OTTAWA, April 27: (Canadian Press)-Hon. Edgar N. Rhodes, minister of finance, yesterday announced the following reduction in budget taxes: cigar tubes, from ten cents per hundred to four cents; unfermented wort, 25c to 10c per gallon; malt syrup and other malt products used for brewing beer, from 50c to 20c per pound. There are also reductions in the proposed taxes on perfume, spirits and toilet soap.
