Rumors of Mu On Battleship Hood Are Denied by Admiralty

Reports of Trouble Aboard Largest War Vessel in World Gained Wide Circulation But Are Set at Rest With Official Announcement

LONDON, Oct. 11: (CP)—Sensational rumors of insubordination early this week aboard the battle cruiser Hood, largest warship in the world, were denied today by the First Lord of the Admiralty. Reports of trouble while the Hood was enroute with other vessels to participate in North Sea manoeuvres gained wide circulation. The Admiralty announced today that the ship was at Cromarty Firth.

SIMCOE, Ont., Oct. 11:—Clifford Herron, aged 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Herron of this city, ended his own life by shooting himself through the heart because of his dislike of attending school with smaller and younger boys.

Screen Actress Victim of T. B., Buried Monday

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 11:—Members of the screen colony paid farewell tribute Monday when the funeral took place of Rene Adoree, former popular moving picture star, who succumbed in a sanitarium at Sunland late last week following a three-year battle against tuberculosis. Miss Adoree, who was born in France 31 years ago, rose to fame on the screen as John Gilbert's leading woman. A sister came here from Mexico to attend the funeral.

PREMIER IS DEAD

Hon. James D. Stewart, Head of Prince Edward Island Government, Passes

Had Fine Career

Undaunted by Defeat, Came Back To Office of Maritime Prime Minister

CHARLOTTETOWN, P.E.I., Oct. 11: (CP)—Premier James David Stewart of Prince Edward Island died here last night at the age of 59 following an illness of several months.

Mr. Stewart was the first premier of Prince Edward Island to return to power after a party defeat. Others had accepted as final an adverse vote at the polls, but Stewart was not a man to be felled at one blow. His first government, formed in 1923, was ousted in the general election of 1927. When another battle loomed in 1931 he still was leading the Conservatives, and when the votes were counted on election day, August 6, he was hailed again as premier of the province.

He began his political career in 1917, when he won a by-election. Re-elected in the general election of 1919 he was considered one of the stalwarts among the Conservatives, and in 1921 he was chosen leader of the party in the province. His first general campaign was a brilliant success. In 1923 the Conservatives captured 26 seats to the four held by the Liberals. The Liberal government of Hon. John Howard Bell wiped out, Stewart was asked to form a cabinet. He assumed office as premier and attorney general on September 5, 1923.

Liquor Policy

During the next four years the liquor question developed an embarrassing situation for politicians of the island. Agitation for establishment of a system of government control was offset by strong resolutions favoring maintenance of prohibitory laws.

In the campaign preceding the general election of 1927, Premier Stewart came out in favor of government control. Although he won a personal victory, his ministry was defeated, 24 to six, and Hon. A. C. Saunders formed a Liberal government.

Stewart changed his policy for the general election of 1931, his platform containing a plank promising strict enforcement of the prohibitory liquor statute. He was returned to power with a majority of eight, and assumed office as premier and attorney general on August 29.

James David Stewart was born at Lower Montague, P.E.I., on January 15, 1874. He attended the public school at Lower Montague and studied later at Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, graduating in 1895. Two years later he graduated from Dalhousie University, Halifax, with a degree of LL.B.

He was admitted to the bar of Prince Edward Island in 1906, and became a partner in the firm of Mathieson, MacDonald and Stewart. He was appointed a King's Counsel in 1917.

Had Seven Children
He married Barbara Westaway of Georgetown, P.E.I., in 1901. Seven children were born to them: Roma, Helen, Maude, David, Marjorie, Lillian and Alan.

Roma, the eldest daughter, was the first woman admitted to the bar of Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Stewart was a Presbyterian and a prominent member of the Masonic Order. In 1915 he was elected Grand Master of the Masonic Grand Lodge of Prince Edward Island.

Gardening was his favorite hobby. His love for flowers was expressed in the beauty that surrounded his residence in Charlottetown.

High Tariffs Are Not Fixed Policy of Gov.'t Premier Bennett Says

Were Simply Necessary to Combat Existing Conditions, Prime Minister Declares—Most of Canadian Salaries Now Spent on Products of Country

WINNIPEG, Oct. 11: (CP)—Canada's higher tariffs were not the fixed policy of the federal government although they were necessary to combat conditions when his government took office, Premier R. B. Bennett declared in speaking here last night. Statistics showed, stated the Prime Minister, that eighty-five percent of the salaries now earned in Canada were being spent on Canadian products. He believed that Canada would profit from the London wheat agreement.

