RACKET IN FISH GAME

Four San Francisco Men Indicted On Charges of Exploiting Alaska Fishermen

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 28: (CP)—Indictments against four men involved in an alleged "labor racket" directed against Alaskan salmon fishermen were returned by a county grand jury Tuesday night. The four named are Emil Mayer and Sam Young, partners in a San Francisco clothing firm; Arthur L. Mayer, son of Emil Mayer, and Y. Lopez, labor agent.

Investigating officers declare that the group sold clothing at exorbitant prices to fishermen for whom they obtained employment. The indictments will obviate the necessity of hearing more than three hundred complaining fishermen in police court.

PASSING OF LUMBERMAN

David Robertson Dies in Vancouver On Wednesday at Age of Eighty-Three Years

VANCOUVER, Sept. 28: (CP)—David Robertson, aged 83, pioneer contractor and sawmill operator, died here yesterday. He arrived here in 1888 and was president of Robertson-Hackett Sawmills Ltd. which business he established soon after his arrival in Vancouver.

Born in Fife, Scotland, March 28, 1850, the late Mr. Robertson learned the contracting and lumber business with Robert Neill & Sons in Manchester, Eng., before coming to British Columbia.

Mr. Robertson was a former president of the Vancouver General Hospital Association, past president of the St. Andrew's Society, past chief of the Sons of Scotland and belonged to the Masonic order and to the Vancouver Club. He was a Presbyterian.

ROBBERY ON WATERFRONT

Marine Supply Store of F. E. Hunt Ltd. Again Broken Into During Night

The marine supply house of F. E. Hunt Ltd. on the local waterfront was again broken into during last night. A pane of glass was removed from one of the front show windows and articles taken from the window without entry being made further into the store as far as could be seen. The window pane was broken either during or after removal. It had been neatly taken out from the sides.

The entry is believed to have been made between 3 a.m., when the premises were patrolled by the police, and 8 a.m. when the store was opened for the day's business.

PLANS FOR EXCURSION

More Than One Hundred Already Booked For Trip to Ketchikan Aboard SS. Prince Rupert

Over one hundred persons have already been booked for the special excursion to be run from here to Ketchikan by the steamer Prince Rupert on October 7, it is announced by Canadian National Steamships. Providing sufficient bookings are obtained, the vessel will leave here at 10 o'clock Saturday night, October 7, spend Sunday in Ketchikan and return here on Monday morning.

Special entertainment is being arranged for the Prince Rupert people at Ketchikan and plans include a Prince Rupert-Ketchikan baseball game as well as a dance.

Following the excursion, the Prince Rupert, which will arrive here from Vancouver on schedule Saturday morning, October 7, will be tied up for the winter at the local dry dock.

YOUNG MEN ORGANIZED

Junior Chamber of Commerce Comes Into Being at Enthusiastic Meeting Last Evening

Meet Again Soon

Several Speakers Heard at Gathering Last Night Including Members of Senior Chamber

Steps preliminary to the organization of a Junior Chamber of Commerce in this city were taken at a largely attended meeting of those interested in the city council chamber last evening. Harold Alder occupied the chair and G. P. Lyons acted as secretary. In addition to the chairman and the secretary, other speakers included Henry Heilbroner, V. S. Moore, Theo Colclart, W. O. Fulton, Robert Bartlett, W. P. Armour, Max Heilbroner, John Dybbavn, James Douglas, George Mitchell, Harry Gourlay, S. P. Woodside and P. M. Ray, some of whom are prominent members of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce.

Another meeting will be held on Tuesday night of next week when it is planned to proceed with further organization of the new body, membership in which it is proposed to restrict to young men between the ages of eighteen and thirty-five. The tentative plan is for the Junior Chamber of Commerce to operate as a separate entity, although closely co-operating in matters of public interest with the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce. There seemed to be considerable enthusiasm for the movement at last night's meeting.

In opening the meeting, Harold Alder described how such organizations as Junior Chambers of Commerce were obtaining a foothold in the United States and throughout Canada. Young men were becoming increasingly active in public affairs.

The purposes of a junior chamber of commerce, Mr. Lyons explained, would be so that the young men could be able to make their views felt and also work in conjunction with the senior chamber. There should be sufficient interest so that the young people could organize and fight for the common purpose. Since 1930 the junior chamber of commerce idea had spread rapidly in other places.

The objectives of the junior chamber would be largely similar to those of the senior, said Henry Heilbroner who read a letter from parent headquarters in Montreal.

STRANDING OF CUTTER

Coastguard Patrol Vessel Goes Ashore in Fog On California Coast

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 28: The 75-foot coastguard cutter 256 was reported ashore on Spanish Beach on the California coast Tuesday. Capt. Nicholls and his crew of six men abandoned the vessel and were able to get safely ashore. The stranding occurred during a dense fog while the 256 was engaged in duty on fisheries patrol service.

Lives Lost in Pyrenees Storm

MARSEILLES, France, Sept. 28: (CP)—Sixteen lives were reported here yesterday to have been lost as a result of a storm between the city of Toulon and the Pyrenees. Seven members of one family were killed.

Cooper is a director of the Bank of England and one of seven members of the London Passenger Transport Board, a public body recently created to control all passenger traffic within a thirty-mile radius of London. It is under the chairmanship of Lord Ashfield who was a member of the commission which investigated railway transportation in Canada last year.

Mr. Cooper was born in Aberdeen and is a graduate of Cambridge University. He was severely wounded in the war while serving with the Royal Artillery.

A Brief Synopsis of Liberal Policy

HEREWITH is a brief synopsis of policy as laid down by the Liberal Party of British Columbia, in convention held in October, 1932.

