LARGEST B. C. RAINFALL

Some interesting statistics in regard to climate have just been published by the provincial government covering the year 1932. During that year the greatest rainfall recorded was at Henderson Lake on Vancouver Island, the total being 242.88 inches. Ocean Falls comes a close second with 236.76 inches. Swanson Bay recorded 168.61 inches and Capilano Creek near Vancouver had 153.51.

At some points where the rainfall was not large, the snowfall was particularly heavy. At Premier, for instance, the rainfall was only 49.65 inches but the snowfall during the same period was 612.5 inches. Stewart had 64.42 inches of rain and 239,2 inches of snow.

In the south at Coquitlam Lake there was 166.11 inches of rain and 74.3 inches of snow. Alouette Lake, also on the lower Fraser, had 130.38 inches of rain and 35.3 inches of

The largest precipitation near Prince Rupert was at Falls River where the rainfall was 148.77 and the snowfall 198.5 inches. Prince Rupert precipitation that year was higher than usual, the rainfall being 115.54 and snowfall 22.7. On the Queen Charlottes the rainfall at Massett was only 60.32 and snowfall 21.5 inches and Queen Charlotte City 76.13 inches of rain with no snow.
