Tokyo Instructs Its Authorities to Settle On Localized Basis

Chinese General Wants Dealings to be Made With National Government-British Warships Dispatched To Protect Country's Interests in Shankaikwan Area

TOKYO, Japan, Jan. 4: (Canadian Press)—The government has instructed military and diplomatic authorities in Manchuria and North China today to avoid aggravation of the Shankaikwan situation resulting from the occupation of that Chinese city by Japanese troops.
