

## LOSES HIS LAST FIGHT

James J. Corbett Was Champion Heavyweight Boxer of the World at One Time

## Beat J. L. Sullivan

Died Today of Heart Ailment Aged 67 After Long Illness

NEW YORK, Feb. 18:-James J. Corbett, former heavyweight champion of the world, died today of heart ailment. He was 67 years of age. He had been ill for a long time and the end was expected a week

James J. Corbett was champion heavyweight pugilist of the world for five years, having won the title In John L. Sullivan and lost it to

Bob Fitzsimmons. After his retirement from the ring he devoted most of his time to the stage, having been , initiated in the theatrical profession by William A. Drady, who was his manager when he won the than ordinary ability as an allround althlete when as a young man he became a member of the Olympic Athletic Club of San Francisco. It was said of him that he could have made any of the club's athletic teams, but he showed a preference for baseball and boxing.

In the latter sport Corbett quickly absorbed all that the boxing instructors had to teach and developed such remarkable skill that eventually he was regarded by critics of the sport the most scientific heavyweight boxer the ring has ever produced. His skill, coupled with his speed, made him a hard man to hit and even in the bout in wnich he lost his title and others in which he was knocked out, his opponents were said to have beenmore severely punished than was Corbett.

The former champion became a professional pugilist after he had proved his superiority over all the amateur boxers on the Pacific Coast. His success in a few profescional bouts led to a match in 1891 with Peter Jackson, then the forenost negro boxed of the time. They pattled for 61 rounds and the bout, chich ended in a draw, has beenlassed as one of the greatest ever fought between heavyweights. 
