BERLIN, March 23: - Chancellor Hitler, shouting above the cheers of his Nazi deputies, demanded four years of dictatorial power from the Reichstag today. It was a dramatic scene and one to be long remembered.

The Chancellor relegated the issue of the revival of the monarchy to the background, lifted the destruction of communism to the fore of his program and reiterated once more the familiar Nazi thesis of arms equality for all nations including Germany.

Capt. Burbidge From Victoria to Vancouver News But is Not Generally Credited

The Vancouver News has the following story in regard to the

political situation at Victoria: "According to reports from Victoria, the Legislature will be prorogued at the end of this week, there being virtually no business before it except the budget.

"Vancouverites, returning from the capital, bring with them somewhat startling rumors as to the course events may take immediately following the rise of the House.

"Dr. Tolmie, it is said, will go at once to the Lieutenant-Governor and tender his resignation, taking the strictly constitutional course of recommending His Honor to send for the leader of the opposition, T.

"Mr. Pattullo, it is understood, will form a Union government, he having carefully left the gate open for this solution of the political problem in his speech on the budget on Thursday.

"In such a government, Mr. Pattullo would take the premiership. The cabinet would be a small one, equally divided between Conservatives and Liberals, the other Liberals being Dr. W. H. Sutherland, who would take the posts of Provincial Secretary and Minister of Education, and E. D. Barrow, who would go back to his old department, that of Agriculture.

The game will take place in the Auditorium next Friday, March 31 along with other league championship games.




