AWARD BY JOHANSSON

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Feb. 22-A gold medal for the best athletic achievement of the past year and national fame, has fallen to the lot of the young Swedish wrestler Ivar Johansson, who won two of Sweden's eight Olympic gold medals in Los Angeles last summer. The medal is given by the leading Stockholm daily Svenska Dagbladet after careful selection amongst the outstanding sportsmen of the year, In this case it was his indomitable fighting spirit and the fine sportsmanship that won him the prize. Ivar, the son of a small farmer near the Swedish town of Norrkeeping, lost his first Olympic match in free wrestling in Los Angeles on what was unanimously pronounced to be a glaringly unfair verdict. All the members of the Swedish group were discouraged and grumbled against what they considered to be a down right injustice-except Ivar himself, who never protests or loses his nerve. 
