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

# LOG SCALE

Production For 1933 Still Down But Should Show Improvement Soon-Increase in Poles And Piling

Log scaling continues quiet in Prince Rupert forestry district, according to the monthly statement for it. of District Forester A. E. Parlow. With logging camps on the Queen Island, June 18. Charlotte Islands resuming operations generally and smaller opera tors on the coast beginning to oper 16 up, there should, however, be an early improvement.

Log scaling for the month of Ma this year totalled but 217,997 board feet, bringing the production for 1933 to date up to a total of 1.005.638 board feet as compared with 12,-493,327 board feet in the first five months of 1932.

Despite the big falling off in log scaling, there was an increase in Aldous Huxley. production of poles and piling in the interior this May as compared with last. This May the production totalled 38,708 lineal feet, all of cedar, as compared with 20,187 lineal feet, consisting of cedar and hemlock, in May, 1932.

Hewn ties counted by the Forest Branch in the district this May totalled 15,078 pieces, of which 491 were hemlock and 14.587 jackpine. as compared with 17.196 pieces, all ckpine, in the same month last!
