

BUYING IS INCREASED

Ahead of Last Year

It is generally conceded among business people of Prince Rupert that Christmas trade this year here showed a marked increase over last year. Many merchants report that, despite lower commodity prices, profits were increased owing to much larger turnover Well before Christmas Eve seasonal stocks were beginning to show signs of depletion and, in certain lines, complete exhaustion, indicating that trade was larger than the merchants had estimated it would be.

Bank managers, usually conservative in such matters, admit that there was a general increase in Christmas trade this year, one estimating that it was possibly seventeen percent ahead of last year while another remarked that hundreds, if not thousands, of dollars more were spent in Christmas buying this year than last.

The protracted cold snap also resulted in increased buying of ertain lines of clothing while fuel dealers also had greater trade.

Jimmy Weidel Makes Dramatic Flight With Infant Patient

BALTIMORE, Md., Dec. 28: (CP) James R. Weidel, famous American speed airplane pilot, arrived here Tuesday night after a dramatic twelve hour dash through blizzard and fog for a distance of 1400 miles from Houston, Texas, with Sue Trennell, five-month old infant, who will undergo a delicate emergency operation within the next few days for water on the brain. Weidel made the flight safely despite warnings of seasoned aviators against essaying the trip under such difficult weather conditions as prevailed along the route. He made one stop enroute at New Orleans for refuelling.

The infant is now lying at John Hopkins Hospital under observation of Dr. Walter E. Gandy, noted brain specialist, who will perform the operation.

DEFICIT. IS HUGE

United States Government Behind One Thousand Million Dollars -Preparing Budget

WASHINGTON D.C., December ' 28 (Canadian Press) - The United States government deficit yesterday passed the thousand million dollar mark as President Franklin D. Roosevelt and his advisers were preparing the administration's first budget for presentation to Congress which opens on Thursday of next week. It was intimated that the president had no intention of diverting to any extent from the line of action on which he is now working for the industrial rehabiliation of the country.

The President's message to Congress will be carried over a nationwide radio hook-up.