Damage Suit by Woman is Filed Against Champ

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 11:—Miss Lenoir de Forest of New York has filed suit for \$50,000 damages against Gar Wood, speedboat champion of the world, charging that her hearing was permanently impaired as a result of riding in one of Wood's boats.

Is First Woman Bootlegger In Ontario Town

LINDSAY, Ont., Oct. 11:—Mrs. MacFarland, this city's first convicted woman bootlegger, has been sentenced to a fine of \$100 and costs or an option of three months in jail. She chose to serve out the jail term.

Pantages Buys R. K. O. Theatre In Oregon City

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 11:—Alexander Pantages has purchased the Radio-Keith-Orpheum Theatre here. It will be operated as a link in a new vaudeville circuit which Pantages is organizing.

Ottawa Woman is Re-elected Head Temperance Union

PETERBORO, Ont., Oct. 11:—Mrs. Edmund T. Kerr of Ottawa has been elected for her third term as president of the Women's Christian Temperance Union of Ontario at the fifty-sixth annual convention here.

Sox and Cubs Game Off For Veeck Funeral

CHICAGO, Oct. 11:—The funeral of William L. Veeck, president of the Chicago Cubs, who died last week of influenza, took place on Saturday. Out of respect to his memory, the fourth game of the inter-league series between Chicago White Sox and Cubs was put off after the White Sox had won the third straight game Friday nine to nothing.

CONVICTED OF THEFT

Former City Clerk of Ladysmith Found Guilty of Taking Municipal Funds

NANAIMO, Oct. 11: (CP)—Charged with stealing \$2340 from the city of Ladysmith while employed as city clerk, C. J. Callin was convicted yesterday by a jury at the Supreme Court Assizes here, the jury recommending leniency in view of the state of Callin's health. Sentence will be passed at the close of the Assizes.

Bank Robber in Ontario Detected By Branch Manager

HAMILTON, Ont., Oct. 11:—The manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce which was recently looted by three armed men of \$2000 declared himself as being reasonably sure that Edward "Jake" Wells, accused of the Preston bank was one of the group which robbed his bank.

Stock Mart Holds Fairly Well Tho Profits Taken

NEW YORK, Oct. 11:—Most of the leading stocks on the New York Stock Exchange have held fairly well during the last few days in face of considerable profit-taking although the most of issues have been irregular. The industrial average at closing on Saturday was 98.20, up .66; rails, 41.84, up .25 and utilities, 25.77, up .12.

Freedom of Press In Germany Ended

Journalists Are Made Public Officials and Their Rights and Duties Regulated

THE NOMINATIONS

With three candidates definitely in the field the election campaign may now be said to be well under way. Electors will, doubtless, look over the list of candidates well and make their decisions between now and election day. It should not be a difficult matter to choose.

The name of T. D. Pattullo is so outstanding that there seems little doubt as to what the electors will do. People who have at heart the interests of the city of Prince Rupert will hardly take the chance of turning down the leader of the party that is likely to sweep the province.

NO INDEPENDENTS

While there is always a possibility that there may be an independent in the field in Prince Rupert, such an eventuality does not seem probable. The city is to be congratulated on not having such a candidate. Here is what Dr. Harris says of them:

"The independents are a curious collection of derelicts. They are independent, certainly, of three things:

"Independent of loyalty, because they deserted their leader.

"Independent of ideas, because they haven't had any for five years.

"Independent of decency, because they didn't discover they were independent until after the last pay cheque came out.

"If the Daily Province thinks it can make a cabinet out of these kind of derelicts, then it is welcome to it."

September Heaviest Building Month in Nearly Two Years; Outlay Recorded at \$11,500

Building permits issued in the city of Prince Rupert during the month of September this year totalled \$11,500 in value, this figure being the highest for any single month in the last two years with but one exception—March, 1932 when the value was \$12,965. This year's building value for September compares with \$2,425 in the same month last year and was well ahead of any September in the past six years. Building on the aggregate for this year, however, standing at \$27,832, is considerably lower than \$50,645 in the first nine months of 1932.

A Brief Synopsis of Liberal Policy

HEREWITH is a brief synopsis of policy as laid down by the Liberal Party of British Columbia, in convention held in October, 1932.

Many matters of interest, not specifically set out, will require consideration. The principles enunciated are indicative of the Liberal viewpoint, and are broad enough to meet every question within provincial jurisdiction.

The Liberal Party exists as an official organization for the purpose of formulating and furthering measures that will make for the well-being of each individual member of society, and the welfare of society as a whole.

Innumerable questions, both of public and personal character, can be properly treated only through the agency of government.

