brought about. If it was left to the good times, then it would be forgotten again.

Mr. Peck believed that the Liberal "back to the land" plank with free land proviso was practical and forward looking. He was convinced that there was a good living on the land for those who were willing to avail themselves of the opportunity.

"Conservatism is for the old," declared the speaker in closing. "Socialism is for the theorists and agitators. Liberalism is the home of forward looking youth and reformers of all ages." (applause).

#### Is Only Hope

Olof Hanson M.P. saw in the return of the Liberal party the only hope for Canada and British Columbia in the present chaos. The party had a definite and constructive policy and it had a strong leader who could say "yes" and who could say "no" and mean it.

Col. McMordie, in opening the meeting, dealt briefly with the unique political situation in which 219 candidates were offering for 47 seats. The position in which Premier Tolmie found himself today he described as one of the greatest political tragedies. There was only the one party which had the leadership and the policy to fix up the present mess of public affairs and that was the Liberal.

The Ladies' and Junior League teams are to be given names later. Another executive meeting of the association will be held on Sunday to proceed with organization for the season.

It is expected that work of getting the Moose Hall in shape for the season's play will start at the end of this week.

## A Brief Synopsis of Liberal Policy

**H**EREWITH is a brief synopsis of policy as laid down by the Liberal Party of British Columbia, in convention held in October, 1932.

Many matters of interest, not specifically set out, will require consideration. The principles enunciated are indicative of the Liberal viewpoint, and are broad enough to meet every question within provincial jurisdiction.

The Liberal Party exists as an official organization for the purpose of formulating and furthering measures that will make for the well-being of each individual member of society, and the welfare of society as a whole.

Innumerable questions, both of public and personal character, can be properly treated only through the agency of government.

Government is not an ordinary business, but carries responsibility to meet every problem arising from our complex social and economic conditions, in order that not merely a few, but all of our people may live in reasonable comfort.

The Liberal Party pledges immediate action under the best available advice and closest study.

1.—Profitable and permanent **Employment** is the most important question facing our people. There should be co-operation between the national, provincial and municipal authorities and the Canadian banking system to establish the necessary credit to carry out a broad programme of constructive and useful wage-distributing public enterprise, and to further the health, education and well-being of all our people.

An **Economic Council** should be established, the membership of which shall consist of representatives of the various avenues of endeavour, such as health, education, agriculture, labour and the industries. This council will be appointed by the government on recommendation of the interests involved, and will act in an advisory capacity to the government.

Amongst other things the council will study industrial and social effort in the province and suggest means to correlate these efforts. It will familiarize itself with intra, inter-provincial and foreign trade, and will co-operate with the other provinces and the Dominion. It will also study such questions as production and consumption, and the marketing of our products, the number of hours of work per day and days of work per week, the standard of wages and commodity prices. These questions are of national as well as provincial concern, and British Columbia can take the lead in urging co-operation with the other provinces and the Dominion as a whole.

**National Unemployment Insurance** should be established upon a contributory basis.

2.—Our **Financial** position must be reviewed. Current expenditure must be kept within current revenue. While maintaining the credit of the province, effort must be made to reduce capital charges. We cannot continue to pay exorbitant rates of interest for money.

3.—The **Taxation Structure** must be revised with a view to reduction wherever possible, including exemption in the lower scale of wages and salaries.

4.—The health of each of us is important to the whole community, and a measure of **State Health Insurance** should be made effective, not only to preserve health, but to reduce costs both to the average citizen and to industry.

5.—A general and effective review must be made of the **Educational** problem, rejecting any proposed organization that involves a caste system. We must facilitate the intellectual growth of each individual member of society in order to equip him for his daily tasks, and for the enjoyment of such cultural pursuits as may be in keeping with our social customs.

Triangular disagreements between the school boards, municipal councils and the department of education must be adjusted, and our whole system placed upon a sound financial basis.

6.—The financial position of our **Municipalities** is of increasing concern. An equitable adjustment must be made as between the province and the municipalities, and the municipalities placed in a sound financial position.

7.—An effort should be made to settle our **Agricultural Lands** in order that more of our citizens may be self-supporting. Agriculture as a whole must be put upon a sound and profitable basis, and made capable of sustaining and directing itself, in line with all other national, basic industries.

8.—Continuous effort should be put forth to assist industry in **Marketing** its products, in timber, agriculture, fishing, mining and, in fact, every operation where it appears that useful service can be rendered.

9.—Our highways must be kept in good condition, both for the benefit of settlers and the tourist traffic, and expanded as circumstances warrant. In this connection a **Highway Board** should be established to make for continuity of policy and to inspire confidence in impartial treatment.

10.—A **Public Utilities Commission** should be established.

11.—A **National Central Bank** should be established.

12.—Social Services, such as Mothers' Pensions, Old Age Pensions, etc., must be maintained. Abuses of administration should not be allowed, and injustice through mere technicalities should not be permitted.

13.—The **Peace River** must be given access to the Coast.

14.—In order that the utmost **Freedom of Action** by Members of the Legislature may be assured in respect of questions before the House, it is Liberal policy that a government shall be considered to be defeated only upon a straight want-of-confidence motion.

15.—The Dominion Government will be asked to place the Province of British Columbia upon a basis of equality with the other provinces, and to this end request will be made for a Royal Commission to ascertain the extent to which the Province of British Columbia has not been given **Equality of Treatment with the Other Provinces** of the Dominion.

16.—There shall be a permanent **Voters' List** to ensure that all eligible voters are enrolled.

