## COMMERCIAL WAR IN ORIENT LOOMS

### INTERIOR RANCHER BELIEVED BURNED TO DEATH IN CABIN

#### Remains Are Found In Embers of Dwelling In Tachick Lake District

John Edward Bolk Had Not Been Seen For About a Week And Burned Corpse Found Yesterday is Thought to be His

VANDERHOOF, June 9:—John Edward Bolk, about forty-five years of age, is supposed to have been burned to death in his log cabin about six miles south of here on Tachick Lake. The tragedy was discovered yesterday by a neighbor boy who was delivering butter and eggs. Bolk was last seen about a week ago. He came to the district three years ago and had purchased the land and started farming. The body in the embers has not yet been definitely identified but it is believed to be Bolk's.

#### MILL IS STARTING

Concentrating Plant on Surf Point Mine to Start Grinding Ore On June 20

According to word received in the city from the property, the 25-ton mill, which has been in process of installation at the Surf Point mine on Porcher Island during the past few months, will be placed in operation about June 20. The putting of the mill in operation will mark the start of the career of this promising property as an actual producer of concentrates.

Owned by the Timmins interests of Ontario and with R. E. Legge as manager, the Surf Point property has been under active development since early last fall. It was visited this week by W. S. (Duke) Harris, representative of the Col. Victor Spencer interests in Vancouver, and by W. G. McMorris, managing director of the Kitsault Eagle Gold Mines Ltd., in the course of an aerial inspection tour of Queen Charlotte Island properties. The visit is, however, believed to have been of no significance as far as the future of the Surf Point mine is concerned.

#### GOV'T UNDER DISCUSSION

Criticizing the present party system of government which he claimed was unwieldy and inefficient and expressing the opinion that the time was ripe for a change, possibly along the line of a dictatorship, T. W. Brown was an interesting speaker at the regular weekly luncheon of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club yesterday. Mr. Brown outlined some methods by which he felt that government might be improved upon by application of simpler methods. A dictator, of course, would have to be just, accurate and honest to an extreme degree.

Speaking of provincial government, Mr. Brown claimed that the Legislature, as at present constituted, was much too large. He declared that the province was today practically bankrupt.

President G. A. Woodland was in the chair and thanked Mr. Brown for his interesting address. Guests included H. M. Streight, a member of the New Westminster Rotary Club, Olof Hanson, M.P., J. D. Forsyth of Vancouver and Stanley Dabry of Prince Rupert.

#### BAN IS ON WAR DEBTS

Will Not Be Discussed at Economic Conference, Announces Head of U. S. Delegation

PLYMOUTH, Eng., June 9: (Canadian Press)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull of the United States barred all discussion of war debts at the forthcoming world economic conference in London when he arrived here yesterday with the United States delegation. He announced emphatically that war debts would not be discussed at the conference.

#### RESTORING OF SILVER

Smithers Chamber of Commerce Asks Endorsement for Resolution on Important Question

Holding that the question of silver transcends almost all other considerations as a step towards the world's economic recovery, the Smithers and District Chamber of Commerce has passed another resolution requesting representatives of Canada at the world economic conference to make every possible effort at that gathering towards bringing about stabilization of the price of the metal. Endorsement by the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce for the resolution is asked and it is expected that a special meeting of the council of the local Chamber will be held to deal with the matter.

The resolution from Smithers is also as follows:

"Resolved that this Smithers District Chamber of Commerce, representing the Bulkley Valley district of British Columbia, again reaffirms its adherence to the principle of re-establishment of the price of silver by international agreement and asks the representatives of the Dominion of Canada at the world economic conference to make every effort possible to bring about the stabilization of the price of silver by international agreement as the main step on the way to regaining prosperity throughout the world."

The Smithers Chamber proposes that the local Chamber draft a resolution along similar lines and forward it to Premier R. B. Bennett who is now on his way to the conference.

#### HOPEFUL OF MINE

Sampling Returns of Topley Property Being Awaited

SMITHERS, June 9:—Topley people are just now awaiting hopefully the returns of the sampling of the Golden Eagle group of claims there, formerly known as the Topley Silver. With the rise in price of silver greater interest is being taken in this class of property and lately the group was bonded by St. Louis people who made a cash payment and had one of the shafts pumped out. The last week in May engineers sampled the mine and the returns have not yet been received. Should the report be favorable it is understood that active operations will commence. The ore is high grade silver-lead with two strong veins.

#### MATTER ON HONOR IS WAY AGAIN HIGH ONE

World Flyer Lands This Afternoon at Siberian City—Is Behind Record

MOSCOW, June 9: (Canadian Press)—Resuming his flight around the world after a brief halt at Belovo, near Novo Sibirsk, where he had been forced down on Thursday due to engine trouble, James J. Mattern landed at Belovo near Irkutsk this afternoon and will remain there until tomorrow. He had passed Nizhniudinsky in Eastern Siberia earlier in the afternoon after leaving Belovo.

Mattern is now considerably behind the record of Wiley Post and Harold Gatty, which he had planned on lowering, and it is hardly expected now that he will be able to beat the 1931 round the world mark.

His selection, therefore, is an expression of confidence and regard upon the part of the whole church for he is chosen by a very representative body at the general assembly composed of ministers and elders from every part of the Dominion. His elevation to this high office is a declaration, too, that he is a man of character and ability who will worthily represent the church and efficiently serve in this position of privilege and responsibility.