Government is not an ordinary business, but carries responsibility to meet every problem arising from our complex social and economic conditions. In order that not merely a few, but all of our people may live in reasonable comfort.

The Liberal Party pledges immediate action under the best available advice and closest study.

1.—Profitable and permanent Employment is the most important question facing our people. There should be co-operation between the national, provincial and municipal authorities and the Canadian banking system to establish the necessary credit to carry out a broad programme of constructive and useful wage-distributing public enterprise, and to further the health, education and well-being of all our people.

2.—An Economic Council should be established, the membership of which shall consist of representatives of the various avenues of endeavour, such as health, education, agriculture, labour and the industries. This council will be appointed by the government on recommendation of the interests involved, and will act in an advisory capacity to the government.

3.—Amongst other things the council will study industrial and social effort in the province and suggest means to correlate these efforts. It will familiarize itself with intra, inter-provincial and foreign trade, and will co-operate with the other provinces and the Dominion. It will also study such questions as production and consumption, and the marketing of our products, the number of hours of work per day and days of work per week, the standard of wages and commodity prices. These questions are of national as well as provincial concern, and British Columbia can take the lead in urging co-operation with the other provinces and the Dominion as a whole.

4.—National Unemployment Insurance should be established upon a contributory basis.

5.—Our Financial position must be reviewed. Current expenditure must be kept within current revenue. While maintaining the credit of the province, effort must be made to reduce capital charges. We cannot continue to pay exorbitant rates of interest for money.

6.—The Taxation Structure must be revised with a view to reduction wherever possible, including exemption in the lower scale of wages and salaries.

7.—The health of each of us is important to the whole community, and a measure of State Health Insurance should be made effective, not only to preserve health, but to reduce costs both to the average citizen and to industry.

8.—A general and effective review must be made of the Educational problem, rejecting any proposed organization that involves a caste system. We must facilitate the intellectual growth of each individual member of society in order to equip him for his daily tasks, and for the enjoyment of such cultural pursuits as may be in keeping with our social customs.

9.—Triangular disagreements between the school boards, municipal councils and the department of education must be adjusted, and our whole system placed upon a sound financial basis.

10.—The financial position of our Municipalities is of increasing concern. An equitable adjustment must be made as between the province and the municipalities, and the municipalities placed in a sound financial position.

11.—An effort should be made to settle our Agricultural Lands in order that more of our citizens may be self-supporting. Agriculture as a whole must be put upon a sound and profitable basis, and made capable of sustaining and directing itself, in line with all other national, basic industries.

12.—Continuous effort should be put forth to assist industry in Marketing its products, in timber, agriculture, fishing, mining and, in fact, every operation where it appears that useful service can be rendered.

13.—Our highways must be kept in good condition, both for the benefit of settlers and the tourist traffic, and expanded as circumstances warrant. In this connection a Highway Board should be established to make for continuity of policy and to inspire confidence in impartial treatment.

14.—A Public Utilities Commission should be established.

15.—A National Central Bank should be established.

16.—Social Services, such as Mothers' Pensions, Old Age Pensions, etc., must be maintained. Abuses of administration should not be allowed, and injustice through mere technicalities should not be permitted.

17.—The Peace River must be given access to the Coast.

18.—In order that the utmost Freedom of Action by Members of the Legislature may be assured in respect of questions before the House, it is Liberal policy that a government shall be considered to be defeated only upon a straight want-of-confidence motion.

19.—The Dominion Government will be asked to place the Province of British Columbia upon a basis of equality with the other provinces, and to this end request will be made for a Royal Commission to ascertain the extent to which the Province of British Columbia has not been given Equality of Treatment with the Other Provinces of the Dominion.

20.—There shall be a permanent Voters' List to ensure that all eligible voters are enrolled.

21.—The Leader of the Liberal Party is given a free mandate to choose for his associates in government, men of character, ability and standing, having regard solely to the public interest.

On board were Pilot C. J. Graul and the owner, Gaylord Adams.

Following her week-end excursion voyage to Ketchikan, C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert was moved up to the local dry dock where she has been tied up for the winter. She will be given her annual overhaul at the local yard before being re-commissioned in service late next February in place of the Prince George which will then be withdrawn for annual overhaul. The majority of the officers and crew of the Prince Rupert will leave for Vancouver tomorrow night on the Prince George.

The power tug F. H. Phippen, with Capt. "Handsome Jim" Morrison in command, made a hunting trip to Khutzmateen Inlet over the Thanksgiving holiday week-end with a party on board consisting, besides the skipper and his son, Roy, of F. A. MacCallum, W. M. Blackstock, Alex. McRae, L. H. Haworth, F. N. Good, W. O. Fulton and C. W. Dawson. The party left Saturday afternoon and returned home early yesterday. The bag consisted of one goose and several ducks. The bird hunting season is now open at Khutzmateen Inlet which is in Atlin electoral district. In this region it will not be open for a couple of weeks yet.

