DETAILS OF SILVER PACT SIGNED AT LONDON MEET: SALES OF METAL LIMITED

Will Mean Great Benefit to Mining Industry of British Columbia, Minister, Provincial Mineralogist and Company Head Agree

LONDON, July 25: (Canadian Press)—Countries of the world whose representatives signed Senator Key Pittman's silver price raising agreement at the world economic conference here included India, China and Spain, whose coffers are bursting with monetary silver, and United States, Mexico, Canada, Peru and Australia, the great

world producers of the white metal. The memorandum calls for restriction of silver sales for four years and, when ratified by the home SILVER UP governments, the document will take the form of a treaty.

Under the agreement, the big producers wil labsorb from mine production amounts of silver equivaient to sales of holding countries. They will hold this metal for monetary use while agreeing not to sell any monetary silver.