Many matters of interest, not specifically set out, will require consideration. The principles enunciated are indicative of the Liberal viewpoint, and are broad enough to meet every question within provincial jurisdiction.

The Liberal Party exists as an official organization for the purpose of formulating and furthering measures that will make for the well-being of each individual member of society, and the welfare of society as a whole.

Innumerable questions, both of public and personal character, can be properly treated only through the agency of government.

Government is not an ordinary business, but carries responsibility to meet every problem arising from our complex social and economic conditions. In order that not merely a few, but all of our people may live in reasonable comfort.

The Liberal Party pledges immediate action under the best available advice and closest study.

1.—Profitable and permanent Employment is the most important question facing our people. There should be co-operation between the national, provincial and municipal authorities and the Canadian banking system to establish the necessary credit to carry out a broad programme of constructive and useful wage-distributing public enterprise, and to further the health, education and well-being of all our people.

An Economic Council should be established, the membership of which shall consist of representatives of the various avenues of endeavour, such as health, education, agriculture, labour and the industries. This council will be appointed by the government on recommendation of the interests involved, and will act in an advisory capacity to the government.

Amongst other things the council will study industrial and social effort in the province and suggest means to correlate these efforts. It will familiarize itself with intra, inter-provincial and foreign trade, and will co-operate with the other provinces and the Dominion. It will also study such questions as production and consumption, and the marketing of our products, the number of hours of work per day and days of work per week, the standard of wages and commodity prices. These questions are of national as well as provincial concern, and British Columbia can take the lead in urging co-operation with the other provinces and the Dominion as a whole.

National Unemployment Insurance should be established upon a contributory basis.

2.—Our Financial position must be reviewed. Current expenditure must be kept within current revenue. While maintaining the credit of the province, effort must be made to reduce capital charges. We cannot continue to pay exorbitant rates of interest for money.

3.—The Taxation Structure must be revised with a view to reduction wherever possible, including exemption in the lower scale of wages and salaries.

4.—The health of each of us is important to the whole community, and a measure of State Health Insurance should be made effective, not only to preserve health, but to reduce costs both to the average citizen and to industry.

5.—A general and effective review must be made of the Educational problem, rejecting any proposed organization that involves a caste system. We must facilitate the intellectual growth of each individual member of society in order to equip him for his daily tasks, and for the enjoyment of such cultural pursuits as may be in keeping with our social customs.

Triangular disagreements between the school boards, municipal councils and the department of education must be adjusted, and our whole system placed upon a sound financial basis.

6.—The financial position of our Municipalities is of increasing concern. An equitable adjustment must be made as between the province and the municipalities, and the municipalities placed in a sound financial position.

7.—An effort should be made to settle our Agricultural Lands in order that more of our citizens may be self-supporting. Agriculture as a whole must be put upon a sound and profitable basis, and made capable of sustaining and directing itself, in line with all other national, basic industries.

8.—Continuous effort should be put forth to assist industry in Marketing its products, in timber, agriculture, fishing, mining and, in fact, every operation where it appears that useful service can be rendered.

9.—Our highways must be kept in good condition, both for the benefit of settlers and the tourist traffic, and expanded as circumstances warrant. In this connection a Highway Board should be established to make for continuity of policy and to inspire confidence in impartial treatment.

10.—A Public Utilities Commission should be established.

11.—A National Central Bank should be established.

12.—Social Services, such as Mothers' Pensions, Old Age Pensions, etc., must be maintained. Abuses of administration should not be allowed, and injustice through mere technicalities should not be permitted.

13.—The Peace River must be given access to the Coast.

14.—In order that the utmost Freedom of Action by Members of the Legislature may be assured in respect of questions before the House, it is Liberal policy that a government shall be considered to be defeated only upon a straight want-of-confidence motion.

15.—The Dominion Government will be asked to place the Province of British Columbia upon a basis of equality with the other provinces, and to this end request will be made for a Royal Commission to ascertain the extent to which the Province of British Columbia has not been given Equality of Treatment with the Other Provinces of the Dominion.

16.—There shall be a permanent Voters' List to ensure that all eligible voters are enrolled.

17.—The Leader of the Liberal Party is given a free mandate to choose for his associates in government, men of character, ability and standing, having regard solely to the public interest.

suggesting how best a junior chamber might be conducted. The younger Mr. Heilbroner urged that the junior chamber get off to a good start and continue to be active. The organizers of the movement here, he said, had given the idea a lot of study.

V. S. Moore thought that more could be accomplished if the young men present at the meeting could be persuaded to join the senior chamber.

Theo Collart agreed that new and younger blood was needed in carrying on the fight for matters of public interest. W. O. Fulton agreed with Mr. Collart's views and was all in favor of a junior chamber of commerce.

W. P. Armour urged the young men to join the senior chamber. He felt that it was important that the fee should not be too high for young men.

Junior and Senior

Speaking again, Henry Heilbroner said that the idea of the junior chamber was to work in conjunction with but not necessarily to back the senior chamber. Every item which was passed by the junior chamber, however, would be placed before the senior with a view to obtaining its approval. Membership in the junior chamber would be open to all young men between the ages of eighteen and thirty-five.

Mr. Alder Jr. thought that the junior chamber would not antagonize the senior. He asked if there were any young men in the senior chamber now.

Max Heilbroner was greatly in favor of the movement. The only way to fight for matters of public interest was to get together and organize.

John Dybavon, vice-president of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce, could see nothing but good in the new movement. He favored a union of the two chambers.

James Douglas thought it would be advisable to adjourn for a few days to think things over.

At this point, the members of the senior chamber retired after which the embryonic junior body decided to adjourn until next Tuesday evening when it is planned to elect officers and proceed further with organization.