There were a number of deer hunting parties at Welcome Harbor, Porcher Island, over the Thanksgiving holiday week-end, possibly too many being in the woods there to make for very good results. One or two deer were taken by some of the first on the grounds. Among the leading parties were J. W. McAuley and A. R. Nichols on the Carmona and Dr. H. L. Alexander, C. E. Starr and Joe Scott on the Alexander-Starr boat, neither of which groups met with any success.

Up to September 30 the salmon pack on the Skeena River this year had reached a total of 179,812 cases as compared with 223,322 cases at a similar date last year. The sockeye pack for the Skeena River was 29,298 cases this year in comparison with 56,695 cases last year, the spring pack 3,094 cases in comparison with 26,775 cases, the steelhead pack 231 cases in comparison with 370 cases, the coho pack 37,922 cases in comparison with 45,823 cases, the pink pack 93,369 cases in comparison with 56,068 cases and the chum pack 15,898 cases in comparison with 37,591 cases.

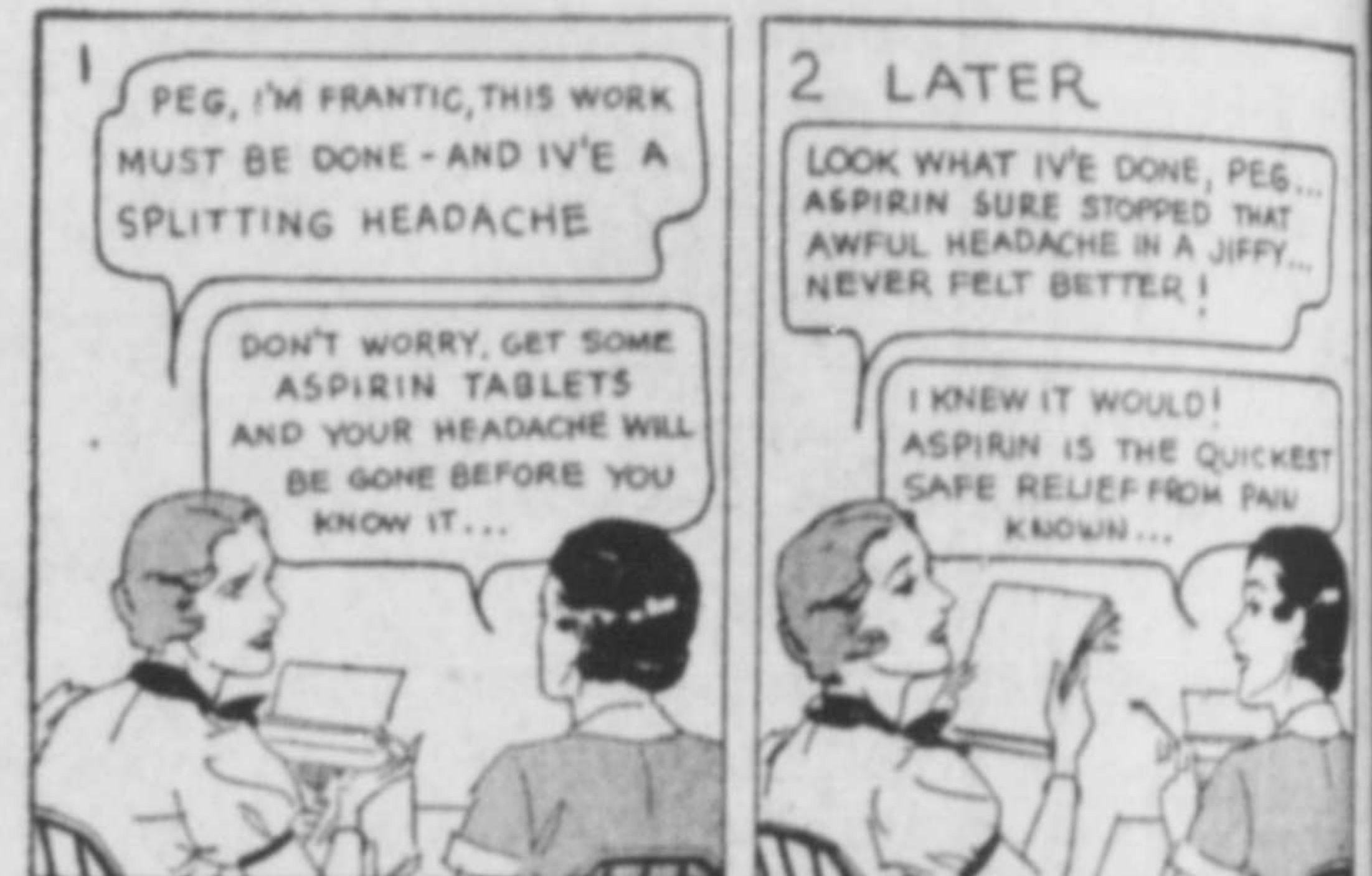

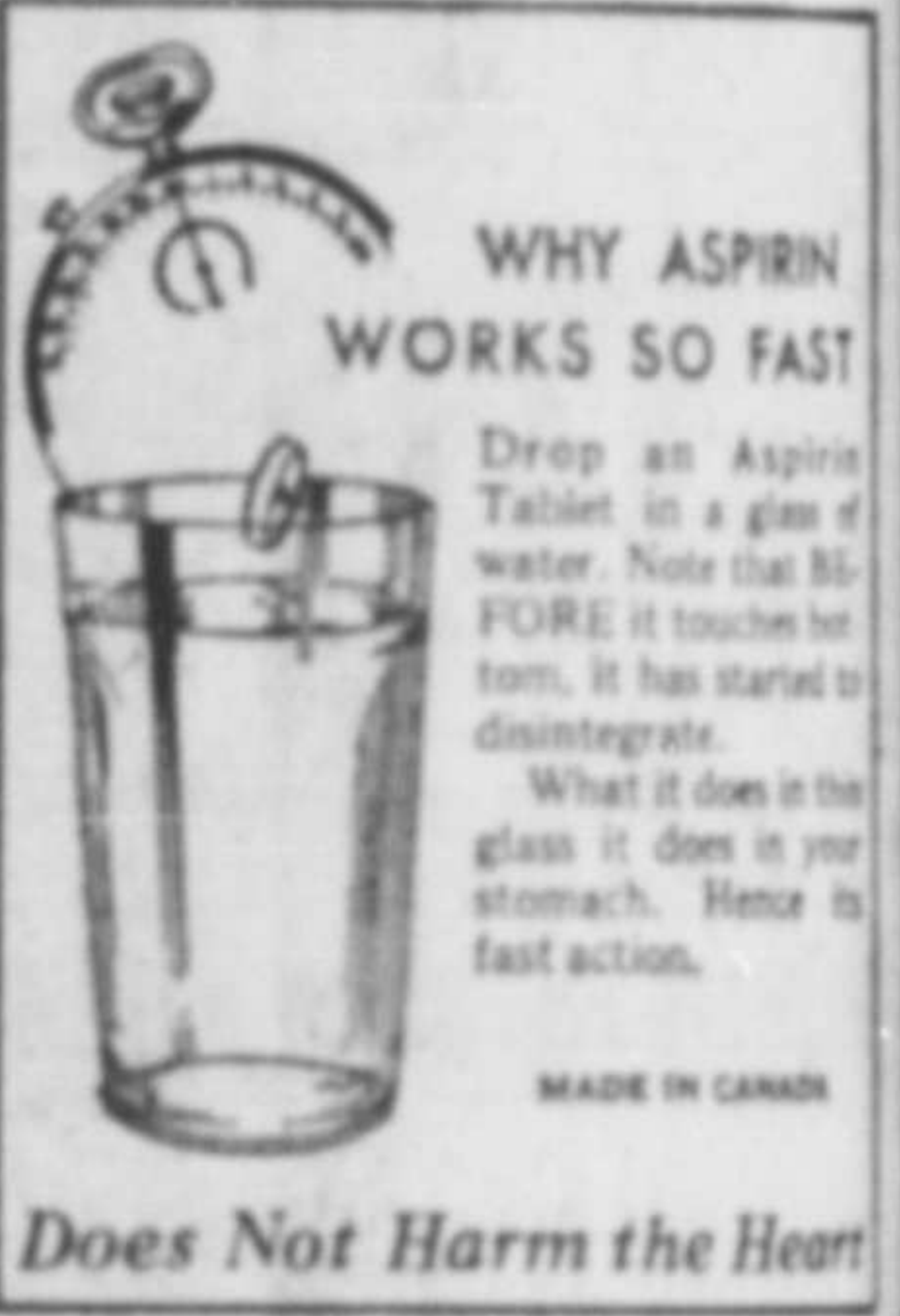