17.—The Leader of the Liberal Party is given a free mandate to choose for his associates in government, men of character, ability and standing, having regard solely to the public interest.

## WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Repairs Being Made to Elevator Wharf—Salmon Cannery and Salteries Still in Operation—Halibut Fishing Petering Out

John Cunningham, representing the Northern Construction Co., has arrived in the city from Vancouver to take charge of work which is about to be undertaken of renewing fender piles and boom logs at the wharf of the Alberta Wheat Pool's local elevator which is being put in shape by the federal government for the Pool. The work, it is expected, will occupy about a month's time and will mean employment for several men. George R. Etherington, supervising mechanic for Canadian government elevators, has been spending several days at the local house this week on official business.

There were no casualties among the deer of Refuge Bay, Porcher Island, despite the ten day's activities of Bill Watts, George Johnstone and Alex Finnie, prominent in the local grocery trade, who returned to town on Wednesday night with Bill Miller aboard the Porcher Island mail boat. The outing, nevertheless, was a very enjoyable one for all concerned. Weather, generally speaking, was quite good which means that it must have been a good deal different than it was in our fair city over the same period of time. For the trio this Porcher Island hunting expedition has now become an annual institution which none of them would miss for anything—even if they do get skunked as they did on this occasion.

The handsome power yacht Sea Dog, demonstration boat for marine products, paid another visit to port late this week following a cruise to various southeastern Alaska points showing her wares to the folk of that part of the country. The Sea Dog, which hails from San Francisco and had her owner, H. A. B. Sneve on board, arrived here at 6 o'clock Thursday evening from Ketchikan and sailed this morning in continuation of her return voyage southward.

The snagboat Essington, which has been at the dry dock for the past two or three weeks undergoing certain repairs, was towed yesterday morning by the Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug Winnemac to Digby Island where she has now been tied up for the winter.

### Hunting Votes and Birds

Having on board W. O. Fallon and B. J. Bacon, who will engage in electioneering on behalf of T. D. Pattullo, the next Premier of British Columbia (at least that is what Bill and Jim are saying), the gasboat Elda, Capt. Eddie Hudson, sailed this morning for George town, Port Simpson and Warke Canal. Return to port will be made Sunday night or Monday morning. Some bird as well as vote hunting is planned.

The B. C. Packers salmon cannery at Namu in the central area is still continuing to pack fish and will likely carry on until the chum run on the Queen Charlotte Islands shows signs of diminution. So far, the run is still going on in full swing with good catches being made by the seiners in operation there. Namu is also taking fish from the Rivers Inlet seining grounds. Two salteries at Jedway and Houston Inlet are also running on Queen Charlotte Island chums.

With fishing in Areas No. 3 and 4 due to come to a legal close for the season on October 26, operation of the halibut fleet on the Pacific Coast is now gradually petering out with boats tying up as they reach port and landings all over the coast frater few and far between, resulting, at least, in an improvement of price conditions. During the week ending yesterday nine vessels including one lone Canadian, landed catches totalling 308,000 pounds at Prince Rupert, bringing the grand total catch for the season up

to 12,762,200 pounds of which 5,138,000 pounds was from Canadian vessels and 7,624,200 pounds from American. These figures compared with a total of 13,870,850 pounds at a similar date last year of which 3,972,250 pounds was accounted for by Canadian vessels and 9,898,600 pounds by American. The one Canadian boat to land a catch during the week was Cape Beale, Capt. Edgar Arnott, which received 6c and 4.5c for 28,000 pounds. The top price of the week for American fish was 10.5c and 7c which the Excel received for 23,000 pounds while the low was 8c and 6c paid the Electra for a large catch of 58,000 pounds.

### Princess to Vancouver

While engaged in a chum salmon packing charter between the Queen Charlotte Islands and Namu cannery, the Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug Salvage Princess, Capt. Joe Desmules, had the misfortune to suffer a broken crankshaft on Tuesday of this week. The vessel has been taken by the underwriters to Vancouver for repairs and will be returned later to her home port of Prince Rupert.

C. P. R. steamer Princess Adelaide, Capt. S. K. Gray, arrived in port at 4.15 yesterday afternoon from the south and sailed at 10 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

Jens Larsen, who has been awarded the contract for carrying the mail between Anyox and Alice Arm, has been in Prince Rupert recently on business, in connection with a new launch which he purchased here with which to carry out the work. The boat will run twice a week. Mr. Larsen was accompanied by his wife and they returned to Alice Arm on the new boat.

The season for shooting of ducks and geese in Prince Rupert district is now in and a number of parties were out last week-end but they did not have much success. No super-abundance of birds is as yet evident and they are, as usual, very wary. The fine weather this week-end will, undoubtedly, attract many nimrods forth despite the fact that clear, sunny weather is not usually regarded as the most auspicious as far as bird hunting is concerned.

## Hard Times Masque By Labor Defence League Enjoyable

Two hundred persons were present at a very enjoyable hard times masquerade dance which was held Thursday night by the Canadian Labor Defence League in the Exchange Block Hall. The affair was in progress from 9 p.m. until 2 a.m., music being furnished by a Metlakatla Orchestra assisted by Julius Welle of this city. T. Maki was master of ceremonies.

Prize winners for costumes were Miss Mary Michaluk and Mike Sobka.

## Smelters Have Two Planes Flying North

VANDERHOOF, Oct. 21.—The Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. now has two airplanes busy transporting in hay, feed and winter supplies from Stuart Lake to Slate Creek, Manson Creek and elsewhere in the northern section of Omineca mining division where it is planned to continue operations during the winter.