Upon Dr. Hugh R. Grant, minister of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Fort William, and formerly of First Presbyterian Church, Prince Rupert, this honor was this last Wednesday bestowed. Doubtless, this gift of the church is a tribute to his ability in the general work of the church over a period of many years, and not only the minister and session and members of his congregation in Prince Rupert but the public in general will extend to Dr. Grant their warmest congratulations upon his election.

#### Japan Is Considering Trade Reprisals Which Might Involve Canada

Abrogation of Indian-Japanese Trade Agreement and Other Moves Against Cheap Asiatic Goods Cloud Sky For Opening of Economic Conference

LONDON, June 9: (Canadian Press)—On the eve of the economic conference, clouds of impending commercial warfare, involving possibly Canada, are overshadowing Asia. Following abrogation of the Indian-Japanese trade agreement and other moves to bar cheap Japanese goods from portions of the British Empire, which the Foreign Office said today would be a disaster for Japan, the Japanese were considering the possibility of retaliatory measures on British Empire products including those of Canada and Australia.

#### TALKS OF PLATFORM

Tolmie Addresses Saanich Electors—Favors Continuance of P. G. E.

VICTORIA, June 9: (Canadian Press)—Premier S. F. Tolmie, speaking before the electors of Saanich riding, his own constituency, Thursday night, dealt with the various planks of the Unionist party platform.

The Premier emphasized the importance of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway in the development of the mining industry of the Cariboo and promised continuance of the road.

Writing off of nearly \$1,500,000 of irrigation loans in the Okanagan district was declared by the Premier to be justified after careful consideration in each case. It was in connection with this issue of irrigation loans that Hon. W. A. McKenzie, minister of mines, differed with Premier Tolmie recently and, as a result, resigned from the cabinet.

#### Body of Alex McRae is Here

Members of Canadian Legion at Stewart Paid Tribute

The remains of the late Alexander McRae of this city, who was killed on Wednesday morning in an accident at Stewart, were brought home early this morning and the funeral will take place here tomorrow afternoon with Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth, pastor First Presbyterian Church, officiating.

The body was brought here on board the Armour Salvage Co.'s service boat *Winnemac* and was accompanied by Roderick McRae, brother of deceased, Duncan Munro of Premier, and Frank Morris, manager of the B.C. Undertakers.

Tribute to deceased was paid at Stewart by a large number of members of the Canadian Legion who gathered at the Legion Hall and accompanied the remains to the boat. M. P. Murphy, J. Thompson, F. Haugh, George Matheson, K. Grey and H. B. Charlton, acted as pallbearers at Stewart.

#### GOV'T HAS RESIGNED

Premier Manuel Azana Quits in Spain Following Crisis Over New Religious Laws

MADRID, Spain, June 9: (Canadian Press)—Premier Manuel Azana's government resigned yesterday, principally because of controversy over Spain's new religious laws which nationalized church property worth millions of dollars and resulted in the Pope's recent encyclical and automatic excommunication of members of the Spanish government from the Roman Catholic Church.

### DR. GRANT IS ELEVATED

It was with a great deal of interest and gratification that his legion of old friends and admirers in Prince Rupert, where he ministered so long and with such marked success, learned yesterday through the medium of exclusive Daily News Canadian Press dispatches that Rev. Dr. Hugh R. Grant, formerly pastor of First Presbyterian Church here, had been chosen to the important post of moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, highest office in the gift of his church in the Dominion. Brilliant thinker, eloquent speaker, sympathetic minister and, withal, a fine broad-minded and genial gentleman, all his numerous friends here will agree that the church could have made no happier a choice for its leader than Dr. Grant who, during his day here, was a friend to so many of us, irrespective of our creeds or beliefs. That is a feeling which we feel will be shared throughout Western Canada for Dr. Grant, after all, has spent the most of his career in the west and has labored in many of the pioneer fields.

Friends here have already started to send their congratulations to Dr. Grant and, with these, the Daily News desires wholeheartedly to associate itself.

We sincerely trust that the same measure of success, popularity and esteem he has enjoyed in all his parochial endeavors will accompany in the wider national ecclesiastical sphere which, undoubtedly, will have its problems and difficulties as well as its honors.

### PASSES IN VANCOUVER

Norris W. Pringle, Formerly of This City, Succumbs to Effects of Sinus Trouble

His numerous former friends in Prince Rupert will learn with deep regret of the death which occurred in Vancouver on May 21 of Norris W. Pringle, former popular young man of this city, who succumbed to the effects of frontal sinus trouble from which he had suffered for years and for which he underwent an operation before leaving here a few years ago.

The late Norris Pringle, who was born at Field, B.C. on May 7, 1899, came to Prince Rupert with his mother and family as a young boy and attended the schools of this city. For years he was a member of the local Canadian Pacific Railway office and for a time was engaged in the insurance business. He was a member of the Gyro Club and had a host of friends among whom he was highly esteemed and popular. He was also an ex-service man. Deceased is survived by a widow,

who, before her marriage, was Miss Edith McCaul F.N., lady superintendent of the Prince Rupert General Hospital; his mother, Mrs. T. E. Pringle of Vancouver; two sisters, Mrs. Milton Gonzales and Mrs. Cecil Nason, both of Vancouver, and a brother, J. Howard Pringle of Portland. He was a nephew of Ex-Mayor and Mrs. M. M. Stephens of this city.

As a result of the fight Baer now ranks with Primo Carnera, the Italian giant, as an outstanding contender for the world's heavyweight crown at present held by Jack Sharkey of Boston.
